MRSPAG Community Walk this month

The Macedon Ranges Suicide Prevention Action Group (MRSPAG) warmly invites all members of the community to join them at the annual Community Walk, to be held in Woodend on Sunday September 8 at 10am.

Every single suicide statistic speaks of immeasurable loss: somebody's life lost; hopes and dreams lost; love and connections lost. And those who are left to grieve live with a loss as personal as the story of the one whose life has ended. As our local community continues to be impacted by suicide, MRSPAG believes we can all play a role in supporting people experiencing a suicidal crisis, and those who are bereaved.

The annual Community Walk is being hosted in Woodend, with this year's World Suicide Prevention Day theme, "Changing the Narrative on Suicide." The aim of this year's theme is to raise awareness about the importance of changing the narrative surrounding suicide and transform how we see this complex issue. By changing the narrative, we can move away from a culture of silence and stigma to one of openness, understanding, and support.

As part of this year's campaign for World Suicide Prevention Day, we acknowledge that we are all called to action to "Start the Conversation." By engaging in open and honest conversations about mental health and suicide, we can raise awareness and reduce stigma. Every conversation, no matter how small, has the potential to make a difference. By starting conversations, we can help individuals who may be struggling to feel valued and understood. As members of the community, we can all contribute to a more supportive and understanding society, where mental health is brought into the light.

The event will be held at the Woodend Children's Park. Registrations open at 8:30 am with pre-entertainment and speeches; the walk will begin at 10 am and will end at the same place, followed by refreshments.

The annual walk is also a day to reflect on those we have lost to suicide. By listening to people's lived experiences, we become part of the commitment to raise awareness, reduce stigma, and promote action to reduce instances of suicide. Personal stories of suicidal thoughts or attempts, and experiences of recovery, can inspire hope in others that they too can move through the period of distress or crisis. By speaking openly and honestly about suicide, others can understand what it means to feel suicidal and how they can support their loved ones in a crisis.

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A rip-roaring Aussie adventure in the wild Southern Ocean

Macedon Ranges audiences will soon have an opportunity to see an award-winning film about one of our greatest – but least known – adventure.

The Great White Whale tells the story of an epic sea journey to Australia's most remote island – Heard Island near Antarctica – and the death-defying attempts to scale Big Ben, its massive, ice-covered volcano.

"500m higher than Mt Kosciuszko, Big Ben rises straight up out of the wild Southern Ocean like a huge white breaching whale," explains internationally acclaimed Woodend filmmaker, Michael Dillon.

Through stunning, previously unseen archival vision and interviews with the adventurers, this feature-length documentary recounts the tale of how a crazy idea turned into an extraordinary expedition, culminating in the first successful summiting of Australia's highest peak.

A Sydney teenager in the 1960s, Michael was one of many volunteers who helped prepare the expedition boat for its 4,000-kilometre voyage to Heard Island.

"I knew the expedition leader Warwick Deacock and then got to know the other nine remarkable individuals who took on this challenge. Among them was a mountain explorer and author, several doctors, a top scholar and an ingenious engineer who made critical mid-sea repairs to the boat using cornflakes! Most of them hadn't sailed before, and the bravest couldn't even swim!" says Michael. "They just went off in their little yellow boat and did it."

"It was an amazing feat, and it might have got a few little lines here and there in the paper at the time, but who remembers it now? These things shouldn't be forgotten."

The film also gives audiences a window onto one of the most spectacular parts of the world, bursting with marine life – penguins, seals, whales and albatrosses – that few people ever get to visit.

The Great White Whale won the Grand Prize at the International Mountain and Adventure Film Festival in Bilbao Spain last December and has since picked up another five international awards. "But nothing beats the excitement of bringing it to my local audience," says Michael.

Rotary at work

Making a positive impact on the lives of children with special needs

Recently at our weekly meeting, our member Peter Dell spoke about the Rotary program named DreamCricket.

DreamCricket is a Rotary-coordinated program helping children with special needs, aged from 8 to 12, to build their confidence and self-esteem through a program of specially adapted cricket-based activities, each adjusted to suit the child, and to ensure they have fun in a safe environment.

Commencing on the Bradman Oval in Bowral in 2010, the program was initiated by Dr Roly Bigg of the Movement Disorder Foundation, in conjunction with the Rotary Clubs of the Southern Highlands and the Bradman Foundation. The DreamCricket program has grown to encompass schools and children throughout Australia and internationally, with special focus on Schools for Specific Purposes, and specialist and/or disadvantaged schools.

Recognising the power of connection, DreamCricket Australia hopes to continue to facilitate high school mentorship on the day of activities (utilizing older students from the same school or supportive nearby high schools. From 2023, DreamCricket Australia offers some basic preparatory training for these mentees. Wonderful friendships between students and ongoing partnerships between schools have occurred as a result.

Working with local Rotarians, volunteers fresh from leaving school and who have had rich DreamCricket experiences in the past may also return to assist with the organisation of the activity. They often help to prepare, advise and enthuse all the participants and high school mentors in what is always an inclusive, inspirational and magical day of cricketing fun for all in attendance.

Annual Gala Days celebrating DreamCricket and involving a host of schools and volunteers is very popular. Peter as the Australian President of DreamCricket travelled to the WACA recently where many of the children had a wonderful day of cricket fun and receiving a medal was the highlight of the day.

DreamCricket has board members in each state and all belong to Rotary. They visit specialist schools to promote the program and then a local Rotary club is invited to purchase the cricket kits (approximate cost: \$800) and can also assist at the school during activities. Former Prime Minister John Howard is the patron, and he thoroughly enjoys the day with the children, parents and carers and always presents the medals.

