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Festival brings authentic experiences to the Macedon Ranges

Fresh on the heels of a successful sold-out Launch concert in March, arts lovers from throughout Victoria have wasted no time in booking tickets for the Woodend Winter Arts Festival, to be held in June over the King's Birthday long weekend.

2024's festival will be the 19th in over 21 years of operations! And this year, more than 100 performers and speakers will bring the arts to the Macedon Ranges, in what is now widely considered to be a sustainable and authentic approach. Despite the downward trends of other festivals, WWAF is selling wonderfully well at pre-pandemic levels, so don't leave buying your tickets to the last moment – and the same goes for accommodation. If you have visitors coming up from Melbourne, suggest they visit www.visitmacedonranges.com and book soon!

Each year, the Festival committee and volunteers work tirelessly to bring a wide range of music, arts and discussions to the local community. The Festival prides itself on bringing excellence and originality to local audiences, with a program of Baroque delights, artistic endeavours and a curated Words & Ideas program that includes science and music discussions. Following the community fireworks, the festival starts with a rich concert of Spanish Flamenco guitar and dance, featuring Paco Lara and Deya Giner.

Musical delights include Bach's St John's Passion – a monumental work of baroque instruments and outstanding soloists – which will be performed on both Saturday and Sunday. Throughout the weekend, music lovers will find Piers Lane on piano, Accademia Arcadia performing early Baroque pieces, Paul Grabowksy on piano performing from his own jazz works, Fiore Vocal Ensemble and Schubert Lieder with the Macedon Ranges' own Daniel Thomson and John O'Donnell. To finish the festival, a special concert from Nat Bartsch with her jazz quartet performing pieces from her ARIAnominated album will feature on Monday afternoon.

Interspersed throughout the music events are a rich tapestry of panels and book discussions with Elizabeth Finkel, Andrew Ford, Jacky Ogeil, Peter Doherty, Gideon Haigh, Robyn Williams, Jenny Graves, George Megalogenis, Don Watson and Sally Warhaft.

A new Probus Club has been formed in Woodend following its initial meeting on 19 April.

The purpose of the inaugural meeting was to gauge the community interest in a new club and to select a management committee. Chris Gilman was appointed as president, Patricia Morgan as vice president, Shane Doyle as secretary, and Jennifer Ryan was

elected treasurer.

Michael Ransom, chair of the Board of Probus in Australia and New Zealand convened the meeting, and members of the Woodend Rotary Club and the Jacksons Creek Probus Club were present to help explain the benefits of Probus membership to those present.

Michael Ransom said, "Probus is a wonderful organisation for people who are retired or semi-retired. When you retire, sometimes you don't have a lot of friends because work has been your life, you don't know a lot of people in your local community, and it can be a lonely time."

The new club will meet monthly at the Norma Richardson Hall in Buckland Street Woodend, on the third Friday of the month at 10am. Rotary on the Move





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Meet a local resident – James Ryssenbeek



The Rotary Club of Woodend had the pleasure of welcoming James as a guest speaker at our regular meeting, and he gave us a very entertaining insight into his passion; sailing. James is a local resident and the son of Joop and Jenny Ryssenbeek, members of the Rotary Club of Woodend.

James started his sailing career with dinghys and catamarans and he and his father Joop both went to the oldest sailing school in the Netherlands. Watching some of the short videos James showed us, we wondered why anyone would entertain doing the Sydney to Hobart Yacht Race! Of that event, James said that every race must have a safe crew, with many doing courses such as first aid, navigation etc. Nothing is done by an individual, and you do have to know what the person next to you is responsible for. It is quite dangerous and everyone must be tethered at all times they are on deck. James showed us his waterproof clothing, including jackets, boots, trousers and other equipment he needed to wear while sailing. A total kit costs around \$3000 to \$4000. "Life on board is a challenge. The crew is usually made up of twelve sailors, rotating with three hours on top deck, and then three hours' sleep in between. The space is limited, so everything is shared, including bunks. A third of the crew gets seasick and medication doesn't work, and to help you cope there is also a morale officer!" James said. "There can be 52 sail changes in three days, and you really put yourself against nature. It is an expensive hobby, where the crew pay for all their expenses, including splitting the food bill.

James has sailed the Sydney to Hobart Yacht Race on three occasions – it is 630 nautical miles and viewed as one of the most challenging yacht races in the world. He has used this race to train for entering the Melbourne to Osaka yacht race.

