### Meet Eriko and Gareth, owners of Kuzu and ZenZen restaurants.

Eriko Pannam was born and raised in Yamaguchi, Japan, famed for its beautiful castles and some of the country's best seafood. She studied Communications and em-barked on a career in advertising. "Work/life balance" isn't found in many corporate job ads in Japan, and, at the age of 24, Eriko found herself working six days per week, often until 2am, then sleeping in the office to be ready for the next day's meetings. When she achieved her sales targets, they were promptly doubled, and the future was looking exhausting. Time for a circuit breaker, and with the encouragement of her parents, she got a working holiday visa to Australia. Not surprisingly, she loved the Australian lifestyle and more relaxed approach to work and was soon looking at the list of skills needed in Australia. At the time, it was chef, hairdresser and pastry chef. Eriko's ex-tended family had a strong interest and experience in food as grocers, fishmongers and wonderful home cooks, so it was no surprise she chose the chef path. Off to study at William Angliss, she then applied for permanent residency and was soon cooking in Melbourne's restaurants. Initially her cooking was focused on European menus, until someone contacted her about working in a Japanese restaurant. She was interested but needed to get some intensive training back home in Japan. Her great-uncle arranged a mini "MBA" in Japanese cooking, which began with 3am trips to the fish markets before she could start thinking of food preparation. Now Eriko goes back when she can, to top up her Japanese culinary skills, and following the philosophy of "manabu" - to constantly learn and improve.

When Eriko and her husband and young baby moved to the Macedon Ranges, she started working at a popular Macedon pizza restaurant. Around this time, Baringo Food and Wine Co. was opening up in Gisborne.

Meet Gareth Rowlands.

Gareth grew up in the Macedon Ranges and like many, he "fell into hospitality" and found a skill and passion for it. A gap year after school took him to Port Douglas, working at the Sheraton Mirage hotel. He also followed the trail of Aussies to London and was soon working in prestigious hotels, climbing the corporate ladder into general management, and working in pressured seven-day businesses. After a few years away, Gareth came home to his family in the Macedon Ranges.

While working casually at Colenso, (now the location for Kuzu) Gareth was approached to join the Baringo opening team in Gisborne; an exciting time, with a new café, bar and restaurant to set up. Gareth's skills in management and front of house were well utilised and were a great step to going out on his own.

Meanwhile, Eriko's mother-in-law thought that her daughter in-law's talent could be better utilised and secretly sent Eriko's resume off to Baringo. Gareth immediately contacted Eriko and she soon started as the two-nights-a-week Japanese chef.

They worked together for the next two years until the Baringo business was sold. Sharing the same ethos about hospitality and their love for making customers happy, their skills complemented each other. A restaurant space became available in Woodend, and after many conversations, they signed a lease in December 2017.

The next project was three months of hard work for Gareth and Eriko, their families and tradie friends. Favours were called in and payments made in beer and food, and finally the Izakaya, (Japanese pub-style restaurant) was ready to open. They thought there would be a soft opening, but this was the "worst kept secret" and locals were quick to book in. Ambitious business plans meant they were open five days per week for lunch and dinner.



When Covid came around and lockdowns started, Gareth and Eriko actually felt a strange relief, a chance to "get off the treadmill" for a while and have a break. The forced pause gave them time to reflect over a six-week shutdown and then to shift to a takeaway business. Customers were extremely patient as they figured it out, and recalled the first Mother's Day - a "disaster" with long delays and the day ending in tears and exhaustion. But they gradually got the hang of it and locals were delighted to be able to treat themselves to Kuzu takeaway throughout the pandemic.

Surviving Covid led to the opening of ZENZEN in 2021, bringing the vibe of "Yatai" (a Japanese street food stall) to Gisborne, with a more casual and laid-back dining experience. They could afford to pay their tradie friends this time, to refurbish this former Chinese restaurant. With a bigger kitchen and more storage space also comes the challenge of finding more staff. Hospitality staff shortages are well-known and it's not uncommon for family and friends to be called in to do a shift or two.