Once the school has a DreamCricket kit it can be a regular part of the curriculum. The Rotary Club of Sunbury has supported the Sunbury and Macedon Ranges Specialist School with two kits and they have proven very successful.

One of the favourite games is "sticky wicket", where a child throws a ball and it "sticks" to the velcro wicket. It is all about "success" for these children.

Peter will be travelling to Nepal in November as part of a RAWCS DreamCricket team, and they will be continuing their work with the children of Nepal. RAWCS is a Rotary Australia World Community Service program. The team will comprise approximately 20 members who will be contributing their skills in Nepalese villages – in areas such as health, literacy, sport and agriculture.

Hospitality (or "hospo" as we know it) is work that nearly everyone has performed at some stage in their work life. And we are all consumers and self-appointed critics of food and service. Think how many Instagram pics of coffee/food we have posted. Fortunately, some people make a career in hospitality, and a few in that group have an amazing career.

Meet Emily Blades, resident of the Macedon Ranges, and the publican at The Victoria Hotel, Woodend.

Emily's career in hospitality started at the young age of 14 at the Roseville Golf Club, on Sydney's North Shore, where her father was a keen golfer. Young Emily had the responsibility to open up, set up, cash up and run events. A lot of responsibility at a young age, and it clearly gave her a great start; highlighted her talents and gave an insight to a future career.

Emily quickly learned the foibles and particular demands of politicians, rock stars and VIPs and that she didn't have much time to savour the view!

Environment grants

This year, Council is again offering Environment Group Support Grants in addition to new Community Climate Action Grants, in recognition of the significant contributions our community environment and sustainability groups make.

The Environment Group Support Grant Program aims to empower these groups through capacity building, weed control and biolink enhancement, all of which benefit the community and natural environment of the Macedon Ranges.

There are three categories of funding that eligible groups can apply for under the program: Landcare, Friends Groups and Network Support Funding; Strategic Weed Partnership Program; and Biolink Boost Grants.

The Community Climate Action Grants are designed to support groups in developing, implementing and evaluating projects that reduce community greenhouse gas emissions and adapt to climate change.

Council have collaborated with community partners Macedon Ranges Community Enterprises Limited and Bendigo Bank to match funding, providing an additional \$20,000. This boosts the funding available to \$40,000 each for both the Biolink Boost and Community Climate Action grants.

National Threatened Species Day

1-3pm, 6 September, Macedon Cemetery

Black Hill supports threatened species, including Clover Glycine and Brushtail Phascogales.

Electrify 3442 update

Electrify 3442 is about helping households install or upgrade six things: transport,

home heating and cooling, water heating, cooking, rooftop solar and home battery.

This month, we're looking at how our area's adoption compares with others.

Rooftop solar

3442 is one of the postcodes "leading the charge" on home solar.

- In 3442, 43.1% of homes have solar installed.
- In the Macedon Ranges, 37.9% of homes have solar installed.
- Victoria-wide, 28.3% of homes have solar installed.
- Electric vehicles
- At the end of January 2023:
- In 3442, 0.46% of vehicles registered were battery electric vehicles
- Victoria-wide, 0.39% of vehicles registered were battery electric vehicles.

3442 is ranked 157 out of 464 postcode areas in Victoria for EV registrations, placing 3442 in the top third of the state.

Home batteries

We hope to be able to share data on home battery installation in a future update.

It's more difficult to get information about household appliances. The Victorian Energy Upgrades program (where homeowners access rebates for upgrading to energy efficient equipment) records activities by postcode area, including the following:

Water heating

Between 1 January 2023 and 31 July 2024:

12 households in postcode 3442 were among
20759 across the state

who accessed rebates for upgrading from gas hot water to heat pump. The average benefit per claim in our area is currently approximately \$750.

Space heating

Since 1 January 2024:

- 18 households in 3442 were among
- 10,056 Victoria-wide

who accessed rebates for upgrading to high efficiency air conditioners for heating. The average benefit per claim in our area is slightly over \$4,000.

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Annual tree planting and elm leaf beetle programs underway

Council has begun its annual street tree planting and elm leaf beetle treatment programs, to improve and protect the Macedon Ranges natural environment.

Under the street tree planting program, a different town in the shire is typically prioritised each year, depending on available budget. Carefully selected tree species are planted at strategically chosen locations along streets to enhance a town's landscapes.

Acting Director Assets and Operations Simon Finlay said Kyneton would be prioritised for street tree planting this year, with planting set to occur between August and September - the cooler months - giving the trees the best opportunity of establishing through the following summer.

"Tree species are carefully selected, based on a range of factors to suit the location and are purchased from local nurseries," he said. "An extensive maintenance program is also put in place for the first two years to ensure they mature into healthy and structurally sound trees."

The tree planting program draws from independent arboriculture inspections and ensures that the community continues to receive the benefits offered by trees such as shade for pedestrians, improved noise and pollution absorption, improved mental health and enhanced streetscape appeal.

From new trees to existing trees; the Macedon Ranges is home to a significant and healthy population of about 2,400 elm trees. This year, elm trees in Romsey and Lancefield will be the focus of Council's elm leaf beetle treatment program, which will commence in the coming weeks.

The treatment will ensure that the elm trees in these areas are protected from damage and defoliation caused by the elm leaf beetle and remain healthy and vibrant.

The elm leaf beetle feeds on the leaves of elm trees, leaving distinctive round holes which, if left untreated, can severely weaken the trees, leading to reduced visual appeal, safety concerns and a shortened lifespan.