"The Melbourne Osaka Cup is a unique and challenging ocean yacht race. Previous competitors call it their pinnacle of racing, and it attracts sailors who enjoy the distinctive satisfaction of short-handed sailing. This ocean race requires significant preparation for crews and boat alike, and a long lead time is necessary to get to the start line in March 2025.

"The average elapsed time for the race is 35 days, with the record of 21 days set in 2018 by the Sydney yacht Chinese Whisper. A staggered start over three weeks brings the boats of differing speeds together towards the finish line, with results calculated from handicaps applied to their elapsed time. The race is a substantial test of the crews' skill, courage, and endurance through eight weather patterns, in potentially extreme conditions. It is the longest, most challenging ocean race to start in Australian waters and is the equivalent of nine Sydney to Hobart Yacht Races continuously sailed." James finished by saying that sailing into the Derwent River harbour is spectacular and then coming home around the West Coast of Tasmania can be relaxing (depending on the weather).

We will definitely invite James back to speak about his sail in the Melbourne Osaka.

You would have noticed it getting a little colder recently and many of you may have already started up your heating systems so you and your family can stay nice and warm. This is not possible for many of our fellow Victorians doing it tough and sleeping rough.

Over the past decade, Woodend Rotary has coordinated a blanket drive and had great support from you, the Woodend community. Your support is needed again this year as Woodend Rotary coordinates collection of the following items:

- Blankets, sleeping bags (no doonas please)
- Coats
- Belts
- Underwear and socks (must be new/all sizes/men and women)

All items must be clean and in good order. The basic rule is if you wouldn't give it to a friend then don't give it to us.

Items can be dropped off at Mort & Pestle (during business hours only); with the collection continuing until the end of May. Mort & Pestle continue to be a great support to the community and to Woodend Rotary. Items are collected and delivered to The Living Room, located in Hosier Lane in Melbourne to make a real and immediate impact to those in need.

The Living Room is part of Youth Projects and offers a wonderful service to the homeless in and around the city by providing free healthcare and support to improve the physical, mental and social well-being of individuals who are homeless, or are at risk of experiencing homelessness. It is a safe place for people to not only to receive health care but also wash and dry clothes, use computers, and have a meal and a shower. 

However, fires can only be lit in the Macedon Ranges Shire under certain conditions, depending on when you want to burn off, the size of your land and the amount of vegetation you need to burn. Please check the Macedon Ranges Shire Council website for the details.

If you are able to burn off, please remember a few simple rules: always clear an area around your fire, don't locate it too close to trees or bush, make sure someone is always present and make sure you have the means to extinguish a fire should it spread.

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

Woodend Warblers perform at CresFest 2024

On Saturday 6 April in Creswick, the streets were alive with the annual CresFest celebration of music and arts, a weekend of dancing, busking, international musicians and a variety of choirs – including the Macedon Ranges' own much-loved Warblers. The Woodend Warblers have performed many public gigs before, but this one was considered by many to be their best ever. Sung to the crowd from the steps of Creswick's historic post office, their repertoire ranged from the gentle "Won't Let You Drown" to a lively performance of the Beach Boys' "Fun Fun Fun", which had audience members smiling and dancing. A particular favourite was "Freedom is Coming", a gospel song written by those committed to ending apartheid in South Africa.

One of the Warblers' original sopranos Trish said, "I immediately felt at home in Creswick on finding the pub full at ten in the morning, with the strains of an Irish jig flowing out onto the street!" Another soprano, Rachel, commented afterwards, "CresFest was such a special event for us. The crowd was so engaged and warm – just a delight to perform for!"

The Woodend Warblers have been in existence for six years now, growing from a small group of beginners who swore they couldn't sing and would definitely never perform in public, to a confident choir of thirty regular members who love nothing more than showing off their latest songs to anyone who'll listen.

A member from another choir commented: "The Warblers really are a cut above: so professional and solid in their songs". And an audience member expressed delight that a community choir could sound so good – "fabulous variety of songs and really good harmonies." These comments are a credit to the

hard work that Andrew Price, choir director, puts into teaching the Warblers every week. They meet at 7.30pm on Wednesdays at the Norma Richardson Hall in Woodend. Andrew reassures new members that no singing experience is required, that "if you can speak, you can sing". Plenty of mistakes are made, but Andrew has endless patience



and is very encouraging: rehearsals are full of laughter and everyone is made to feel an important part of the choir.