What are some of their secrets for doing well in these challenging times? Closing the restaurant three days and having Sunday off gives them important time with family and friends. Thursday is dedicated for Eriko and Gareth to focus on the business and have time to talk and strategise. What keeps them going? "Feeling the love from the local community".

### **Entrepreneurs on show**

A Woodend resident demonstrated his startup idea last month for an appreciative audience at a special showcase for aspiring businesspeople in the region.

Woodender Matt Grant was one of 39 people from ten local government areas who participated in the free, 13-week Pre-Accelerator program, run by Startup Central Victoria.

Matt said that the program was a great opportunity to turn his big idea into something real, give him access to mentors and local experts and masterclasses to bring the idea to life.

During the Showcase event last month, hosted by futurist Steve Sammartino, Matt presented his idea, "Tinkeru" – a web platform that builds community around car "tinkering", providing DIY car mechanics with the knowledge and tools needed to fix and maintain

Steve Sammartino said of Matt's presentation, "I love that Tinkeru recognizes that we irrevocably live in a physical world ... It acknowledges that things still need to be built and fixed, in many ways going against the modern ethos of a throw-away society. This is especially true when it comes to modern tech ..."

Matt is excited to see where his idea and the rest of his cohort go from here. "This experience has been invaluable," he said.

### Refugee icon to speak at national conference

Behrouz Boochani, journalist and opponent of Iran's oppressive regime, will appear as keynote speaker at a national conference this

Mr Boochani was forced to flee his homeland when the offices of his magazine Werya were raided by the Islamic Revolutionary Guard. When intercepted by the Australian Navy as he was making a crossing of the Timor Strait he was detained on Christmas Island before being transferred to Manus Island. He would be imprisoned

Boochani's mobile phone became his most valued possession. It enabled him to contact advocacy groups and fellow journalists and to file reports on the abuses occurring on the island. These reports would form the basis of his award-winning prison memoir, No Friend But The Mountains.

Boochani's arrival on Christmas Island caused him to miss, by only a few days, a deadline imposed by the Rudd government. He was denied the opportunity to settle in Australia but, in July 2020, he was granted refugee status by the New Zealand government. He is now a Research Fellow at the University of Canterbury.

With his new-found legal status, Behrouz Boochani can now set foot on Australian shores. He will appear as keynote speaker at the opening night of the Rural Australians for Refugees 2024 national conference to be held at the Kyneton Town Hall on Friday 11th

The conference will be compered by former ABC presenter Derek Guille and will include an appearance by former UNHCR Commissioner Gillian Triggs. Organisers expect heavy demand for tickets and urge anyone interested to book early.

Rotary Club of Woodend members were delighted to welcome Sergeant David Arnold, officer in charge at Woodend Police Station, as the speaker at our first meeting in September at The Vic. Sergeant Arnold arrived on the night in uniform, wearing some of his kit, having warned us beforehand that he feared an unruly crowd at the weekly Rotary meeting! But we're pretty sure the sergeant found us quite well behaved.

Sergeant Arnold gave us some highlights of his VicPol career in policing, which spans 34 years; he shared his thoughts on the ups and downs of country policing, before answering questions from

Sergeant Arnold's work took him across Melbourne's north and west, including plain clothes and detective roles in some highprofile operations before he became a sergeant in 2006. He shifted operations to the regions for five years in Wangaratta/ Wodonga and returned briefly to Melbourne before moving to the Macedon Ranges, where he has remained – leaving aside a health hiccup - joining Gisborne station in 2018 and becoming sergeant in charge at Woodend station in March 2020.

The change of pace has been real, he told us. Unlike many city stations and those in urban fringe towns, the entire regular Woodend team is small; just Sergeant Arnold and one other officer, and they're kept too busy with patrolling to be able to open the station often. The upside of the small police force is it can indicate a relatively low crime rate.

Sergeant Arnold said he likes to keep a handle on what's going on in the town, both on social media and offline. We know he's not one to keep out of sight; he can be seen out and about often, whether it be out on patrol, treading the footpath of High St chatting to the locals, or a glimpse of navy blue at the farmers market. We are glad to have spent some time getting to know our local sergeant. Thanks for speaking to us!

