Local Navy Veteran to MC Dawn **Service**

Kyneton Navy Veteran Luke Bordonaro will lead this year's Mount Macedon Anzac Day Dawn Service, which will take place on April 25 at the Mount Macedon Memorial Cross.

This year's theme, 'The Unseen Wounds of Conflict', will explore the many impacts that war has on those who serve, from the physical injuries to the mental effects and the wider repercussions for families.

Luke, who joined the Royal Australian Navy in 2003 and served on HMAS Newcastle, Cerberus, Maitland, Ararat, Sydney IV and Hobart III attaining the rank of Petty Officer, said this year's theme was particularly close to his heart and he was honoured to be involved in the 2025 service.

"The unseen wounds of conflict and service can leave lasting scars on a veteran's mind and soul, often resulting in struggles that extend far beyond the deployments," said Luke, a father of two.

"Personally, the ability to regulate my acute stress response – once essential for survival in my role - became a challenge in everyday life; leading to hypervigilance, anxiety, and difficulty in high-stress situations. Additionally, adapting to civilian life presented its own battles, as the structure, camaraderie, and purpose found in service was hard to replicate."

As part of the service, students from local high schools will read excerpts from the accounts of local veterans: Dr Francis Donovan OAM from Woodend, the late Colonel John Charles Barrie, (known to most as Charlie), formerly from Kyneton, and James Gardiner Daniel, whose parents resided in Kyneton.

The service commences at 6am at the Mount Macedon Memorial Cross and runs for approximately an hour. Free shuttle buses run from Tony Clarke Reserve in Macedon from 4.15am as roads to the Cross are shut to public traffic for the morning for the safety of attendees

Plenty of parking is available at Tony Clarke Reserve and free bus services will also run from Gisborne, Woodend, Sunbury, Kyneton, Riddells Creek, Lancefield and Romsey. The timetables for the town buses will be available at www.mtmacedondawnservice.org along with details of how to book.

Attendees are encouraged to dress for the weather and bring a water bottle and torch. A sausage sizzle will be available, and a gold coin donation would be appreciated. Items are collected and delivered to The Living Room located in Hosier Lane in Melbourne, to make a real and immediate impact to those in need.

The Living Room is part of Youth Projects and offers a wonderful service to the homeless in and around the city by providing free healthcare and support to improve the physical, mental and social well-being of individuals who are, or are at risk of, experiencing homelessness. The Living Room is a safe place for people to not only receive health care but also wash and dry clothes, use computers, and have a meal and a shower. 

Woodend Lifestyle Carers Group: A beacon of support for local carers

In an effort to provide comfort and support for those caring for loved ones with memory loss, the Woodend Lifestyle Carers Group (WLCG) is making a significant impact on the lives of local carers and their families.

The WLCG is a volunteer-run organisation that aims to improve the quality of life for carers. The group provides social and educational support for unpaid carers, who often experience isolation, due to the daily stress of their roles. WLCG offers weekly coffee mornings at The Milko Café, 118-126 High Street, Woodend on Wednesdays from 10am to 11am; twice-monthly meetings on Thursdays at the Woodend RSL, 32 Anslow Street Woodend from 1pm to 3pm; and a unique community-oriented respite care facility due for completion in October 2025.

The organisation serves residents across the Macedon Ranges and its neighbouring areas, addressing the growing need for carer support in the region.

Maddie and Leon's Story

Maddie is an inspirational young person who decided to volunteer during her final years of high school to improve her skills and give back to her community. Her interest in speech pathology and experience working in aged care during a school placement led her to discover the Aged Care Volunteer Visitors Scheme Program (ACVVS) an Australian Government-funded program delivered by Council.

Leon, a resident at BUPA Aged Care Service in Kyneton, was matched with Maddie for regular weekly visits. Leon, a writer of four novels, plans to have them published. After travelling extensively with his late wife in his younger years, and with their children having moved on to start their own families, Leon and his wife settled together in the Kyneton aged care facility before her passing.

