Local community hosts nationally significant conference



The Macedon Ranges community proved capable of hosting conferences of national significance when almost 200 people from around Australia attended the 2024 Rural Australians for Refugees conference last month.

The biennial conference's sold out opening night at Kyneton Town Hall featured an address by international award-winning author Behrouz Boochani and a presentation by two-time Archibald Prize finalist artist Mostafa Azimitabar: both Kurds who fled Iran under fear of death only to find themselves denied refugee status and held for more than six years on Manus Island. Boochani, who was denied permanent settlement in Australia, is now a resident of NZ. Azimitabar, despite his growing reputation as a contemporary artist in Australia, is here on restrictive short-term visas and under constant pressure to leave.

Former Australian Human Rights Commission President, UNHCR Deputy High Commissioner for Refugees and RAR Patron, Gillian Triggs was critical of the Australian model of detention of people seeking asylum designed to deter refugees, and spoke of the





growing pressures from war, famine and climate change that continue to displace millions of people globally every year.

The weekend conference sessions at Sacred Heart College Kyneton, saw RAR members from 75 groups, including Grandmothers for Refugees, and many more allies of refugees travelling from around Australia to participate.

While acknowledging some important reforms that had occurred, such as the resolution of status for 19,000 people held for up to ten years on temporary visas, conference speakers pointed to the extremely restrictive nature of current policies, which continue to disadvantage people once they reach Australia, and called for urgent reform to address the protection of all refugees and people seeking asylum, regardless of their country, faith, ethnicity, or other factors.

David Manne, principal Solicitor and Director of Refugee Legal, spoke of the deterrence policy approach, which is contrary to the welcome for refugees inherent in Australia's character and history.

"Research consistently reveals sustained and very strong public support for our refugee resettlement program. This support has consistently reached 80%. But the truth is that harm and inhumanity still pervade our refugee policies." Manne said.

"We're just at the start of the road to fundamental reform so crucial to the rights and lives of people seeking asylum and refugees. While we've seen some progress, it doesn't come close to meeting international obligations and the values that underpin them: humanity, compassion, fairness and justice."

Chair of Macedon Ranges RAR, Jean Ker Walsh, said the conference was acclaimed by attendees as a success. "For me, the highlight was working over the past year with the Shire, the College, and with local RAR members so committed and generous with their time and creativity. We have welcomed some new members and are ready to welcome more. There is more to do as allies of refugees. Do join us!" Visit https://www.macedonranges-rar.org/

'Free to be me' photography competition





A photography competition that aims to challenge restrictive gender stereotypes and expectations is central to Council's 16 Days of Activism against Gender-Based Violence campaign this year.

The annual global campaign, established by the United Nations, seeks to raise awareness and encourage communities to take action to end violence against women.

The theme of Council's photo competition is 'Free to Be Me': an invitation to show how we can all live, work and play outside of restrictive norms. Where men can be gentle and caring, women can be strong and lead, and gender-diverse or non-binary people can be active in typically male or female roles or spaces.

Council's Director Community, Maria Weiss, said the competition provided an opportunity to get people in the community proactively involved in raising awareness of the issue.

"Photography has the power to transcend words and touch hearts. We believe that with this competition, we can start a conversation about respect and raise awareness about preventing gender-based violence," she said.

Submissions are invited until 8 November and anyone over 12 years of age who lives, works, or plays in the Macedon Ranges can enter (note: parent/guardian permissions may apply for photographers/subjects under the age of 18).

Shortlisted photographs will be exhibited locally and online from 25 November to 10 December. Prizes will be awarded for First Place Adult, First Place Youth, and People's Choice.

This initiative is supported by Maddisons of Gisborne, Sunbury and Cobaw Community Health, Safe and Equal, and Respect Victoria.

The photo competition is among a number of initiatives Council will be supporting as part of the 16 Days of Activism, with others including financial wellbeing workshops for women and a themed StoryWalk, storytimes and collection displays through local Goldfields Libraries.

