They were assisted by ammunition resupply by RAAF helicopters, close fire support from Australian artillery, and the arrival of reinforcements in APCs as night fell. When the Viet Cong withdrew, they left behind 245 dead, but carried away many more casualties. Seventeen Australians were killed and 25 wounded, with one dying of

wounds several days later.

We also remember the battles of Coral and Balmoral that commenced on the 13th May 1968. A 1RAR mortar platoon position was over-run, along with one of 102 Field Battery's six 105 mm M2A2 howitzers in the base. The attack was beaten off, and the captured gun-pit was retaken. Eleven Australians were killed and 28 wounded, while the attackers lost more than the 52 bodies they left behind.

Coral again came under attack, this time from a North Vietnamese Army (NVA) force estimated at three battalions strong. A Squadron, 3rd Cavalry Regiment, and 1RAR's rifle companies were heavily engaged. The attack was repelled after four hours of fighting, with the Australians having suffered five men killed and 19 wounded.

RSL is committed to supporting the Central Highlands Vietnam Veterans and their families. Almost 60,000 Australians, including ground troops and air force and navy personnel, served in Vietnam; 521 died and over 3,000 were wounded.



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Message from your Councillor

It's a busy period, with many AGM's and Award dinners for many community groups in our Shire.

Thank you for your invitations, and I would like to acknowledge and recognise the many hours that people contribute volunteering in our community. We are very fortunate.



Last month the CEO, Ms

Margot Stork, and l attended a four-day Australian Local Government Association (ALGA) Conference in Canberra with over 800 Councillors, Mayors and CEO's from around Australia in attendance. There are 537 Local Governments in Australia.

The first day was a Regional Co-operation and Development Forum, with presentations on national economics, news and local journalism, innovation, affordable housing, tourism, technology and 5G.

We were addressed by the federal Minister for Regional Services, Decentralisation and Local Government, the Hon Mark Coulton MP, who, 15 years ago was the Mayor of a Rural Council. We heard from the Deputy Prime Minister, the Hon Michael McCormack MP, and the federal Shadow Minister for Regional Services, Territories and Local Government, Jason Clare MP.

Presentations included post-election review and opportunities, crowd-powered communities, Indigenous languages, infrastructure and population, national media, the environment, reducing community harm, and leadership and communications during natural disasters.

Successful projects and programs from around Australia were highlighted. The inspiring end-conference address was from Paralympic Champion Kurt Fearnley.

Motions from Councils were put before the forum for voting to direct ALGA on the issues and concerns of local governments to address and advocate on our behalf at a federal level. Macedon Ranges submitted two Notices of Motion regarding a national solution and action for current issues and the crisis around waste and resource recovery and telecommunications. Other councils also raised similar motions and working together motions about these issues were carried. These motions will now be voted on by the ALGA board and presented to the federal government for consideration.

Attending the conference is a powerful and valuable opportunity to learn from other councils and get our voice heard on the national stage.

We will soon be announcing the successful Community Funding Scheme recipients; a big thank you to all those that applied.

Cobaw Community Health held a morning tea for all of the participants of Cobaw's Social

Support program. The program which runs every week-day, Monday to Friday, comprises day trips out to various locations in the region for activities such as the movies, lunch, a walk or shopping. The activities are designed weeks in advance and participants can select which activities they prefer to attend to give as much choice as possible. Cobaw staff collect the small group of participants from their home in the morning and drop them back mid-afternoon.

"We're over half-way through the year and we wanted to get some honest feedback from those that have been going out on the bus trips and find out which activities people liked the most," said Carly Visscher, Community Connections Manager. "We are also keen to get some ideas on what we can do for future outings to make sure that people get out into the community."

Western Water says

"prevention is better than cure" when it comes to frozen meters.

When meters and pipes are exposed to very cold temperatures, the water inside them can freeze, resulting in a property having no water.

"Placing a cover over the meter and pipes is the best way to prevent the water inside them freezing," said Graham Holt, General Manager of Customer, Community Relations and Operations.

Very cold weather can also cause unprotected pipes and meters to be damaged. "When water freezes, it expands, and this can cause the meter to burst and/or pipes to split," said Mr Holt.

"In the unfortunate event of a frozen meter, you should

wait for it to thaw naturally. Never pour boiling or hot water over a meter to defrost it, as this can cause it to split".

While Western Water maintains and manages the main pipelines and meters, property owners are reminded they are responsible for damage that occurs to pipes on their side of the property.