Maddie found the volunteering experience with ACVVS to be flexible and supportive, making it easier for her to complete her final years of high school feeling proud and accomplished. "I think [Council is] really supportive and flexible," Maddie said.

When asked about his thoughts on the ACVVS program, Leon said: "I would straight away say come in and talk, it's great to have someone talking to you because I'm 91, yeah. I love having young company around. Your family's all grown up and moved on and got their own families."

With Leon's family keeping his passion for travel alive, he looked forward to his weekly visits with Maddie. He proudly shared stories of his vast overseas travels with his wife and his upbringing in the small country town of Gilgandra, New South Wales. "I really enjoyed learning about Leon's past, his stories, and everything. I don't know, I just feel wiser. I feel wiser with all [Leon's] stories, some of them are a bit silly," Maddie said.

When asked what he enjoyed most about their visits, Leon responded: "We talk and look through photographs. Talk about what she was doing at school." Maddie jokingly added: "Leon loves

Even if it's only an hour a week, it means a lot to them. So do it, that's what

When asked what he has learned about Maddie through their visits, Leon said: "She's a terrific person. I hope she continues through life like that."

Since the publishing of this story, the participants named are no longer actively meeting through the ACVVS program, but remain happy to share their story. If you would like to help, we are always looking for more volunteers to take up these important roles in our community.

Being ready for kindergarten is an important consideration as it directly relates to the age they will start primary school. Your child will be supported on their kindergarten journey whether they show all signs of readiness or not. Every child is different, and every child is welcome at kindergarten.

When thinking about readiness for 3-year-old kindergarten, some things you may want to consider are:


- How your child separates from you with support from educators, will your child be able to separate from you without becoming greatly distressed?
- Is your child beginning to understand sharing and turn-taking?
- Do they understand simple instructions?
- Are they easily understood?
- Is your child able to ask for help?
- Do you see your child being able to positively engage in a group of up to 30 children?
- Is your child progressing with toilet training?
- Can they feed themselves?
- Are they able to help pack up?
- Does your child tire easily? Do they still need a daytime sleep?

If your child's birthday is between January and April, consider whether your child is ready to start 3-year-old kindergarten in the year they are eligible or if they would benefit from starting the following year.

Message from your councillors



What a relief that the run of hot

weather is abating, and we are (hopefully) getting some decent rain. Reports indicate that 2024 was both the hottest and driest year on record, and this trend is expected to continue which is just one of a number of factors council takes into account when planning for environmental, financial and social sustainability.

To mitigate risks, careful consideration needs to be made by council into the allocation of budget resources to reduce the impact of adverse weather on the various assets it manages, such as roads, footpaths, bridges, drains, and buildings.

Council is currently updating its four-year Council Plan and setting the upcoming 2025/2026 Budget, so trending data, as well as lived experience and community feedback are essential for forecasting and decision making.

We appreciate everyone who participated in the formal budget submission process, and we extend a big thank you to residents across the shire who took part in our Citizens Assembly in March to examine the Council Plan and Community Vision. This work will be finalised in October and will help update action and budget item priorities for the next four years, while the draft 2025/2026 Budget is targeted for adoption at the May or June Council Meeting.

Community suggestions on Council priorities and services, however, are welcome at any time of the year, and we encourage ideas for alternative solutions that improve efficiency or better address the community's current needs. While some decisions are more challenging than others, we are always available to explain our decision-making process through a variety of channels such as Community Catch-ups, email or phone.

By the time this edition is published, West Ward Councillors will have completed two Community Catch-ups. Our next catch-up will take place in Woodend on Friday 30 May from 11am to 12pm, and we would like to thank Nellie's Shed for hosting this event. February 2025 Council Meeting wrap

Some of the key items considered and endorsed at the February 2025 Council Meeting include:



Draft Kyneton Urban Design Framework - Phase 3 **Consultation Outcomes**

Council noted that additional consultation had been undertaken on the draft Kyneton Urban Design Framework (UDF) Plan and acknowledged that a final report would be scheduled for next month's Council Meeting (March 2025) for a decision.