### **Woodend Landcare** update

### Planting day – Help protect our black gum

9am-12pm, Sunday 13 October: Five Mile Creek near Jeffreys St.

You may have noticed areas between the Woodend Tennis Club and Jeffreys Street have been prepared for revegetation over the last 12 months. There are a number of mulched areas and some have already been planted with understorey plants, thanks to the 1st Woodend Scout Group.

The aim of this project is to protect the Black Gum trees (Eucalyptus aggregata). In Victoria this eucalyptus species only grows within 4km of Woodend, so you could call it Woodend's floral emblem. Many mature trees at this site were blown over during the wind event of June 2021 and the remaining trees are in danger due to soil compaction and future climate extremes.

To protect the remaining black gums we are providing them with a buffer of understorey habitat and weed-free, mulched ground to enable self-propogation.

Starting at 9am, on Sunday 13 October, Woodend Landcare with help from our local Scouts, MRSC staff and anyone who would like to join in, will be planting a further 700 indigenous plants in these areas. This planting will complement that already undertaken by the Scouts near the Scout Billabong.

This project will continue until all the mulched areas are progressively filled with plants over the next few years.

Everyone is welcome to come along and contribute to this this project, creating another beautiful area along our creek.

### **Future working bee**

If helping our native vegetation by attacking invasive weeds is more your thing, Landcare will be holding its monthly working bee on the south side of the creek between Bowen and Wood Streets two weeks later, at 9am on Sunday 27 October. ### Soft plastic recycling pilot



Council's shire-wide soft plastic recycling pilot program allows residents to recycle their soft plastic conveniently in their kerbside recycling bin. All soft plastic items that carry the Australasian Recycling Label (ARL) – Return to Store symbol or REDcycle logo are accepted.

If you'd like to participate, visit your nearest Council customer service centre; Council's resource recovery facilities in Kyneton, Romsey and Woodend; Kyneton Toyota Sports & Aquatic Centre or Gisborne Aquatic Centre to collect an information pack, which includes a letter and 20 orange collection bags.

If you have large amounts of soft plastics such as animal feed bags or plastic wrap from electrical goods, or you are not on Council's kerbside service, you can take your soft plastic to a Council resource recovery facility for recycling.

The soft plastic collected in the pilot program will be sent to specialist processors in Victoria to make new plastic products locally, which supports our objectives to reduce waste to landfill, and lower greenhouse gas emissions and litter.

### **Vineyards** turn green into gold

Suburban green waste improves yield and helps wine grapes thrive, trial shows

A Melbourne Water trial at Macedon Ranges vineyards



Evaluation of the three-year trial, funded by Sustainability Victoria and delivered by Melbourne Water, has shown recycled organic green waste mulch applied under vines during spring leads to soil temperatures that are just right - moister soil, and fewer weeds. This 'Goldilocks zone' refers to the optimal range of soil temperatures for vine growth and grape production.

"The result is higher yields and reduced need for chemicals compared to conventional practices such as brush cutting, herbicides, or application of other mulch types such as straw," said Karen Thomas, Sustainable Agriculture Facilitator, Melbourne Water.

"This is great news for the wine industry, and the environment. We hope it will encourage other vineyards to look at using high-quality composted green waste made to vineyard specifications."

The results from the project include a cost-benefit analysis, which shows increased grape yields can offset the cost of purchasing composted green waste if the green waste mulch has high nitrogen

Melbourne Water has launched a digital mulch calculator for vignerons who want to calculate how much mulch is needed for under vine area and how much it will cost.

Ms Thomas says the trial demonstrates Melbourne Water's role as a Catchment Management Authority, responsible for delivering projects that benefit food production, improve biodiversity and champion land stewardship. We're working with farmers to expand climate-smart, sustainable agricultural practices aimed at boosting food production, caring for land and protecting biodiversity," she

Soil temperature measurements showed the composted green waste mulch created cooler soil in summer and warmer in spring, meaning roots have a longer time in the 'Goldilocks' soil temperature zone vital for healthy vines.

Hesket Estate is one of two Macedon Ranges vineyards that participated in the trial. Operating at high altitudes, Hesket Estate is among the coldest vineyards in mainland Australia.