Western Water suggests a variety of options for covering water meters, including a large bucket, cardboard or plastic box, half a tyre, a hessian bag or an old blanket.

Regardless of the item the customer uses to cover their meter, they need to ensure it can be easily removed for meter reading and maintenance.

When meters and pipes are exposed to very cold temperatures, the water inside them can freeze. This can result in your property having no water.

If frost is forecast, protect your meters and pipes by covering them with a container or blanket.

Tune your wood heater for more heat and less smoke

Environment Protection Authority Victoria (EPA) is encouraging everyone who owns a wood heater to tune it to produce less smoke and more heat this winter.

Wood smoke and calm weather conditions contribute to reduced air quality across parts of Melbourne and regional Victoria every winter. EPA Chief Environmental Scientist Andrea Hinwood says there are simple ways to make your wood heater safer, cleaner and cheaper to run.

"However, wood heaters that are not maintained or operated correctly can produce a lot of smoke, and one of the best things you can do is have your flue or chimney professionally checked and cleaned," she said.

"That can help to prevent flue fires and ensure the heater produces more heat and less smoke.

"Checking the wood heater's operating manual can help you to get the best out of it, and give you the knowhow to choose the right fuel."

Dr Hinwood said the best fuel is dry, seasoned, untreated hardwood, which burns longer and produces more heat and less smoke.

"Even slightly damp wood stops your wood heater from doing its best. You wind up paying for heat that is lost in drying out the timber before it can burn, and you get less efficient combustion that creates more smoke," she said.

Dr Hinwood added that reducing wood fire smoke also helped to minimise any health impacts.

"Wood smoke contains very small particles and gases that contribute to air pollution. This can cause problems for anyone with cardiovascular, breathing difficulties and respiratory conditions, resulting in symptoms for some people."

Hinwood encouraged people to reduce their use of wood heaters and fireplaces on still days, and to go outside occasionally to check their chimney for smoke.

Dr Hinwood said other tips for reducing smoke pollution include: Get

a hot fire going quickly with plenty of paper and small kindling;

- Keep the air controls set high enough to keep the fire burning brightly;
- Never overload a wood heater with too much wood; and
- Make sure you never leave the wood heater to smoulder overnight, as this starves the fire of oxygen, producing more smoke.


EPA also advises that you should never burn household rubbish, driftwood, treated wood such as pine, or old painted wood in your wood heater.

Dr Hinwood encouraged people considering a new heater to think about all the choices available to them, including other heating options that may produce less smoke than wood heaters.

Share your feedback on the Rural Conservation Zone

Residents can now have their say on issues and opportunities for the Rural Conservation Zone areas of the shire.

The Rural Conservation Zone covers a large proportion of the shire, and contributes a significant amount to the character of the Macedon Ranges. The zone includes bushland, farms and tourist attractions and features highly valued landscapes.

We'd like to know what residents value about the Rural Conservation Zone, and what opportunities there might be to preserve and enhance it into the future.

The community survey is the next stage in consultation for the Rural Land Use Strategy, which will provide guidance on the future use, development and protection of land in our important farming and conservation areas.

The survey follows on from consultation on issues in the Farming Zone carried out in 2017, and a survey of landowners in the Rural Conservation Zone carried out earlier in the year.

The landowner survey received more than 700 responses and will provide valuable input into the development of the draft Rural Land Use Strategy, which will be released for broad community consultation in late 2019.

The new community survey provides an opportunity for anyone interested in these areas to have their say

in the Rural Land Use Strategy project. If you've already filled in the landowner survey, thank you for your input – there is no need to also fill out the community survey.

The community survey will be available online at mrsc. vic.gov.au/yoursay from Monday 22 July until Monday 12 August 2019. Printed copies will also be available at Council's service centres.

The committee was established in 2014 and provides strategic input and advice on a wide range of Council programs and services.

Chief Executive Officer, Margot Stork said this was a great opportunity for proactive residents to positively contribute to Council's decision-making.

"Due to recent vacancies we are looking for two new members to join the committee, which includes a diverse group of people from a broad range of age groups and includes two youth ambassadors," she said.



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

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
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Introduction

The Macedon Ranges is a diverse region that stretches from Gisborne through to the Cobaw Ranges, with a raft of microclimates that give a greater affinity of certain varieties to a particular part of the region. The two wines for this month represent wines that speak of their specific location in the Macedon Ranges and have both over time shown their pedigree and class. The first is from Granite Hills in Baynton and the second is from Curly Flat in Lancefield.