The draft UDF is a strategic plan for public realm improvements in Kyneton's commercial area, including Piper Street, Mollison Street, and High Street. It aims to enhance the appearance, amenity, and functionality of the town centre through various projects, such as pedestrian safety improvements, upgrades to public spaces, and building design guidelines.

In the most recent round of consultation (October–December 2024), 20 public submissions were received and a summary of these including a small number of recommended changes to the draft UDF as a result - are outlined in the Agenda Attachments.

Recognition of Australia Day Honours Recipients 2025

Council endorsed sending a letter of congratulations to Darraweit Guim resident, Dr Christine Helen Craik (AM), in recognition of her 2025 Australia Day Honour Award. Dr Craik was made a Member of the Order of Australia for her significant service to the community as a social worker, her contributions to tertiary education, and her volunteer work.

Quarterly Financial Report - October to December 2024 and Mid-Year Budaet Review

Council received an update on the Quarterly Financial Report as of 31 December 2024, in accordance with the requirements of the Local Government Act 2020, and adopted budget changes identified in the mid-year budget review.

The update noted an operating surplus of \$50.02 million for the six months to 31 December 2024, compared with the budgeted surplus of \$49.28 million. The reasons for this difference are detailed in the report, some of which include favourable income from interest, operational expenditure below budget, and a variance in infrastructure expenditure.

Community Funding Scheme Guidelines Update

Council endorsed updates to the Eligibility Criteria for the Community Funding Scheme and Small Project Grants Guidelines. The 2025/2026 Community Funding Scheme will open on 28 April 2025 and close on 26 May 2025.

[...] Additionally, the 2025/2026 Community Funding Scheme will open concurrently again with the Events and Festivals Grant Program to enhance community awareness of funding opportunities and streamline the grant assessment and administrative processes.

Community Awards Guidelines 2025 - Briefing Report

Council endorsed the 2025 Community Awards Nomination Guide, including the nomination opening and closing dates. The nomination period will commence on 3 March 2025 and close on 28 March 2025, allowing the celebration event to be held during National Volunteer Week in May 2025.

Following the 2024 Community Awards Ceremony in January 2024, a review of the Community Awards program was completed. This review considered:

- the timing of the Community Awards Ceremony
- opportunities to streamline Council's various award programs
- the relevance of the current award categories.

As a result of this review, certain award programs run separately last year – including the Community Awards in January 2024 and the Youth Awards in September 2024 – have been consolidated into this single awards program.

Creekside Clean Up and future Seedling Planting Day

As part of national Clean Up Australia Day, Woodend Landcare along with Macedon-Woodend Scouts, Girl Guides, Woodend Primary School and others, gathered throughout the first week in March at various locations around Woodend to clean up our town.

Woodend Landcare

Woodend Landcare volunteers focused along Five Mile Creek between Jeffreys Street and Campaspe Park. The low water levels meant we could get into areas we have been unable to access in recent years.

Over three hours, 16 volunteers collected six large bags of rubbish. An inventory of the rubbish was undertaken to complete a report for Clean Up Australia. This important step enables data to be obtained, such as how much rubbish was collected, and waste trends identified. A snapshot of our Woodend Landcare collection includes:

- Total number of items collected approximately 650
- Most common item soft plastic (261 items including about 120 chip wrappers/lolly packets)
- Aluminium cans 39
- Glass bottles 13
- Disposable coffee cups 8
- Paper 247 items, almost half of which were takeaway food paper bags.

The use of the area for recreation was recognisable from the rubbish collected:

- Dog poo bags 28
- Recreational items 6 tennis balls, a frisbee full of dog tooth marks and a small pink tennis racket broken into eight pieces.

Happily, we did not find any soy sauce fish, syringes, vapes, cigarette butts, nappies or other hazardous items.