"Eradicating the elm leaf beetle is extremely difficult. Instead, we aim to keep the number of elm leaf beetles as low as possible and reduce the damage they cause by having a preventative maintenance program in place," Mr Finlay said.

Treatment includes spraying and injecting the soil around the tree's root zone with low-toxicity insecticide. This safe and effective method protects the trees for up to three years.

Soft plastic recycling pilot

If your general waste bin (red or dark green lid) looks like this, you may benefit from our exciting new soft plastic recycling service.

Residents and businesses who use Council's kerbside collection service can now recycle their soft plastic by collecting it in the Council-supplied orange collection bag and, when full like a basketball, place it in their recycling bin (yellow lid). Packs

can be collected from customer service centres.

All soft plastic items that carry the Australasian Recycling Label (ARL) - Return to Store symbol or REDcycle logo are accepted in this trial, this includes silver and foil-lined wrappers.

In a recent audit, we discovered that soft plastic takes up approximately 45 per cent of the general waste bin by volume. By sorting your soft plastic separately, you'll be contributing to diversion of waste to landfill.

Mixed media recycling

Council's resource recovery facilities (RRFs) now accept mixed media for recycling. You can bring in small amounts of the following:

- VHS tapes
- Cassettes
- DVDs/CDs
- Records
- Floppy discs

Council has partnered with Bendigo E-Waste to offer Macedon Ranges residents a recycling option for these tricky-to-recycle materials. This recycling initiative gives residents the opportunity to appropriately recycle these materials and keep them out of landfill, further increasing our landfill diversion rate.

Any items in good condition should be offered to your local op shop or the resale shops at Kyneton and Romsey RRFs.

Tonnes saved from landfill with new recycling initiatives

A huge thank you to the Macedon Ranges community who continue to support and use the recycling initiatives that we roll out across the shire.

Since last September, Council's textile recovery chutes at resource recovery facilities have recovered over 35 tonnes of textiles. This is incredibly impressive as these materials could have ended up in landfill, but instead are being recycled, upcycled, repaired and reused by Upcycle4Better.

Council also introduced a polystyrene collection in May 2023, and since then we've had approximately 700m3 dropped off for recycling. This means that over 700 cubic metres of polystyrene has been diverted from landfill, saving residents and Council landfill disposal costs.



Champions for Landcare

Did you know that Landcare was started right here in Victoria in 1986 by the late Joan Kirner AC and Heather

Mitchell?

Annually, there is a Victorian Landcare award in Joan Kirner's honour to recognise an individual who has been involved for at least ten years in championing Landcare and engaging the broader community to also get involved. This year Woodend Landcare's Nicole Middleton, out of twenty-seven applications, was one of five who received a commendation for her contributions. Penny Roberts, from Newham Landcare received a highly commended and John Walter from Malmsbury a commendation also.

Since moving to Woodend just over 10 years ago, Nicole has been a key member of Woodend Landcare: she is currently our Treasurer, and she has reinvigorated the Woodend Primary School Community Childrens Garden. As a botanist she has a love of plants and nature and enjoys teaching our younger generation about the environment around them, so they can become the Landcarers of the future. Nicole's passion and skills have meant the school garden project has grown each year. Her children have since moved on to high school, but she continues to

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Grants to recognise and support Victoria's veterans

Victorian veterans will be supported with grants for projects that honour their legacy, service and sacrifice and activities that improve their welfare and wellbeing.

Member for Macedon, Mary-Anne Thomas announced last month that applications had opened for Anzac Day Proceeds Fund and Victoria Remembers grants.

Anzac Day Proceeds Fund grants support a range of welfare and wellbeing activities for veterans in Victoria.

Grants of up to \$150,000 are available for ex-service organisations and veterans' community groups that plan to provide activities for veterans state-wide. Regional Honouring our Vietnam veterans

August 18 is Vietnam Veterans Day, the day that Vietnam veterans gather to commemorate all veterans who died in the war zone of Vietnam, those who have died since, those who suffer as a result of their service, and those who remain. The service also commemorates the support and understanding we receive from our families.

We honour all those who served in that chapter of Australian military history.

This year, as usual, members of the Central Highlands Branch of Vietnam (based at the Woodend RSL) held a service at our memorial in the grounds of the Mt. Macedon Memorial Cross Reserve. The Victoria Remembers Grants provide up to \$30,000 for projects that recognise veterans' service or educate Victorians about the sacrifices and contributions veterans make

"This funding will help ensure we continue to remember and honour the service and sacrifice of the veteran community in Macedon," said Ms Thomas.

Examples of projects that might be funded include new war memorials highlighting achievements of local veterans, events that commemorate significant anniversaries, and public education through digital storytelling methods - such as podcasts or websites.

A Victoria Remembers grant of more than \$28,000 last year funded a documentary that focused on veterans from the Williamstown Football Club, telling their personal stories and the story of their involvement in the club.

Applications for the grant programs are open until 9 September 2024.

L2P program keeps helping **young drivers**



The Macedon Ranges L2P Program continues to help young people gain mobility and independence by providing free supervised driving hours to young learner drivers without access to a supervising driver or vehicle.

The program matches eligible learner drivers with volunteer driver mentors who take them for drives in an L2P program vehicle.

Learner drivers can be eligible for the program for a variety of reasons, including having a single parent or carer with limited availability, or having disability or mental illness in the household.

In the past year, the Macedon Ranges L2P Program has supported 19 young learner drivers, provided 617 supervised driving hours and enabled seven local young people to achieve their probationary licence.