"These conditions allow for the production of outstanding cool climate wines, but also means vineyards in the region are susceptible to extreme weather," said Ms Thomas.

"These highly labour-intensive vineyards need a reliable method to increase the time vine roots and grapes can spend at beneficial temperatures, and this trial shows that composted green waste mulch is a cost-effective solution," she said.

Hesket Estate grape grower Elizabeth Hudspeth said of the trial, "It has been very interesting to see how composted green waste mulch can improve soil water retention, increase nutrients, and reduce







### Change your clock, change your smoke alarm battery

Daylight Saving Time begins at 2am (AEST) on Sunday 6 October.

When you change your clock you should also change your smoke alarm battery. The CFA recommends that all Victorians should replace their smoke alarm batteries around the time that they set their clocks forward for daylight saving - which is NOW.

The message is quite simple: only working smoke alarms save lives. If there's no sound from your smoke alarm, there's no warning.

Special smoke alarms are also available for people who are deaf or

### Here are some interesting fire facts about bedrooms

- A recent CFA survey of Victorians revealed less than 20% of Victorians have smoke alarms in or near their bedrooms. Fewer than 50% do not have a smoke alarm in any living room.
- If fire breaks out in your bedroom and the door is shut, the hallway smoke alarm will not activate until the fire has burned through the door, which will be too late.
- Smoke will not wake you in fact, it will put you into a deeper sleep. When asleep, your sense of smell is largely diminished, and you are unlikely to smell smoke.
- Think about all the items we now find in bedrooms that could catch alight - from rechargeable battery products to electronic devices and heaters.

### The importance of a working smoke alarm

- Without a working smoke alarm, you may not get the chance to safely escape. Quite simply, they could save you and your
- On newer systems, smoke alarms should be interconnected, so when any alarm activates, all smoke alarms will sound.
- Smoke alarms should be tested monthly by pressing the test button on the alarm and waiting for the test alarm to sound.
- Smoke alarms should be cleaned with a vacuum cleaner or dusted at least once a year to remove particles that will affect smoke alarm performance. Replaceable batteries in a smoke alarm need to be changed yearly.
- Smoke alarms, including those attached to mains power, should be replaced every 10 years.

Spring has sprung, and with it our return to the great outdoors. As we start spending more time outside with our fur babies, we may see an increase in allergies. Yes, our doggos can suffer from spring allergies just like us. Pollen, grass and mould seem to thrive in the spring and the most common signs are itching, sneezing and coughing, along with runny nose, watery eyes and skin irritations. Yep, just like us.

So, what can we do to limit their exposure?

Thanks for all your support. One for the diary is our annual Christmas market on 7 December in Macedon. It is scary but it will be here before vou know it!



### **Sexual and Reproductive Health Hub in Kyneton to** open in October

Work to open Kyneton Health's Sexual and Reproductive Health Hub to the community is progressing, with an expected launch in

From October, the Sexual and Reproductive Health Hub in Kyneton will provide access to free Sexual and Reproductive Health (SRH) clinical services and information in a locally established, supportive and confidential environment.

It will be staffed by experienced SRH Nurses, partnering with GPs, Nurse Practitioners, Advanced Practice Nurses and Specialist

The services will include:

- Sexual health education: Screening, and management of sexually transmitted infections (STIs) and blood-borne viruses, as well as cervical screening tests with options for self-collection or
- Contraception services: Providing information and counselling on all methods, alongside prescription services, injection delivery, implant insertion and removal, IUD insertion and removal, post-insertion checkups, and emergency
- Reproductive health care: Pregnancy testing, pregnancy options counselling, and supported access and referral to services covering both medical and surgical termination of pregnancy, as well as follow-up care.
- Our service is for people from any geographical location within Victoria requiring sexual and reproductive health services
- Women, girls, and non-binary people of reproductive age
- Young people of any gender under the age of 25

In late June, Kyneton Health was selected as one of the final six Women's sexual and reproductive health hubs in Victoria joining the current network of 14 hubs that are already delivering free or lowcost care.