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Zonta says NO to violence

Monday 25 November is the International Day for the elimination of violence against women and 10 December is Human Rights Day. The 16 days that begin and end on these dates are recognised internationally as the '16 Days of Activism' to prevent violence against women.

Violence against women has an impact on communities throughout Australia. On average, one woman a week is murdered by her current or former partner and intimate partner violence is the leading cause of death, disability and illness for Australian women aged 18–44 years.

The Zonta Club of Kyneton will work with Macedon Ranges Shire Council and with other community groups to raise awareness of gender-based violence, challenge discriminatory attitudes and encourage community-based support for those living with violence through a program of activities.

In Kyneton, the Zonta Club will have a display in the community window on Mollison Street, and across the Shire and will work with local libraries to highlight the impact of violence against women. In Woodend, the Zonta Club will support financial workshops that will be held at the Woodend Neighbourhood House as a part of the 16 Days of Activism.

On Saturday 30 November, the Zonta Club of Kyneton will host an orange-themed 'pop up' event at the Social Foundry in Kyneton from 10am to 12 noon. Everyone is warmly invited to attend, wearing a touch of orange, and learn more about the 16 Days of Activism to prevent violence against women while sharing a cuppa and cake with Zonta's passionate members.

Plastic Free Bali:
A collaborativeRotary
Club of Woodendeffort for lasting change

Woodend Rotary Club is partnering with the Rotary Club of Bali Seminyak and the environmental group Yayasan Biosfir Indonesia on a project to end plastic waste in the environment surrounding West Bali National Park.

We read a lot about the problems that plastic is causing throughout Indonesia and the surrounding waters.

This project is a bold endeavour to change the way businesses, households and tourists manage waste in their region. Adopting a philosophy of reduce, reuse and recycle the project aims to provide knowledge and support infrastructure that allows people to stream their waste and prevent plastics from entering the environment.

The project team, led by project coordinator Rosa Halldorsdottir and project manager Dwi Kadek, will soon be training local women as educators, who will visit every business at least twice and go house to house to provide each household with two bins and training on how to separate plastics and general waste into the two bins.

In order to ensure long term sustainability the project team is working with the local villages to arrange waste collection services and to improve conditions at local waste management facilities.

Once waste is being properly sorted, the villages will gain an income stream from the sale of the recyclables.

The team is also training staff at waste facilities to make compost from the organic waste delivered by businesses. The compost is then sold to local farmers to improve soil quality and provide another income stream.

The Plastic Free Bali Project is made possible in part by a grant from The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International.

The Rotary Club of Woodend is actively involved in a number of projects to promote peace, health, education and the environment in Australia and overseas.

Jeffreys Street planting day



On Sunday 13 October, Woodend turned on a beautiful day for our last major planting for the year.

Landcare volunteers were joined by local families and the shire Bushland Reserves Officer, Martin Roberts, in adding more than 600 new plants to revegetate the area between the tennis club and exercise track. This is Stage 1 of the Black Gum BioLink Enhancement Project, sponsored by Mancedon Ranges Shire Council and Bendigo Bank, that aims to expand and protect the threatened mature Black Gum trees while creating habits for native insects and animals over the next few years.

The area suffered a lot of damage in the storms of 2021, so we added some replacement Black Gums, together with a range of understorey plants, which will enhance both the visual amenity and increase the area's biodiversity.

Part of the planting also entailed installing over 100 native tussock grasses along the walking track, which it is hoped will develop into an attractive soft border between the track and the site.

Induction Cooktops – proposed rebates

Good news for those concerned with the health impact of cooking with gas (which is estimated to be responsible for up to 12% of Australia's childhood asthma burden). The Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action (DEECA, Vic) is proposing to introduce rebates within the Victorian Energy Upgrades program, commencing on 25 October 2024. A draft consumer factsheet explaining the proposed rebate is available online at engage.vic. gov.au/download/document/37043.