What's been going on in Woodend from a policing perspective for the last month or so?

We've been busy as always, talking to people, processing offenders, attending family violence situations as well as several serious collisions and crimes within the area.

I think I mentioned recently that the Railway Station is relatively safe. And it is, but we have had a few things occur of late, like bicycles being stolen. All I can say is, please make sure you lock things well, use the cage if you can - and while this isn't a guarantee its far better than leaving your bike on the platform.

It was disappointing that someone decided to steal the copper in the Macedon area last week (at the time of writing this article), and this unfortunately isn't as rare as you would think and can be an issue with the heating systems on the freeways for ice. But more importantly, it greatly affected Woodend, as it took out some of our critical telecommunications infrastructure. If you see anything suspicious in or around the freeway or Black Forest Drive, then please call 000, or if you have information on these or other thefts of copper, then call Crime Stoppers 1800 333 000.

Like most people, we all have things which "float our boat", so we dedicate time to them. As a Police Officer, children's safety is one of my big things. You would see our big white, car with red/blue lights and an old bloke in a Fluro vest, spending noticeable time in the Woodend School Zones. I'm disheartened that we still see people not adhering to school zones and I hear the same reasons time and time again, "Oh I drive this way every day and I was distracted/not concentrating". Despite what people think, this isn't about revenue raising, it's about the protection of the young and vulnerable; but also, the protection of you, CFA volunteers, Ambulance Victoria crews, the school community and my team. It's not a good day for anyone if they have to attend to an injured/sick child.

As ever, stay safe and warm, we have had some lovely days of recent times, and we should be heading into a warmer part of the year soon. It might be time to think about summer and your fire safety plans.

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Beat the chill and stay connected at your local library

Macedon Ranges residents are being encouraged to take advantage of the shire's four libraries as free 'warm spaces' and enjoy an abundance of literature and free activities during the colder months.

In partnership with Goldfields Libraries and Sunbury and Cobaw Community Health, Council is backing an initiative to utilise libraries at Gisborne, Kyneton, Woodend and Romsey during business hours, to help people reduce energy costs and stay connected throughout winter and beyond.

In addition to offering literature in different formats including books, eBooks and audiobooks, all four libraries also have free Wi-Fi, daily newspapers and free activities for all ages.

Goldfields Library Corporation's Manager Engagement and Operations, less Saunders, said in the current climate where many people are experiencing cost of living pressures, libraries were a great option for people to keep warm, participate in free activities and stay socially connected.

"Libraries are safe and inclusive spaces, and everyone is welcome to use them. You can stay all day in a comfortable warm environment, surrounded by friendly people, without needing to spend any money or worry about running up energy bills," she said.

This push also coincides with National Homelessness Week from 5-11 August with Council's Director Community, Maria Weiss, encouraging those experiencing homelessness to reach out for support and use libraries as a safe, warm space to help stay connected.

"We know providing public warm spaces doesn't solve the issue of homelessness, but it does go some way towards providing a safe space where people can feel connected to the community," Ms Weiss said. "That connection can also provide an opportunity to find out what other services may be available to them."

Support services are provided locally by Sunbury and Cobaw Community Health, with the organisation's Team Leader Housing Support and Financial Services, Kate Weston, saying they can assist anyone who is homeless or at risk of homelessness in the Macedon Ranges.

"We can also refer people to other services that the organisation offers such as counselling and family services," Ms Weston said. "The warm spaces initiative offers local community members a valuable source of support where they can access lots of useful information."

Exploring and facilitating warm, safe spaces for residents during times of extreme weather is a key action in Council's Climate Emergency Plan 2023-30, to assist with strengthening communities' collective resilience to climate change events.

Council has also committed to advocating for those experiencing or at risk of homelessness through its Affordable Housing Policy, which was adopted in June 2023, and its Municipal Public Health and Wellbeing Plan 2021-2025.

"Through these commitments, we are working closely with key stakeholders to support more affordable housing options and help address the issue of homelessness in our community, and to raise awareness of support services available," said Ms Weiss.

Come and visit our FireWise Garden.

Now that spring is here, why not take some extra care in selecting any new plants you are thinking of adding to your garden? And what better place to get some ideas than by visiting the "firewise" garden in front of the Woodend CFA Fire Station. This garden was created several years ago to give residents and visitors an idea of plants that are ideal for our local conditions.

Landscaping for bushfire involves planning, designing, planting and managing the area around a house. This incorporates five key principles:

- Create defendable spaces
- Remove flammable objects from around the house
- Break up fuel continuity
- Carefully select and locate plants within the garden
- Maintain the garden and interface with the house ٠
- Other key considerations in the design included: ٠
- No flammable objects close to the eaves or roofline
- No overhanging or bark-shedding trees
- Use of non-flammable hardscaping: steel edging, wide gravel paths and gravel mulch
- Short, well-maintained areas of lawn.

Factoring in the various firewise principles, the plant list for our garden consists of:

A single smooth-barked tree with an open canopy and no lower branches

- Well-spaced shrubs and ground covers
- Few fine-leafed or very dense plant species
- Few resinous or waxy plants
- Few plants which drop or retain dead material
- A mixture of native and exotic plants
- Plants to attract birds, butterflies and other pollinators

The Woodend CFA FireWise Garden is open to the public to come and visit.

Thousands more trees in the ground for local schools



The following matters were considered and endorsed at the July 2024 Council Meeting:

Endorsed following community consultation:

Gisborne Futures Structure Plan

The plan will guide Gisborne's development until 2050 and will set a protected settlement boundary to protect the surrounding landscape from further outward growth. It was developed following extensive planning and consultation over six years. A total of 129 submissions were received and considered during the most recent consultation period for the revised Plan in late 2023.