This means-tested, Victoria-only scheme offers the following rebates if eligible:

### **Solar Panel Rebates & Interest-**Free Loan

- A \$1,400 rebate to reduce the cost of installing solar panels.
- An additional \$1,400 interest-free loan is also available.

### **Battery Storage Interest-Free**

• An interest-free loan of \$8,800 for installing battery storage solutions.

### **Heat Pump Rebates**

• Solar Victoria offers a \$1,000 rebate for installing energy-efficient heat pump systems, which can significantly reduce your energy consumption.

Note: These rebates are reviewed and may decrease each financial year.

### **Small-scale Technology Certificates**

STCs are part of a federal government initiative and support both solar and heat pump hot water installations across Australia. There is no eligibility, every business and homeowner can access them.

### **How It Works:**

The amount you receive varies depending on the year and the size of the installation. For example, installing a 10kW solar system could earn you over \$3,500 towards your installation costs. These rebates are reduced every calendar year.

### **Victorian Energy Efficiency Certificates (VEECs)**

VEECs are part of the Victorian Energy Upgrades program, which encourages energy-efficient upgrades. This program focuses on what you decommission and what you replace it with.

The incentives available depend on the

appliance being decommissioned and the specifications of its replacement. It's the more complex of the incentives.

### **Common Applications:**

- · Replacement of a ducted gas heater with a reverse cycle air conditioner.
- Replacement of a gas hot water system with a heat pump hot water
- · Replacement of an electric element hot water system with a heat pump hot water system.

Incentives can range from \$350 to \$4,000, depending on the situation.

### The following matters were considered and resolved at the August 2024 Council Meeting, held on 28 August 2024:

Gambling Harm Minimisation Policy This item was considered and an alternate motion passed at the meeting, however a Notice of Rescission motion has since been lodged - see separate media statement, also issued on 30 August 2024.

Adopted following community consultation:

Macedon Ranges Heritage Strategy 2024-2034 The strategy was adopted following earlier community and stakeholder engagement, including a four-week public consultation in June 2024. It outlines how Council will manage, protect, and celebrate the unique heritage of the region.

In the most recent public consultation period, 11 submissions were made by the community and key stakeholders including The National Trust, member groups of the Macedon Ranges Heritage Council, Registered Aboriginal Parties, and the Victorian Goldfields World Heritage Bid team. Minor updates to the strategy were made as a result.

Barkly Square Multipurpose Facility Location Council endorsed a preferred western option for a new multipurpose facility at Kyneton's Barkly Square, following earlier community consultation.

A total of 71 online submissions were received, with overwhelming support for the western option location. Council will now progress with the design of the future facility, with construction subject to future budget funding.

Other matters:

Plan for Victoria submission Council endorsed a submission to the Victorian Government's Plan for Victoria proposal, relating to a new land use strategy that will guide how Victoria grows and develops in the period to 2050.

Council's submission outlines how the Plan should support the Macedon Ranges community, economy, environment and

Council reinforces that Plan for Victoria must have regard for the Macedon Ranges' status as a declared distinctive area and landscape and ensure the continued implementation of the Macedon

Ranges Statement of Planning Policy. Council's submission also references the importance of Council's priority projects, Climate Emergency Plan (2023-2030) and other recently endorsed key township plans, including the Riddells Creek Movement Network Plan (2024-2033), Kyneton Movement Network Plan (2024-2033), Gisborne Futures Structure Plan (July 2024) and Romsey Structure Plan (May 2024).



Community Awards Review Council endorsed a change to the timing and format of the annual Community Awards, to better align and streamline the process alongside other relevant annual

Under the changes, from 2025 onwards, the Community Awards – and others such as the annual Youth Awards - will be held together in May to coincide with National Volunteer Week. Categories will be refined to allow for a broader range of activities and age groups in the community to be recognised.

Management of unsealed roads within township boundaries - Council endorsed a report containing recommendations for the future management of unsealed roads within township boundaries.

Council manages about 860 kilometres of unsealed roads, with about 76 kilometres of those within township boundaries. Over the past five years, factors such as floods, storms and increased traffic have caused a significant rise in the number of requests for maintenance to unsealed roads.