In brief: the proposal is to introduce rebates for changing from gas to approved induction cooktops (including some range-style cookers but not portable models). The rebate value will be around \$140 and a minimum copayment of \$200 will be required.

New entrance enhances **Bald Hill Reserve experience**



The main public entrance to Bald Hill Reserve has been developed, following a decade of collaboration between the Friends of Bald Hill Reserve and Council.

The 96-hectare forest, woodland and grassland reserve, located about six kilometres east of Kyneton, is an ecologically, geologically and culturally significant site in the Macedon Ranges, featuring diverse indigenous flora and fauna, including state and nationally significant species.



In 2018–19, the Mt St Mary's Lane Entrance Area Master Plan was developed by the Friends of Bald Hill Reserve in collaboration with Council, aiming to provide a welcoming and accessible entry to the reserve while preserving and enhancing its environmental values. Funding was initially received through Council's 'Places for People' Grant in 2017-18.

Council supported the revitalisation project through a capital funding allocation of \$100,000 in 2018 to deliver key infrastructure features in phase 1 of the Master Plan implementation. This included an accessible entrance with a primary pathway and elevated boardwalks to connect to the network of walking trails. The manual installation of the concrete boardwalks reduced compaction to environmentally vulnerable areas whilst protecting the habitat of the Brown Toadlet, a rare and threatened frog species located in the area.

Further funding was secured over three years consecutively through Council's Funding Scheme Grant program (2021–2024; \$12,000 each year, totalling \$36,000), enabling the construction of a new shelter and seating at the entrance, the design and installation of Taungurung welcome and interpretative signage; wayfinding signs; and a picnic setting near the shelter.

Donations were also received from Lisa Chesters Federal Member for Bendigo (\$250), and the Rotary Club of Kyneton (\$500). An early Landcare start-up grant covered the cost of a brochure, while the Kyneton Men's Shed donated a brochure box.

Council's Acting Director Planning and Environment, Rob Ball, thanked all involved in supporting the project over the years, particularly the Friends of Bald Hill Reserve as its driving force.

"This really was a community-driven project and is a great example of how positive outcomes can be achieved when the community and Council work together," he said.

"The new entrance includes elements that reflect the community and pay tribute to the Taungurung peoples, the Traditional Owners of the land."

"New signage at the entrance, created by Taungurung artist Maddi Moser, shows people coming together and going about daily life on and around the reserve.'

A celebration to mark the completion of the project will be held at 10am on Saturday 9 November 2024 at Bald Hill Reserve.



Roadside maintenance

Did you know that each year, Council slashes around 1,000 km of roadsides for fire prevention?

Fires can start on roadsides due to hot vehicle exhausts, mechanical failures and collisions. We slash high-use roadsides to reduce the chances of these incidents resulting in a fire. Typically, 80 per cent of traffic uses 20 per cent of our roads, so those roads are targeted as a priority

Council contractors have commenced roadside slashing in Malmsbury and will gradually work their way south, to provide initial coverage of the shire.

- Once your pumpkin sounds hollow when you knock, it's harvest time.

Is your pool or spa barrier compliant?

In accordance with Victorian law, as a pool or spa owner you must ensure the safety barriers comply with the requirements of the Building Regulations 2018 (https://www.vba.vic.gov.au/ consumers/swimming-pools)

To ensure compliance you must:

- organise an inspection of your pool barrier by a registered swimming pool inspector
- rectify any issues identified from your pool or spa inspection and obtain a Certificate of Barrier Compliance (CBC, also known as a Form 23)
- lodge the CBC to Council via the online portal and pay the lodgement fee by the nominated due date.

If you own a pool or spa, it is your obligation to have the barrier inspected every four years and submit the CBC to Council by the due date.