Council will now write to the Minister for Planning to request an amendment be prepared for the protected settlement boundary as indicated in the Plan.

Upcoming community consultations endorsed:

Draft Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) 2024 Building on Council's first Innovate

Reconciliation Action Plan 2021-23, a new draft RAP has been developed in consultation with the three Traditional Owner Groups in the Macedon Ranges. It continues the positive work from the previous RAP and provides further actions to help build stronger community connections and a deeper understanding and respect of First Nations People and cultures.

Draft Lancefield Master Plan 2024

Lancefield Park Recreation Reserve is on Crown Land and managed by a volunteer Committee of Management. It is an important asset within the community and provides Council-supported activities. Council recently assisted the committee to review and update their previous 2012 Master Plan to reflect the current needs of the community and inform future development and upgrades of facilities.

Council is seeking feedback on the draft Master Plan, on behalf of the Committee.

July 2024 Council Meeting wrap

Draft Macedon Ranges Community Equestrian Facilities Plan

The Macedon Ranges has one of the highest participation rates in recreational equestrian activities in Victorian LGAs. This Plan will provide clearer direction for the management and development of equestrian facilities across the shire.

Community feedback is invited from 25 July to 5 September 2024 to help inform the final plan.

Council grant programs:

2024-25 Community Funding Scheme (CFS) and the Neighbourhood House Funding Program (NHFP) 2024-26 allocations

A total of 29 applications were received for the 2024-25 CFS with officers recommending 20 applicants for funding totalling \$159,316. Seven applications were received through the 2024-26 NHFP with all of them recommended for funding and in-kind support totalling \$210,000 (\$35,000 cash contribution, \$178,367 in-kind). Both CFS and NHFP allocations for 2024-25 were within budget.

2024 Events and Festivals Grant Program allocations

Council received 15 applications requesting a total of \$94,064 plus in-kind support. With an annual allocation of \$75,000, and a portion already committed to multi-year agreements, \$50,000 of funding remained for distribution in this year's round of funding and officers recommended 12 applications to receive this. In-kind support including services and venue hire to the value of just under \$16,500 was also recommended.

In addition, a further \$14,500 was carried over from the 2020-21, 2021-22 and 2022-23 programs to support triennial events that had been postponed due to the COVID pandemic.

2024-25 Community Climate Action and Environment Group Support Grants Guidelines Council will continue to provide support and resources to local Landcare groups, environment groups and community climate action groups in the Macedon Ranges following the endorsement of the Guidelines and Terms of Reference for both the Climate Action and Environment Support Group grant streams.

The new Community Climate Action grants will support community groups to develop, implement and evaluate projects that are aligned with the objectives in Council's Climate Emergency Plan 2023-30. This new grant stream, as well as the Biolink Boost, are co-funded in partnership with Macedon Ranges Community Enterprises and Bendigo Bank.

Other matters:

Draft Gambling Harm Prevention Policy Council deferred consideration of this Policy to the 28 August 2024 Council Meeting.

Council also noted the results of its annual Community Satisfaction Survey, which provides a snapshot of local perceptions on a range of key service areas from a diverse cross-section of 400 Macedon Ranges residents.

Council considered a report in response to a petition received from the community calling for the acquisition of land at 18 Kilmore Road in Gisborne and resolved not to acquire the land, as the purchase would not align with Council's existing strategies and plans regarding conservation, biodiversity, or public open space.

Hello everyone. As we move into spring, we hope that you are all able to enjoy some sunnier and warmer weather and take advantage to keep it coming! of some of the outdoor activities and events our shire is renowned for. At a recent meeting, Council approved a range of Community Best wishes from your West Ward Councillors Mark, Janet, and Funding Scheme grants, along with the Events and Festivals lennifer. Grants program for 2024–25. Grants to Woodend organisations include \$10,000 to Woodend Neighbourhood House for the WNH Community Creative Outdoor Space, along with another \$12,000 for the Woodend Community Garden Hub revamp; \$3,386 went to the Woodend Men's Shed to help with their Strengthening Member and **N** Rotallieo Community Engagement program, and \$2,000 has been allocated to the Woodend Bowling Club for first aid equipment. Events and Festivals funding for 2025 included the third payment of the triennial grant to the Woodend Winter Arts Festival of \$10,000, and \$1,300 **Individual Tax Returns** to the Rotary Club of Woodend to support the Free Community Halloween Party for 2024.

Council also recently adopted the Community Climate Action Grants Guidelines and Environment Group Support Grants Guidelines. These grants include funding support for our various Landcare and Friends Groups across the shire.

One activity to watch out for is the upcoming provision of free infant and child first aid and CPR training, which is being made available across the shire as a collaboration of the Council's Maternal and Child Health team and the Sisterhood Project. The Sisterhood Project is a not-for-profit charity that partners with external CPR/first aid small business owners to provide training and free first aid care to vulnerable parents and carers across Victoria. Keep an eye on the Council website for further details once these sessions become available.

Thank you to all those who have contributed to the recent request for feedback on the Issues and Opportunities paper for the Woodend Racecourse Reserve. Although the formal closing date for submissions is 5 September, officers will often take late submissions for a few weeks after the formal consultation period finishes. If you still have suggestions that you wish to contribute, then contact Council on 5422 0333 and let them know that you wish to email a late submission.