Recommendations included undertaking an unsealed road network condition audit to inform the future management of Council's unsealed road network; trialling a 'Light Pavement and Spray Seal' solution for suitable unsealed roads within township boundaries; and proceeding with a Special Charge Scheme process for Noonan Grove in Woodend under the previous policy.

Grants of up to \$4,000 are also up for grabs to help clubs delivering a new sport or active recreation program.

Clubs can also apply for grants of up to \$1,000 to purchase uniforms and equipment, and \$750 travel grants are available to help clubs participate in competitions away from home.


The Sporting Club Grants Program has injected more than \$17 million into thousands of community sport and recreation clubs across the state since 2015.

### **School Saving Bonus will** help busy families

Families in the district will be able to spend the School Saving Bonus on more when the Victorian Government's once-off \$400 bonus becomes available later this year to all students at government schools and eligible non-government school students.

Mary-Anne Thomas announced that the School Saving Bonus which can cover the costs of uniforms, camps, excursions, and other extracurricular activities through the year - can also be spent on

The \$400 School Saving Bonus can be accessed later this year, so families have time to plan and budget for the 2025 school year.

The once-off bonus will be available in November 2024, and will be applied for each child, so a family with three school children will receive \$1,200 in support to spend on school costs.

No family with a child in a government school will need to apply for their bonus: it is free, automatic and universal.

In Term 4, families will receive a code granting them access to the bonus. They will get to choose how much of the funds they want allocated to a uniform and textbook voucher, and how much they want to use on school activities - like camps, sports, excursions, graduations, and other eligible programs.

The voucher for uniforms and books will be redeemable at a schoolapproved uniform or textbook supplier, while funds that families allocate to school activities will be managed through the school.

The voucher can be combined if families have children at different schools but use the same supplier for uniforms and textbooks. Families can also use the voucher to buy second-hand uniforms and textbooks directly from schools.

Non-government school families who are eligible for the meanstested Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (including healthcare and concession card holders) are eligible for the School Saving Bonus. Their application process will be the same as that for the Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund.

For families of students at non-government schools, the \$400 will be provided directly to each school – to be managed in consultation with the student's family and in line with the intent of the program.

Ms Thomas said, "Our \$400 School Saving Bonus will help ease the pressure on household budgets - and help local students get the most from their education."




### Don't forget the Social Calendar!

### Charcoal burners - once a very important industry

Bull boars, cheese, claret, hard-boiled eggs and bread was the staple diet of many charcoal burners in the Macedon Ranges. From the late 1800s until after World War II, many small-scale and larger burners operated in the forest. Some built a hut near their kiln from the timber at hand and, sometimes, with an iron roof.

Charcoal was made in kilns, called retorts. Styles varied, but the most common was a number of logs stood up in a cone shape, with a tube of stringy bark in the middle and kindling at the bottom. The fire was lit by pouring hot coals through the tube at the top. When burning well, the hole would be covered with earth to exclude air. The burners had to ensure that the fire did not break out of the kiln, when they would have to shovel more earth on to seal the hole. Wood that is burned without oxygen becomes charcoal, which was burnt. forges by blacksmiths and in in furnaces instead of coal.

When the smouldering logs had become charcoal, they were removed, crushed and bagged. In larger operations, the kilns were made from bricks and metal. In his memoirs, John Hickey from East Trentham, with help from brother Bill, remembered many of the burners; Bill Taylor who only had one leg and had a hut at the back of the Hickey farm; Jack Birrane of Ashbourne, who stacked the wood in a huge hole like a dam, covered it with tin and then dirt, which all had to removed when the charcoal was ready. Some of the burners were Italian.

In about 1934, Caesar and Tony Nesa came from Rome to Australia to escape the call-up. Tony's hobby was making walking sticks from wattle roots, which he sent to old people's homes and hospitals. For many years, the remains of their huts were highlighted in spring by flowers such as daffodils and jonquils. Charcoal burning was hard, particularly for the Italians with little English. With the introduction of gas and electricity, the need for charcoal declined, leaving only the remains of huts and retorts until even they were obliterated by