Bass singer Max became quite poetic in his praise of the day: "Music in the country is the road to happiness, and singing is the highway to enjoyment". As a finale and a surprise to the audience, the Warblers "interrupted" another choir (run by Melbourne director Sue Johnson)

performing a brand new song which the Warblers had been practising in secret. Singers were astonished to suddenly find a flash mob of Warblers joining them on stage for a dramatic performance of "Laid Bare", written by Sue only a few months earlier.

The Woodend Warblers have members from as far afield as Northcote and Castlemaine and welcome new singers. The first session is free, and term fees are \$10 per week (or \$12 for a single week). Ring Andrew Price for more information 0419 604 444 – or just turn up!

The final word goes to tenor singer Marina, who has been with the choir since its early days: "You couldn't find a better or friendlier mob of people to sing with. To be honest, Warblers literally changed my life."

Council programs finalists in industry excellence awards

Two Council programs driving sustainable agriculture practices and waste reduction measures have been announced as finalists in the 2024 LGPro Awards for Excellence.

The Healthy Landscapes program and a suite of practical Resource Recovery initiatives have both been nominated in the Sustainability Initiative category as part of the annual awards, which recognise the outstanding work by individuals and teams working in local government in Victoria.

The Sustainability Initiative category recognises initiatives that demonstrate excellence in the delivery of environmentally sustainable processes or projects, ensuring present needs are met without compromising future generations.

Council's increased efforts to 'close the loop' in recent years have led to a range of initiatives being implemented, all aimed at helping residents recycle more and waste less; from being one of the first Victorian councils to implement a shire-wide four-bin system, to partnering with the Australian Food and Grocery Council on a soft plastic recycling trial in Romsey, and recently introducing polystyrene and textile recycling at resource recovery facilities.

The above initiatives have resulted in more than:

- 5,700 tonnes of glass, 28,900 tonnes of green waste (FOGO) and 8,400 tonnes of recycling being diverted from landfill
- two tonnes of soft plastic being collected and processed into reusable oil
- 300 m3 of polystyrene and 11 tonnes of textiles diverted from landfill.

In 2023, Council's landfill diversion rate was 72 per cent - much higher than the average Victorian municipal diversion rate of 48 per cent.

Council's CEO, Bernie O'Sullivan, said it was pleasing to see Council recognised for its proactive approach to waste management.

"Our Council is committed to implementing innovative recycling options and diverting as much waste from landfill as possible, reflecting a strong desire and commitment from our community," he said.

"The combined effort of these initiatives over the last few years has seen an increase in the recyclability of many items, as well as reduced contamination rates. This has enabled us to achieve some of the highest diversion rates from landfill when compared with other councils."

Separately, the Healthy Landscapes program was introduced to provide practical education to private land managers, enhancing property productivity, biodiversity, waterway health, and resilience to climate change. The program is tailored to diverse land managers with grazing livestock (such as chickens, cattle, sheep and horses) and cropping interests, offering localised information.

Since 2019, the program has accomplished:

- 22 webinars to more than 2,000 participants
- 29 field days with more than 630 participants
- six courses enabling environmental change across about 4,000 hectares
- 170 property visits. The program has now grown into a unique partnership funded by three councils - Macedon Ranges Shire Council, Hepburn Shire Council and City of Greater Bendigo - in addition to the North Central Catchment Management Authority, Coliban Water, Melbourne Water and the Upper Campaspe Landcare Network. Mount Alexander Shire Council has also recently confirmed it will join the partnership in July 2024, further expanding the program.

"Since its implementation, the Healthy Landscapes program has successfully engaged private land managers and encouraged changes that enhance their resilience, benefitting the broader community," Mr O'Sullivan said.

"We are very excited that these two initiatives have been recognised for the positive impact they have had on our community and the environment, and we look forward to seeing the outcome of the awards."

The winner will be announced at the 2024 LGPro Annual Conference Awards Dinner, to be held on Thursday 2 May at the MCG (Melbourne Cricket Ground).

Platypus sighting in Five Mile Creek

We know that there are platypus in the Campaspe River just downstream of Woodend, and we also know that on rare occasions, one will travel upstream to visit Woodend.



Native water rats (rakali) are also sometimes seen in the creek and can be identified by the white tip on their tails.

When they are swimming, they can easily be mistaken for platypus, but in early 2008 there was a definite sighting of a platypus in the pool immediately downstream of the High Street bridge.

Landcare obtained a small grant and we planted 500 trees and shrubs in November of 2008 to celebrate the sighting of the platypus and enhance the habitat in the vicinity.