The first 72 hours after an emergency event: community-led resilience plans

Council has been working with seven communities in the Macedon Ranges providing support enabling readiness in the first 72 hours after an emergency event has occurred.

The Victorian Government has provided funding to local governments to assist communities to be aware of local services available to them prior to emergency activations.

'Community Readiness' can be as much as understanding who can provide immediate short-term accommodation and food and water services, as well as who is available to assist with communications and power back-up like generators.

Communities are creating individual documents outlining who and what is available locally, with contact information accessible by the Emergency Management team at Council, who can assist if power and communication are impacted.

Following the 2019-20 Black Summer fires and 2022 floods, it was identified that communities themselves are the best supporters of community immediately after an emergency, and that when a community is prepared for an emergency, support can be offered immediately

Dog walkers reminded to do the right thing

Council's Local Laws officers are increasing their presence at popular dog walking locations, in response to strong community support for more enforcement in this area.

Council continuously receives community complaints regarding dog walkers ignoring the on-leash requirements and failing to pick up after their dog.

In January 2020, Council became an on-leash shire, meaning dogs in public places must be on a leash, except in designated off-leash areas. (Note: all footpaths in the shire are dog on-leash, even those in designated off-leash areas. This is to ensure the safety of other footpath users, including pedestrians, cyclists and others).

It is also a legal requirement to pick up after your dog and to carry bags - or a suitable device - for the collection of dog poo from your dog

Dog walkers not adhering to these requirements risk on-the-spot fines.

Local Laws officers will be enforcing both the dog on-leash and dog poo collection requirements. The current fine amount for walking your dog off leash in an on-leash area is \$198, while the fine for not picking up after your dog or for failing to carry a dog poo bag with you is \$395.

If out walking your dog, please do the right thing. Remember to take your dog poo bags with you and adhere to the dog on leash areas to avoid a fine.

Property inspections

Council's Municipal Fire Prevention Officers have begun inspecting properties around the shire and will be issuing notices to landowners that require fuel reduction works to be completed.

Officers will be checking for fire hazards such as unmaintained long grass, excessive woodpiles or other debris.

Officers may issue Fire Prevention Notices where necessary. If a property owner does not comply, they may face an infringement of nearly \$2,000 plus any costs associated with completing the required works.

If you plan on baling grass and receive a notice, please let us know by completing the application for extension on the back of the notice.

If you are grazing stock, you must demonstrate that the number of stock is sufficient to reduce the risk, and if not, you may be required to do additional fuel reduction work.



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Snake season means pet owners have to be more vigilant than ever. Here's how.

As temperatures rise, snake activity becomes more frequent, especially in our region, which is home to venomous species such as the Eastern Brown, Red-bellied Black, Taipan, and Tiger Snakes. Pets are most likely to be bitten on their head, neck and front legs.

Greencross Vets Macedon Ranges advises pet owners to remain alert and be aware of the warning signs of snake bites in their pets.

Snake bite symptoms

For dogs, snake bite symptoms vary, depending on the type of snake and venom injected. Common signs include:

- Discoloration, bleeding, swelling and pain at the bite site (often just one puncture)
- Lethargy, vomiting, diarrhea and excessive drooling
- Body tremors, seizures and other neurological changes ٠

In severe cases, dogs may have difficulty breathing, pale gums, rapid heart rate, collapse, or signs of shock or haemorrhage (nose bleeds, blood in urine)

Snake bites in cats can be more difficult to detect, as they often hide symptoms and may show subtle signs that mimic other conditions. While many symptoms are similar to those in dogs,

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cats may display additional signs that indicate a snake bite, including:

- Pain (vocalising when touched)
- Loss of appetite
- Excessive drooling
- First aid tips for snake bites

Keep your pet calm - do your best to avoid excitement and runnina

Call your vet and let them know you are on your way. They can begin to plan for your arrival.

Do not attempt to catch the live snake or harm the snake (snakes are protected and killing them is illegal). It is not essential to identify the snake.