It is estimated that every year, more than ten million native animals are killed on Australian roads. Recently, Macedon Ranges Shire Council partnered with Wildlife Victoria, the City of Greater Bendigo and Bass Coast Shire Council to better understand the problem of high wildlife tolls on our roads and identify effective solutions. So far in the Macedon Ranges, a community forum was held earlier this year and consideration of wildlife was included in the recently endorsed Mobility and Road Safety Strategy. In addition, a Wildlife Toll Reduction Toolkit has been produced to assist local governments with strategies to mitigate wildlife accidents. This is now available through Wildlife Victoria and the MRSC website at: https://www.mrsc.vic.gov.au/Live-Work/Environment/ Animals-of-the-Macedon-Ranges/Living-With-Wildlife#section-2.

With the Council elections fast approaching, we hope that you have taken the opportunity to check your enrolment details and update if necessary. Any updates needed to be completed by August 7, but details can still be checked with the VEC (Victorian Electoral Commission) at https://enrolment.vec.vic.gov.au/. This year, Council caretaker period begins on 17September, with the election period held through October, and close of voting at 6pm on Friday 25 October. Voting will be by mail, and only votes posted before the close of voting will be accepted. Results of the election must be finalised by November 15.

Finally, as your "West Ward Councillor group" we would like to thank everyone for your support, encouragement and contributions through this term of council. As a group, we have been energised and inspired by your ideas and feedback. Councillors depend very heavily on the advice we receive from residents, whether it be informal "supermarket chats" or carefully-prepared submissions on particular projects or issues. A feature of our Shire is the very high level of informed and valuable feedback that we receive from individuals and community organisations – so we encourage you all to keep it coming!

Backing more First Nations businesses

First Nations businesses i will be supported to grow and upskill, with the announcement of the new Victorian Aboriginal Business Investment Program.

Minister for Employment Vicki Ward recently visited Djaara's DUMAWUL Cultural Tourism and Creative Arts Hub in Bendigo to announce the new program as part of a \$10 million package to support First Nations businesses.

Aboriginal-owned and operated businesses in Macedon can apply for funding to support and expand their businesses, with grants of up to \$10,000 available to businesses for training and accreditation, mentorship, networking, marketing and access to expert advisory services.

Of the grant program, Member for Macedon Mary-Anne Thomas said, "This is a major boost for First Nations businesses here in Macedon, providing much needed support for them to grow and expand their businesses in the local community."

Businesses are also able to apply for grants of up to \$100,000 for purchasing new assets, planning and delivering business cases, conducting studies and specialist training.

The initiative is part of the Government's commitment to making rural and regional Victoria an even better place to live, work, stay and play and boosting local jobs and businesses in every corner of the state.

The \$10 million package also includes support for seven

Traditional Owner Corporations in regional Victoria – this will help to establish economic hubs where Aboriginal businesses can connect, access support and showcase their work. The Taungurung Land & Water Council will be part of this statewide regional package.

These initiatives will support communities to focus on connection to culture and Country and build on the Labor Government's commitment to self-determination and economic inclusion and prosperity.

Medical transport information session



Local youth mental health charity Live4Life is once again inviting everyone to break out their bathers and dive in for their annual fundraising swim challenge, LAP it UP.

LAP it UP 2024 will run for 4 weeks from 1-28 October, coinciding with World Mental Health Month. It's a fabulous opportunity to get fit while you swim laps for youth mental health awareness and suicide prevention in rural and regional communities.

Woodend father and son Mike and Jasper Selby took part last year, when LAP it UP raised over \$38,000. Both swim about once a week but found it helpful to have a buddy for the challenge.

"When one of us was lacking in enthusiasm to go for a swim, the other would show some encouragement. We certainly spurred each other on," said lasper.

Mike sees it as a great way to share a vital message. "Mental health awareness is so important - it fosters empathy and understanding among friends, family and colleagues. Live4Life is such a wonderful organisation and we both wanted to be part of LAP it UP to help bring mental health into the limelight."

LAP it UP has been a family affair from the beginning. In 2018, father and daughter Sean and Kirsten McKinney hosted an event at their local Gisborne pool to acknowledge the lives lost to suicide in the previous year. It was Sean's wish that the swim event would raise funds and help Live4Life grow to reach more communities. Today, LAP it UP continues the McKinneys' wonderful legacy.

Twelve thousand women and girls make their voices heard on pain

Thousands of women and girls across the state have shared their personal experiences of pain and its management to help shape the delivery of treatment, care and support for women in Victoria.

The response to the survey was overwhelmingly positive from women and girls across Victoria, including family members, carers and supporters as well as clinicians and healthcare workers.

At a local Women's Pain Forum in Gisborne, over 60 women shared their stories with local Member for Macedon and Minister for Health Mary-Anne Thomas about the daily impact pain conditions have on their lives.

Ms Thomas said of the program, "For too long women's pain has been overlooked, misdiagnosed and dismissed - we're taking action by listening to Victorian women and transforming how women's health is treated in Victoria."

Survey findings, along with written submissions and feedback from more than 20 community forum and focus groups, will inform recommendations to the Victorian Women's Health Advisory Council by the end of the year.

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Free degrees for our undergraduate nurses and midwives

Nursing and midwifery students may be eligible for free education under a new round of a State Government scholarship program.

Applications for the third round of the Undergraduate (entry to practice) scholarship program are now open, delivering free education for new domestic students enrolling in a professionalentry level nursing or midwifery course in 2023 and 2024.

The scholarship is part of the \$270 million Making It Free to Study Nursing and Midwifery initiative, which will provide scholarships worth up to \$16,500 to more than 10,000 nursing and midwifery students.