Some plant guards previously used by Woodend Landcare or creek frontage properties that were flooded in 2022 were discovered. Since 2022, Woodend Landcare has changed to using biodegradable cardboard plant guards and weed mats for all plantings within creek flood zones. We are not purchasing any more plastic plant guards and any that we do use are guards we already had in stock, or guards we are reusing, and these are only to be used above the flood zone. If you are undertaking seedling planting on your property, you might like to do the same. Contact us if you would like to know details of the guard/mats we use.

All rubbish collected has been disposed of appropriately, including recycling and composting where possible.

Next Working Bee:

Seedling Planting Day

Sunday 6th April – Five Mile Creek between the Scout Hall, Tennis Club and Jeffreys Street.

Join us to plant lots of understory seedlings adjacent to Five Mile Creek. This will help protect the population of rare Black Gum trees, whilst also creating habitat for native animals and insects.



Country gardeners missing out on free soil screening

EPA Victoria says too many country gardeners are missing out on free soil screening from a government citizen science project that's mapping soil conditions across the state.

The state's environmental regulator says 2,000 home gardeners have registered and sent in more than 5,000 soil samples so far, but most have come from the metropolitan area.

Victoria's Chief Environmental Scientist, Professor Mark Patrick Taylor says it's a free service for home gardeners that does science and the environment a favour.

"Register on the EPA Victoria website, send in three small samples and you'll receive a scientific assessment of your soil condition and the trace elements it contains," Professor Taylor says.

"It's a free offer to home gardeners anywhere in Victoria, but we're not seeing many samples from country areas so far."

Professor Taylor says that EPA's scientists add gardeners' soil data to a study that is mapping soil condition across the state. "You'll be helping scientific research and getting a detailed report on what's feeding your garden."

So far, approximately 80% of the 5,800 individual samples screened have shown trace elements that are within recommended levels. EPA provides a scientific report, and if the soil is not up to scratch, EPA can give you some tips on ways to manage your garden.

"Any home gardener who sends in samples can have scientific results for the price of the postage and ensure your family is gardening in soil you can trust - we just need more country people to get involved," says Professor Taylor.








Community Bank Gisborne & District partners with Sisterhood Project to enhance child safety through first aid training

In an inspiring initiative aimed at increasing child safety, Community Bank Gisborne & District has announced a partnership with the Sisterhood Project, focusing on providing essential first aid training for parents and caregivers in the Macedon Ranges area. The Sisterhood Project's mission is to provide accessible health education to caregivers, aiming to increase the survival rates of children facing preventable illnesses and injuries. The project also focuses on bridging the gap for under-resourced communities, particularly in rural and remote areas where access to health education is limited.

In 2024 alone, the Sisterhood Project has trained a total of 347 people across Victoria, with plans to extend offerings into New South Wales and Western Australia. By the end of the year, they hope to reach 25,000 people indirectly through community engagement and education.

With a proven impact and a commitment to empowering caregivers, this partnership represents a significant step toward enhancing child safety and wellbeing in the Macedon Ranges region. Change your clock, change your smoke alarm battery

Sunday 6 April is the end of daylight saving, and at 3am, you need to move your clock back one hour. Along with changing your clock, it is the perfect time to also change your smoke alarm batteries.

All smoke alarms, whether hard-wired or wireless, require a battery. Hard-wired alarms use a battery as a back-up and that battery needs to be changed as well.

Only a working smoke alarm saves lives.

If there's no sound from your smoke alarm, there's no warning.

Remember, it is normally smoke, not flame or heat, that kills the majority of fire victims. When asleep, our sense of smell is largely diminished, and we're unlikely to smell smoke. The smoke may also put occupants into a deeper sleep, so a smoke alarm actually helps wake you. And, with all of the plastics, materials, electronics and chemicals around - house fire smoke can be extremely toxic.

Our busiest start to the year ... ever!