Prevention Tips

While it's impossible to eliminate the risk of snake bites, you can reduce it by doing the following:

- Know your local vets who stock anti-venom.
- Avoid high-risk areas (long grass, bush paths) or keep dogs on a lead.
- Always supervise dogs in snake-prone areas.

If you suspect your pet has been bitten, seek urgent veterinary care immediately.

New Kyneton Women's Health Clinic

More local women will soon have access to free and comprehensive care and support with the announcement of the location of the next five women's health clinics.

Minister for Health and Member for Macedon, Mary-Anne Thomas has announced Central Highlands Rural Health in Kyneton as one of the next locations to open under a four-year plan to open 20 specialised women's health clinics.

The clinics will remove barriers women face in accessing specialist care, and providing more services closer to home, for pelvic pain, heavy bleeding, prolapse and incontinence, as well as contraception and menopause services.

Each clinic will include access to specialists including gynaecologists as well as specialist nursing and allied health support, making it easier for women to access specialist care for conditions like endometriosis, pelvic pain, polycystic ovary syndrome (PCOS), incontinence. perimenopause and menopause.

Member for Macedon Mary-Anne Thomas said, "We know the gender health gap is real - that is why we're offering these important services under one roof to give Victorian women easier access to the wide-ranging specialist treatments they so desperately need."

The first five of 20 women's health clinics were launched earlier this year.

The clinics are part of a women's health package to bridge the existing gap in women's healthcare - including a partnership with BreastScreen for a mobile women's health clinic which will visit remote parts of the state.

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Homelessness in the Macedon Ranges: a growing concern



On ABS Census night in 2021, 122,494 people were experiencing homelessness in Australia. Behind these numbers lie stories of hardship, resilience and communities grappling with a crisis that affects society's most vulnerable.

The Macedon Ranges, a region known for its close-knit communities and picturesque landscapes is not immune to this growing issue.

Over the past 12 months, The Sunbury and Cobaw Community Health Housing team has provided support to over 220 individuals, families and young people requesting housing assistance in the Macedon Ranges.

Homeless is not the result of one cause but arises from a complex mix of social, economic and health related factors. Whilst some may face housing insecurity due to a sudden loss of employment or personal crisis, others are at risk due to more persistent challenges. Individual factors such as low educational attainment, unemployment, family and domestic violence, disability, trauma and substance abuse can significantly heighten the risk of homelessness.

Structural issues, including inadequate income support and limited access to affordable housing compound these individual vulnerabilities.

Startingly, one in seven people experiencing homelessness is a child under the age of 12. Other vulnerable populations include those leaving state care, First Nations people and older Australian.

These sobering statistics have driven local community groups, like the Woodend Lions, to try and make a difference. The Lions Club of Woodend, for instance, plays a crucial role in supporting Sunbury and Cobaw Community Health by providing donations that go toward housing assistance, transport and communication needs. As the Lions Club acknowledges, even small contributions can have a meaningful impact - providing phone credit for example, can allow someone to apply for jobs or stay in touch with loved ones. Repairs to a car can enable a person to maintain employment in an area where public transport options are limited.

The efforts of community groups are vital in helping to alleviate homelessness in the Macedon Ranges, yet the growing number of people seeking assistance underscores a broader need for change.

For those seeking to get involved, local organisations like the Woodend Lions offer valuable opportunities to get involved whether through donations, volunteering or advocacy. Together we can build a more inclusive and supportive community where everyone has a place to call home.

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



Giving Victorians a say on Maternal and Child Health Services

Victorian parents and carers now have a valuable opportunity to help improve Victoria's Maternal and Child Health (MCH) Service through a new survey launched by the Victorian Government.

Minister for Children Lizzie Blandthorn announced the survey open and inviting everyone who has used the service in the past two years to provide their feedback.