2018 Granite Hills Riesling

Granite Hills are one of the pioneering producers in the Macedon Ranges, with the vineyard nearing 50 years in age. The wines are very good across the board, but they really shine with aromatic whites.

The 2018 is a very good follow up to 2017 and showcases vintage variation, with the 2018 coming in at 13% alcohol when compared to 12% in 2017. This has resulted in a wine that has depth and mouthfeel, but still holds the exacting lines of acidity that Granite Hills are known for.

The nose has characteristics of chalk and lime, with some more exotic jasmine and fennel if you look hard. The backbone of the wine is a finely held scaffold of acidity that provides structure for the citrus-dominant palate; there is a touch of green apple that melds with lime fruits before the long, mouth filling finish.

One for the cellar.

2017 Curly Flat Chardonnay

This is an epic Curly Flat release and will have the longevity afforded by the 2017 vintage. A light yellow in the glass, white peach and just-ripe fig dominate the nose, with a subtle build of flint and mealy richness that is backed by oak-induced spice.

The backbone is equal part citrus acidity and gentle vanillin spice. There are waves of peach and nectarine that are finely structured and beautifully integrated with the wine's richer notes. The finish is long, and shows impecable balance.

Irresistible now but will cellar.

Update on dogs and cats in public places

Funding in the 2019/20 budget will see Council move a step closer to implementing the recommendations contained in Paws for Thought, the dog on-and-off leash and cat curfew review, which was endorsed by Council in March 2019.

These recommendations include introducing an order that requires dogs to be under effective control of their owner in public places, dogs to be leashed in all public places except in designated off-leash areas, and dogs to be prohibited from some public places for environmental reasons.

It also recommends an order for the introduction of a sunset-to-sunrise cat curfew, and for cats to be prohibited from some public places for environmental reasons.

Funding for an additional Local Laws Officer (Ranger) will help ensure that officers are able to get out and about in the community to help to educate residents about the new controls. The new dog control orders will become effective from 1 January 2020 and the new cat controls after 1 July 2020.

Our Newham & District Landcare Group has had a busy and productive year.

We received financial fund-

ing for further development of the Cobaw Biolink, which has been our focus for the past twelve years. The Cobaw Biolink contains areas of high quality remnant vegetation on both public and private land, and provides habitat connectivity for native species between Mount Macedon and the Cobaw State Forest. The latest grant focuses particularly on Monument Creek and eastern riverine systems. Landowners receive funding support for revegetation and fencing to exclude stock from these areas; control of gorse is underway at Twin Bridges Bushland Reserve (on Monument Creek); and the group has purchased more nesting boxes for brushtailed phascogales, a pole camera for monitoring nest boxes and a motion-sensor camera for use by members wishing to record wildlife on their property.

The Propogating Group continues to grow indigenous native plants to order for Melbourne Water and funded Landcare projects, with the surplus sold cheaply to members. Some of the funds raised support science programs and landscaping projects at Newham Primary School.

We made submissions to the Macedon Ranges Draft Biodiversity Strategy, which was adopted by Council in December 2018, and to the Victorian Environmental Assessment Council Central West Investigation Draft Proposals paper.

We starred in the Victorian Landcare Magazine summer issue, featuring Women in Landcare.

We held many successful educational and social events, such as:

- the science and practice of landscape connectivity
- bringing back the brolga: swamp restoration in the southern Grampians
- exploring what changes can unfold when predators are excluded from our ecosystems
- rivers of gold; understanding how gold mining has shaped Victoria's rivers
- tools to assess and improve properties for habitat value to wildlife
- a make-your-own nesting box workshop
- hands-on sessions planting and weeding at Hanging Rock Reserve twice a year
- annual Christmas BBQ party

The "Weedies", also known as the Roadside Management Group, continue their sessions on weed management on some of our more precious roadsides, with the assistance of a Council grant for equipment and herbicides, and much volunteer labour. The very invasive Chilean Needle Grass was also a focus of attack.

Ministerial meeting on Kyneton waste water release

Council representatives expressed the community's concerns over Coliban Water's releases of low quality waste water into the Campaspe River at a meeting at the Minister's office in Melbourne.

Last week the Mayor, Cr Janet Pearce and Chief Executive Officer, Margot Stork met with representatives from the Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning (DELWP) and ministerial staff at the offices of the Minister for Water, Lisa Neville.