So far, 2025 has proven to be a very busy year for the Woodend CFA. At the time of writing this article (mid-March) we had been called to a total of more than 50 jobs. To put that in perspective, we reached that mark in 2022 and 2024 in late July. We have attended some 30 primary jobs in the Woodend area and over 20 support jobs in other areas, including numerous callouts for our Rehab Unit.

Woodend CFA's new Tanker is now in service

Woodend CFA's new Tanker 2 is now in active service and joins their fleet of five fire fighting vehicles to protect our Woodend community - and beyond! The new Tanker arrived last year and has undergone extensive fitout and member training before it came into active duty recently.

"We applied for the grant in 2020, when I was Captain of the brigade" said former Captain Mike Dornau.

"The CFA provides the Woodend Fire Brigade with vehicles and equipment to suit its brigade risk profile, however they do not fund all of our vehicles. In fact, of the Brigade's five vehicles, only two are fully funded by the CFA. The rest are either fully or partly funded by the brigade.

"We also purchase specialist equipment on our own behalf, that is not covered by the CFA. Hence, the importance of raising funds to maintain our fleet and service to a quality that we believe will best serve our community. High on our list for replacement was our ageing Tanker 2".

"The new Tanker is a state-of-the-art fire fighting vehicle that replaces our 25-year-old Tanker 2," added Captain Steve Ritchie. "This would not be possible without a Victorian Government VESEP Grant (Volunteer Emergency Service Equipment Program). However, it would certainly not be possible without the the generous donations from members of the Woodend Community over many years.

"The new vehicle will provide the Woodend community with a more modern and capable vehicle when our primary Tanker 1 is away on Strike Team duty, which it often is. Tanker 2 then becomes the primary response vehicle to bush and grass fires. The new tanker is also much better equipped for the special and unique geographic make-up of the Woodend area, which includes mountains and forests, as well as high risk grass and bushfire areas."

The Medium Tanker is designed to carry 2,350 litres of water, making it a reliable resource to attend grass, scrub and bushfires, as well as to attend structure fires and urban incidents. It is fitted with lockers that include drawers and shelves to carry support equipment, including breathing apparatus.

First Lieutenant and Equipment Officer Malcolm Judd commented, "The new tanker is a 4WD vehicle, while the old T2 was 2WD, which will make it better suited to handling the rough terrain and steep tracks in our area. It is also a Crew Cab design, unlike the old tanker, where the crew were exposed on the back of the truck.

"The new tanker joins the Woodend CFA's modern Tanker 1 and FCV, our Rehab vehicle (which will soon be replaced by a brand new purpose-built vehicle), and our nearly 30-year-old Pumper, which will hopefully be replaced with a more modern vehicle in the near future".

One who was keen to attend arranged for annual leave days immediately after the 2024 event, so had a genuine apology. But despite badgering by the convenor Len Young, the other likely candidates came up wanting!

The Possums Trophy is a perpetual award presented each year to the participant that provides some action of note. It can be anything between outstanding and ridiculous.

The annual retreat commenced in the last part of the twentieth century, but the first Possums Trophy was awarded in 2002. It is named in memory of Brother Paul Bourke who taught at the school for a total of seven years, and was principal for six of them. (At the seminary he was nicknamed Possum).

The late Brian Fleming was the inaugural winner of the Possums Trophy in 2002. He placed his keys in an ice-cream container and left it on the river bank. A passing boat's wake washed ashore and moved the container into the river and it floated away.

One previous winner was Kevin Willey from Nagambie. Kevin died on 3 March 2025 and has been interred at Nagambie. As the surgical team and family were discussing Kevin's needs for palliative care he reminded them that Torrumbarry was coming up!

So the 2025 winner of the Possums Trophy is Kevin Hugh Willey the first posthumous awardee. Rest in Peace Kevin!!