By sharing their experiences, families can directly shape the future of the service, ensuring it supports the health and wellbeing journeys of parents, carers and families in raising happy and healthy children.

The insights gathered will guide improvements to the service and ensure it continues to support families effectively - with guestions focusing on first home visits, ongoing appointments with MCH nurses, and the support and information shared as part of a child's growth and development.

The anonymous survey, open until 17 November, is available in 10 community languages in addition to English, including Dari, Vietnamese, Arabic, Mandarin, Khmer, Punjabi, Burmese, Pashto, Hazaragi, and Chin (Hakha), making it accessible to a wide range of families across the state.

The survey encompasses all aspects of the Maternal and Child Health Service, including the Universal MCH program, the 10 key ages and stages visits, the Enhanced MCH Program, the Aboriginal MCH program, and the MCH Line.

The survey will build on the roundtables currently being undertaken with parents and carers about how to improve families' access to services and supports to help their children thrive.

"I encourage local families who have used these services to participate in this valuable survey, to ensure your views and voices are heard," said Mary-Anne Thomas MP. Member for Macedon.

The roundtables are being held in Melbourne and regional Victoria, with families invited to discuss their experiences with maternal and child health services, early childhood education and care, early parenting centres, kindergartens and family services.

Each session is set to guide future policies, programs and initiatives that impact Victorian children from birth to 12 years old.

The MCH Service is a free service for all families with children from birth to school age, delivered locally in partnership with councils and Aboriginal community-controlled organisations. It also offers 24-hour support through the MCH Line.

More than 70 lakes across Victoria are now brimming with rainbow trout ready for families to enjoy the great outdoors. Minister for Outdoor Recreation Steve Dimopoulos announced that 35,000 rainbow trout have been released into lakes across Victoria as part of a \$96 million package to improve fishing, boating and piers.

Many of the freshly stocked lakes have fishing platforms, walking tracks, barbecues and playgrounds, at lakes across Melbourne and in regional areas.

Rainbow trout are the perfect catch for beginners because they can easily be caught using widely available bait and the Little Angler Kits provided by the Labor Government to school students across Victoria

The Little Anglers' Guide to Fishing, which came with the rods, has advice on how to catch a rainbow trout, what bait to use and more handy hints for reeling in a catch.

Locally the following areas were recently stocked with Rainbow Trout:

- 300 in the Glenlyon Dam
- 300 in the Hanging Rock Lake, Woodend
- 300 in the Jubilee Lake, Daylesford

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
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

Seasonal fire prevention works starting ahead of summer

Annual fire prevention activities in Council-managed areas are ramping up in coming weeks, aiming to keep grass low and trees a safe distance away from powerlines.

Council's roadside grass slashing program is already underway, while an electric line vegetation clearance program is set to begin. Additionally, private property inspections targeting potential fire risks will commence in early November.

CEO Bernie O'Sullivan said contractors started roadside grass slashing in Malmsbury and would be gradually working their way south, to provide initial coverage of the shire.

"This program prioritises high-use Council-managed roads and our contractors work within strict guidelines to complete these works safely," he said.

"Cutting grass on these roadsides, combined with other activities such as the powerline clearance works and property inspections, is all part of our efforts to proactively protect our townships and residents ahead of the higher-risk fire season."

In the lead up to summer, and during summer when safe, Council slashes roadsides to reduce the likelihood of fires starting from hot vehicle exhausts, mechanical failures and collisions. Transport Victoria manages the roadside maintenance of state-managed roadsides.

Council is responsible for keeping powerlines clear of vegetation on nature strips and Council-owned properties within declared areas of Gisborne and Kyneton. Powercor is responsible for most other nondeclared areas of the shire, with Jemena responsible for Gisborne South.

As part of the program, qualified arborists inspect street trees and powerlines to identify potential breaches of clearance guidelines and organise trimming where appropriate, adhering to Council's Electric Line Clearance Management Plan 2024-25.