Member for Macedon Mary-Anne Thomas said the program provided aspiring nurses and midwives with financial support that allowed them to go into their important work without having to worry about the cost of their education. "We're investing in our hardworking nurses and midwives, because we know how important they are in making sure every Victorian gets the best care.'

The initiative also includes:

- Scholarships for postgraduate nurses to complete studies in specialty areas such as intensive care, emergency, paediatrics and cancer care worth an average of \$10,000
- \$11,000 scholarships for enrolled nurses to become registered nurses, covering course costs and boosting the number of registered nurses
- \$12,000 scholarships to support training and employment of 100 new Nurse Practitioners in both acute and community settings
- More than \$20 million to provide more support to the growing numbers of graduates and postgraduates as they transition to working in our hospitals ensuring they have access to the clinical educators, preceptors and study time they need.

A sign-on bonus of \$5,000 is also available to nursing and midwifery graduates who graduate in 2022, 2023 or 2024 and start their career in a Victorian public health service.

So far, more than 5600 graduate nurses and midwives have received the first half of their bonus, and more than 3600 new graduate nurses and midwives have chosen to start their careers this year in our public health system.

The program recognises that the cost of study is a financial burden for prospective and existing nurses and helps our health services maximise the recruitment of new nurses and midwives in key areas of need.

Giving young people the facts they need to stop vaping

A new initiative will see local councils, universities, sporting clubs and community organisations join forces to help stop young people vaping.

Minister for Health Mary-Anne Thomas has announced a \$2 million investment to deliver workshops, community events, and develop a peer-to-peer digital platform for young people aged 14 to 25 – to educate young people about the harms of vaping. The twoyear project is being delivered by the Victorian Health Promotion Foundation (VicHealth) in partnership with UNCLOUD, a digital platform that provides peer-reviewed and scientifically backed information about vaping and allows young people to share their stories with each other.

More than 30 local councils, including Macedon Ranges, Hepburn, Moorabool and Mount Alexander Shires, five sporting teams, and five universities will join the project by sharing the UNCLOUD platform at community events and activations.

Sporting bodies and teams including Swimming Victoria, Athletics Victoria, Melbourne Vipers, Deakin Melbourne Boomers and Hockey Club Melbourne will share and promote the UNCLOUD platform at sporting carnivals, youth holiday programs, events, and across social media platforms.

As part of the project, the Alcohol and Drug Foundation will upskill coaches at sporting clubs across Victoria with anti-vaping education.

Tertiary institutions including the University of Melbourne, Federation University, Monash University, Deakin University and Swinburne University of Technology will use the funding to establish student advocates, while others will others will offer education and training on-site to health staff.

VicHealth, Quit Victoria and the Department of Health will provide guidance and support to these organisations.

The Victorian Government will continue to work with the Commonwealth and other states and territories on the implementation of the Therapeutic Goods and Other Legislation Amendment (Vaping Reforms) Bill 2024. Banning retail sales and making vapes availableonly through pharmacies will ultimately keep vapes out of children's hands.

"We know the impacts vaping has on our health and this initiative will allow young people to learn about the risks – empowering them to make health-led decisions," said Ms Thomas of the project. "We're working with sporting clubs, universities, and all of our local councils across Macedon to share anti-vaping messaging to the community."

Turn trash into treasure at Romsey's new resale shop

Locals and visitors to Romsey will soon have a new way to recycle unwanted items and an alternative to buying new, boosting Victoria's recycling capacity as part of the transition to a thriving circular economy.

Member for Macedon Mary-Anne Thomas, representing Minister for Environment Steve

Dimopoulos, officially opened the Romsey ReSale Shop at the Romsey Resource Recovery Centre recently. Locals and visitors will have the opportunity to donate old or unwanted household items for resale at low cost—keeping more waste out of landfill.

Romsey's new centre is one of 67 projects supported by the \$5.9 million Circular Economy Councils Fund, helping to divert more waste from landfill while increasing the volume of material reused, repaired and recycled.

Donated goods will be resold at reasonable prices, with the centre accepting items such as furniture, camping gear, toys, and kitchenware. The shop also features a builders' yard for timber, pipes, posts, and



metal sheets to be repu and small projects.

The Macedon Ranges Shire Council also received funding to upgrade the Kyneton Resale Shop, adding new shelving and a sorting room for volunteers to test and repair items before resale. Since reopening just six months ago, the Kyneton shop has diverted an impressive 1.5 tonnes of goods from landfill.

Sun's shining thanks to solar home savings

Thousands of families have been able to slash an annual \$279 million off their energy bills – with more than five million individual solar panels installed on rooftops, through the Solar Homes program.

As of last month, Solar Homes has been responsible for the delivery of 2 gigawatts of power across Victoria.

The program represents 13 per cent of the total renewable capacity installed in the state, with its solar panels having cumulatively generated 6.5 gigawatt hours of power – enough cheap renewable energy to power every fridge in Victoria for almost two years.

The program has seen 350,000 solar panel, hot water, and solar battery systems installed through rebates and interest-free loans.

The Macedon electoral district represents over 4480 solar panel, hot water, and solar battery systems installed since the program began in 2018.

The last 12 months have been Solar Homes' biggest, with 7,873 approved applications last month – including 4,435 rooftop solar approvals and 3,125 solar hot water approvals.

Eligible households can access a \$1,400 rebate to install solar panels, a further \$1,400 interest free loan and a further rebate of up to \$1,000 to replace their hot water system – cutting \$3,800 from upfront installation costs.