Cancer care project donation appeal to Macedon Ranges community

Kyneton Health launched an appeal in August 2024 to raise funds for a Scalp Cooler to enhance the care provided to their Oncology patients. To date, \$10,231.25 has been donated with a further \$37,012.75 needed to purchase the much-needed equipment. Central Highlands Rural Health is reaching out to individuals, businesses and community groups across the Macedon Ranges seeking their support for the appeal.

Oncology nurses at the health service have requested a 'Scalp Cooling Machine' to minimise the impact of cancer treatment and support patient wellbeing. Patients receiving chemotherapy treatment often experience hair loss which can be physically uncomfortable and emotionally distressing. Currently, Kyneton Health's Oncology patients are unable to access this important technology designed to minimise side-effects and maximise best

"Cold caps or scalp cooling may help reduce the amount of hair loss for some individuals. They work by narrowing the blood vessels and reducing the amount of chemotherapy reaching the scalp." Cancer

Susan Whitfield, Nurse Unit Manager, Kyneton Health, said, "Our patients receive high-quality care in a friendly and compassionate setting. We would like to enhance our service with the introduction of a scalp cooler so that cancer care in the Macedon Ranges provides patients with equipment that reduces the impact of treatment close to home."

Spirit de Cure and Suncorp contributed \$10,000 in August 2024, which was a great start to the appeal, however further donations are needed.

Susan Jennings, Executive Director of Clinical Operations, Central Highlands Rural Health said, "We are truly grateful to receive funds from Suncorp and Spirit de Cure's donors to enhance our Oncology services. We're now asking our local community to consider giving a gift that will make a difference to our cancer patients receiving chemotherapy treatment."

Dozens of kinders create 6,500 new places for kids in 2025

Thousands more children will get a high-quality education at a local kindergarten with dozens of new or expanded services opening this year - creating more than 6,500 kinder places.

Member for Macedon, Mary-Anne Thomas visited Lancefield Kinder in February to celebrate the new kinder year and officially open the service - one of 65 new or expanded services welcoming children in 2025.

The new and upgraded kinders are helping address demand in Australia's fastest growing state, where more than 70,000 children are starting three-year-old kindergarten this year, with around 80,000 children joining four-year-old kindergarten.

Twenty of these kindergartens are opening at government schools, providing up to 2,575 new kinder places for Victorian children - and saving parents time during busy periods by eliminating the dreaded double drop-off.

Another 45 new or expanded kindergartens are opening at council, non-government school and other sector sites, supported by funding through Building Blocks Partnerships and Capacity Building grants. These projects will collectively create more than 4,000 new kindergarten places.

Growing our regional kinder workforce

The early childhood education workforce is being strengthened to support more kinder places for children and better support for working families.

Minister for Children Lizzie Blandthorn and Member for Macedon, Mary-Anne Thomas recently launched the latest round of the Certificate III Upskill Support Program to help train more early childhood teachers, particularly in regional and rural areas.

Applications are now open for the Certificate III Upskill Support Program, which will provide 400 places for educators looking to upskill to a Diploma of Early Childhood Education and Care.

The program includes \$7,000 in financial support that can be used for living expenses while studying and working. This year, half of the places are reserved for students in rural and regional Victoria meaning students can study and work close to home. In 2024, 416 students accessed the upskilling payment.

Deakin University is also offering online courses for early childhood education students who want to study while working. As part of Victoria's Early Childhood Tertiary Partnerships program, Deakin is one of several institutions providing tailored study options.

Scholarships of \$25,000 for bachelor's students and \$12,000 for graduate diploma students are available through the Early Childhood Scholarships Program.

More than 200 places are available over two years, with priority access for applicants from selected rural and regional areas.

These initiatives will strengthen the early education workforce meaning more kinder places for children and better support for working families.

Member for Macedon Mary-Anne Thomas said, "By expanding training opportunities for early childhood educators, we're strengthening kinder and giving children across Victoria the opportunities they deserve - no matter where they live."

Kinder Kits ensure that all children can enjoy the benefits of Free Kinder, with engaging activities that set them up for a lifetime of learning.