The Mayor and CEO expressed concerns over Coliban Water's emergency discharge of Class C recycled waste water from its Kyneton Waste Water Treatment Plant into the Campaspe River. As a result, the Environment Protection Authority (EPA) issued health warnings for residents and started an investigation into the releases.

While Council is pleased the health warnings have since been lifted by the EPA, it continues to advocate for a longterm solution to the problem with full transparency with the community.

The meeting follows a Notice of Motion at the Ordinary Council Meeting on 26 June, where Council decided to write to the EPA expressing concern over the water discharges and the lack of consultation with Council and the community. Council urged the EPA to expedite the investigation with full transparency to the community, and made a request for a ministerial meeting.

Mayor, Cr Janet Pearce said discussions with DELWP and the Minister's office over releases of low quality water (Class C water) into the Campaspe River by Coliban Water had been fruitful.

"We wish to ensure the local community are kept well informed as the investigation by the EPA into the releases continues," Cr Pearce said. "Council wants to ensure this investigation is a priority for the EPA and there is a commitment that the community will be consulted regarding longer-term solutions to the problem.

"We were pleased to hear that Coliban Water has committed to ongoing communication and consultation with the community, including establishment of a reference group.

"We are now looking forward to working with the new General Manager at Coliban Water and advocating for improvements to service delivery.

On 31 May, the EPA approved an emergency discharge for Coliban Water to release Class B recycled waste water in the hope that it would delay or avoid the need to discharge Class C water. However, Class C recycled water (industrial waste water) was mixed with Class B recycled water and released into the Campaspe River. The releases affected landowners along the river who used river water for stock and domestic purposes, downstream from the Kyneton plant.

By walking together and working harder as a community we can both provide and build better supports for those who live with mental health issues in our community.



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
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Let's Go Back 130 Years

As the Woodend Bowling Club approaches its 130th year, we thought it would be interesting to go back to where it all began, in 1890.

June 1: At a well-attended meeting of the ratepayers, it was decided to establish a Bowls and Lawn Tennis Club in Woodend.

A Committee was appointed to select the most suitable ground and was authorized by the meeting to make application to the Council. Its selection was situated on the south side of the Five Mile Creek, and was unanimously approved by the meeting consequently held. (This is exactly the same site that the Club still occupies 130 years later).

It was suggested the erection of a 4 feet 6 inch picket fence, at a cost of which would not exceed 50 Pounds.

Councillor Christian donated 15 Pounds to the Council for fencing of the same land. As soon as the fence was erected, the Club would spend at least a further 50 Pounds in forming the new bowling green

July 22: The Secretary read over the Rules of the Kyneton Bowling Club, and it was resolved that a sub-committee should draw up a code and submit same for approval at the next meeting.

December 25: Woodend chose Christmas Day to open their green. The opening match was played between Messrs McKenzie, Tassell, Johnson and R&M Froomes. Mr Tassell was elected the foundation President of the Club and D. W. Birrell the Secretary.

We will visit some more interesting history of our club in future issues of the New Woodend Star.

Beware of the Hot Spots around your Home

Here you will find lots of useful information about appliances and places that will be found in nearly every home, and the dangers that they can present in winter.

Dangers during winter

CFA statistics show that one-third of all house fires start in the kitchen, 20% were caused by heat from fuel fires and fuel-powered objects such as stoves and heaters, and another 20% from faulty or overloaded equipment. Here are just a fe other examples: electric blankets, clothes dryers, open fire place, heaters, candles and power boards.

Never deadlock yourself in your home. Deadlocks should have keys in them when you are home. Develop and practice your escape plan – have two ways to escape from your home. And above all else, make sure your smoke alarm is working.

Beware of black ice

There are more dangers in winter than those in and around our homes. Winter brings its own specific dangers to our region due to our climate, and black ice on our roads is one of the most severe.

We are called to every major road accident, and during the many cold mornings that occur through the winter and spring months we should be very alert to the dangers of black ice on our roads.

Over the next few months, it is not uncommon for us to be called out early in the morning, in the dark, to a serious car accident on Blackforest Drive, or other major roads, where a car had hit some black ice and then skidded out of control to crash into gum trees.

People can be very seriously injured and it can take several hours to clear the scene, thanks to the combined efforts of the paramedics, SES, Police and CFA. The police helicopter is also often called to take an injured person to hospital.

It is clearly evident that we should all be extra careful when driving during cold and wet periods.