Customers who maximise their solar can save around \$1,000 each year on their energy bill. Combined with hot water, heat pump savings can be up to \$1,400 a year or at least \$1,600 with a battery.

Victorians are taking control of their energy bills with solar now installed on 30 per cent of Victorian homes – a significant increase from 14 per cent when the Solar Homes program started six years ago. Since then, the program has also supported 5,500 jobs and delivered free training for plumbers and electricians to upskill. SUBMITTED BY KATE LEE, OFFICE OF MARY-ANNE THOMAS MP

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Preparing Macedon schools for bushfire season

Schools across Victoria will be well-prepared for the upcoming bushfire season by providing grants to slash vegetation growth and reduce the risk of fire.

Member for Macedon Mary-Anne Thomas announced last month that 22 local schools are among the 332 schools across 348 campuses that would share in \$8.412 million to carry out essential maintenance work through the Bushfire Preparedness (Vegetation) Program (BPVP).

The program was introduced in 2018 to help schools undertake essential vegetation clearance around school buildings prior to the bushfire season and in accordance with municipal fire danger periods.

Schools receiving funds are listed on the Bushfire at Risk Register (BARR), with the work aimed at mitigating the risk of harm to the school's community and buildings in the event of a bushfire.

The BPVP also provides a School Support Program, where an accredited Bushfire Planning and Design consultant visits a school twice a year to help them prepare for the upcoming bushfire season while also making sure they complete a Vegetation Management Plan every 3 years.

Ms Thomas said that preparing our schools means staff and students can feel safe and prepared during the warmer months. "Hopefully these works can ease any worries they may have during bushfire season."

Boost for football and netball in the region



A Most Desirable Property

'Wednesday morning's fire completely ruined everything and left nothing standing but the bare chimneys' wrote the Woodend Star on 11 November 1905. Mayfield, owned then by Benjamin Barnes, was a large timber Victorian house built in the 1880s, probably by William Godden. However, in 1888, a new owner, Mr J. J. Stammers, auctioned the property, as he was leaving the area. He had added to the house and started to run a summer holiday business. The auction included many household items, two 'useful harness horses, two well-bred cows', fowls, ducks and farm machinery.



The house comprised twelve rooms and, said the Star, 'was prettily situated in a lane connecting the main roads to Kyneton and Newham, and surrounded by a well-kept garden.' Its 'homelines' attracted attention.

A young man, W. Halliday, who was working at the railway yard, saw the huge blaze

to the north of the town, and rang the firebell vigorously. The fire brigade members arrived quickly but were powerless to guench the flames, not even unrolling their reel and hose. Instead, they, and many townsfolk, tried to help the Barneses in whatever way they could. Only some clothing and blankets were saved.

In 1905, Edward Savage bought the property and had architect Mr W. T. Tonks of Kyneton and local builder Mr D. M. Simpson build a new residence. In August 1906, The Star announced that the Savage family had moved from town to their new house. The eight-roomed weatherboard construction in the Queen Anne design made Mayfield, according to the Star, 'one of the most desirable properties in the district'.

In 1941, Isabella Bain Smith, nee Brake, bought Mayfield. Isabella had studied osteopathy in Missouri, USA, graduated in 1904, and returned to work in Victoria as the first American-trained osteopath to do so. She married James Edward Smith in 1916, and upon her retirement, the family moved to Mayfield. Her daughter Margaret married Arthur Baker and they continued to live at Mayfield for many years.

Emma was a strong supporter of the local Presbyterian church and Robert was a councillor in the mid-1930s and delivered the mail for many years. Their daughter, Linda, also delivered the mail to Newham and Cobaw for several years. Later she trained as a nurse and became well known as Sister Linda Haslett.



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Welcoming our Japanese sister school

On 30 July, Sacred Heart College welcomed 19 students and two teachers from its Japanese sister school, Ibaraki Nishi High School; the first visit to Australia from the Sister School since 2018. The travellers left a balmy 35 degrees in Osaka to come to our chilly Kyneton winter, but there were warm smiles all round when host families met their exchange students for the first time.

Over the first week, the Japanese students joined various classes with their hosts, participated in an EAL (English as Additional Language) lesson and attended the Academic Awards Assembly. They also learned a lot about Australian school life by doing day to day things such as catching the bus and visiting the school canteen. The first week culminated with an excursion to the city with the Years 9-12 SHC Japanese classes, including visits to the Melbourne Museum and Queen Victoria Markets, with activities designed to get the students speaking to each other in both Japanese and English. It was wonderful to hear all the chatter and laughter.

The second week of the exchange began with a visit to Our Lady of the Rosary Primary School. The Japanese exchange students taught various Japanese crafts, games and



dances to the children in the Grade 1 and Grade 5/6 classes. Throughout the rest of the week, the Japanese students participated in a variety of classes at the College, including Animal Studies, Hospitality and Food Technology, where they were able to try their hand at Aussie culinary classics such as scones, Chiko Rolls and kangaroo wraps.



Later in the week, a farewell pizza lunch was held for goodbye speeches and to present the Japanese students with souvenirs. On the morning of departure, host families came to say their final goodbyes and tears were shed by the Japanese students, host students and their families. The connections between the exchange students and their hosts were evident, and we are sure these will be maintained over time. We are so grateful to the generous SHC host families who opened their homes to the Japanese students, and to the broader SHC community who made them feel very welcome.

The signing of an official sister school agreement between Ibaraki Nishi High School and Sacred Heart College was an important part of this year's exchange. This document ensures a close and lasting relationship between the two schools, including ongoing reciprocal visits. We look forward to reuniting with our Japanese friends in Osaka in 2025.