Kits are equipped with playdough, crayons, stacking blocks, alfalfa seeds for planting and stories from Australian authors. This year's Kinder Kits double as a backpack which can be opened into a felt playing surface for imaginative play.

Other items for kids include timber story rollers, a colouring book, a jumping frog game, a card game exploring maths concepts, and felt stickers that can be used to create stories on the backpack's lining.

Kyneton Aero Club set to soar

Kyneton Airfield is one of nine regional airports receiving funding under the Regional Airports Program. The Federal Government grant of \$413,500 for upgrades at Kyneton Aero Club.

The project will include the extension and resealing of the runway, as well as sealing taxiways, increasing tarmac area around the refuelling bay and the installation of a dedicated helipad for emergency services rotary aircraft.

The runway extension will accommodate the larger aircraft that are used for aeromedical flights and fire-fighting operations, and will improve safety, operational efficiency and emergency response capabilities at the airfield. Sealing the taxiway will help to prevent damage to aircraft and will make the airport operational in all weather conditions.

The total project will cost \$827,000, with the Kyneton Aero Club matching the Federal Government's grant with a \$413,500 contribution of their own.

Played with a round ball, on a hard court and only five players per side, Futsal is an exciting and fast paced variant of soccer that is growing in popularity around the world; including here in the Macedon

Macedon Ranges Futsal (MRF) - a community-based league - was established almost 30 years ago with humble beginnings at Buffalo Stadium, Woodend. Today, MRF fields as many as 142 teams in the current summer season.

The league includes mixed competitions for juniors from grade one through to a mixed open division. And following the "Matildas effect" (resulting from the 2023 FIFA Women's World Cup) female participation in futsal has significantly increased with female-only competitions for girls in grade one through to late secondary school.

Futsal is played across the year, with two seasons - winter and summer. Games are played on Thursday and Friday afternoons and evenings from 4.30pm. Courts are located at Gisborne Secondary College, Gisborne Primary School, Willowbank Primary School, the new Macedon Ranges Regional Sporting Precinct and Tony Clarke Reserve in Macedon. Community members are welcome to come along and watch a game.



Woodend Avenue of Honour

'The greatest and most impressive public event ever witnessed in the district', wrote the Woodend Star, was the opening of the Avenue of Honour on 11 September 1918. Along Mt Alexander Road, north of Woodend, 150 oaks had been planted in recognition of the services in World War I of men and one woman, connected to the Shire of Newham and Woodend.

The plan had only been initiated a couple of months earlier and involved an enormous effort by many volunteers; most of the soil was rich red, but more red had to be carted in further from town.

The Star acknowledged the huge amount of work achieved by the Committee of Management and the ladies who had catered for the several working bees during the work, and served refreshments at the end of the ceremony in a large marquee about halfway along. The number of trees did not quite include everyone on the honour roll, but more would be planted the following year. At the south entrance to the Avenue, an arch covered with ferns, wattle blossom and flags had been erected by Mr C. H. Overton, assisted by Mr J. Fisher and Mr L. Overton.

About 1,200 attended the event but the Star expressed disappointment verging on disgust at the lack of attendance by the Federal member, Mr E. Jowett, and the Acting Prime Minister, the Honourable W. A. Watt, who, on his way to another function in Bendigo, only slowed down through the avenue, 'gazing about him'. The program began with a procession from the town which included some returned soldiers, local officials and the Anzac Band.

Shire President Cr Don invited the Hon. J. M. Chanter, the substitute for Mr Jowett, to open the Avenue by cutting the red, white and blue ribbon stretched across the entrance. He spoke at length about the young men who had gone to war. Everyone then moved to tree number 28, in honour of George Green, the first in the area to die. The band played the Dead March and the Last Post was sounded with 'impressive solemnity'.

After further speeches and ribbon-cutting at the north end, the band played the National Anthem and 'concluded a memorable day's proceedings'.