Recently there was another platypus sighting in the creek in

another location. That was after a long dry period, so it must have made the journey up the creek from the Campaspe and up Five Mile Creek in part by water, and overland. They are known to be happy to travel over land, sometimes for up to one kilometre, but they are very vulnerable to predators when they are in the open. This platypus may have been a juvenile looking for its own territory.



Obviously, the water quality in the creek is is reasonably good, even in the heart of the town, at least this platypus seemed to think so! Platypus mainly feed on aquatic insects, worms, water snails and even yabbies, which tend to move downstream if water quality deteriorates, due to things like silt from soil disturbance or pollution. Platypus also need a reliable water depth if they want to settle and plenty of creekside shelter in the form of vegetation for shade and protection from predators.

If you are lucky enough to see a platypus, please contact Woodend Landcare or the Platypus Conservancy, which is based nearby in Campbells Creek.

Electrify 3442 Update

The Electrify 3442 Community Forum held on Sunday 21 April was an opportunity to share the results of the Community Survey, launch the Household Electrification Planner and test some ideas for future events

The survey garnered responses from 2.5% of households through the 3442 postcode area. 75% of survey respondents already have solar at home. There is a willingness to explore home batteries, electric vehicles and other efficient electric appliances; and barriers to updating included existing functional appliances (no need to replace yet), cost, and a need for reliable information to support decision making.

The team launched a prototype of our Household Electrification Planner, which will be expanded over coming months to include information about each of the six electrification targets (home heating and cooling, hot water, cooking, electric vehicle, solar and battery). We are encouraging households to investigate their current household energy consumption and cost, and the age of their existing appliances as a first step to creating their own electrification plans.

Forum participants provided feedback on a "menu" of potential followup activities, ranging from individual reviews of electrification plans, to bulk buys of appliances. The Electrify 3442 team will analyse the results, formulate a plan and work on delivery over the coming months.



Register your burn-offs as Fire Danger Period ends

The Fire Danger Period for the Macedon Ranges has now concluded (as of 1am on Monday 15 April), following notice by the Country Fire Authority (CFA). Residents on land over 2,000 square metres are now allowed to burn-off, however they must ensure they are abiding by Council local laws and register their burn-off at firepermits.vic.gov.au or by calling 1800 668 511.

Council's Director Community, Maria Weiss, said Macedon Ranges residents should remain vigilant, plan property clean-ups in accordance with weather conditions and check with Council to see if a permit is required before burning off.

"Even though the Fire Danger Period has ended, there is still a risk that bush or grass fires can occur," she said.

"It's important residents continue to clean up and maintain their properties throughout the year to minimise risk and ensure their properties are ready when the next Fire Danger Period comes around."

Residents are also reminded of changes to the Community Local Law in late 2023 including:

- burning-off is now prohibited on land 2,000 square metres or less,
- a permit is required for burning off on land more than 2,000 square metres and equal to or less than 4,000 square metres.

"If in doubt about whether or not a permit is required, please check with Council first," said Ms Weiss.

When burning off, residents are also reminded to:

- ensure weather conditions are safe for burning off and that burn piles do not exceed the size conducive to their land, as set out in the local laws
- check for overhanging branches that could catch fire, and ensure there is adequate fire suppression or extinguishing equipment on hand
- check for wildlife that may be nesting in burn piles
- ensure smoke does not cause a hazard to road users or a nuisance to neighbours

Free green waste disposal is also currently available for residents at Council's transfer stations in Kyneton, Romsey and Woodend.

Reminder for dogs to be onleash in public

Council's Local Laws Officers are concerned about an increasing number of reports for dogs off leash when being walked in public places.

Dog owners are reminded that Macedon Ranges is an 'on-leash' shire where dogs must be always on-leash, unless in one of Council's 52 designated off-leash areas. Dogs must also be under effective control at all times, whether in an off-leash area or not.

Council officers patrol for possible breaches, and dog owners not adhering to the requirements may face fines for not complying with Council's Dog and Cat Control Order 2019.

The forum speakers combined to present a valuable overview of the problem, particularly here in the Macedon Ranges. Council is looking forward to working with our partners to progress a key action in Council's Mobility and Road Safety Strategy 2023, namely Strategic Theme 5: Improving Wildlife Safety and Outcomes.

The forum also helped to drive a Notice of Motion endorsed by Council at the March 2024 Council Meeting. At the Australian Local Government Association's National General Assembly in July, Council will submit a motion calling on the Australian Government to include wildlife trauma and fatalities metrics in Federal road safety funding models. Council will also write to a number of relevant Federal and State Ministers advocating this point.

Author Talk – In Conversation with Melinda Ham



Life changed for Melinda Ham when she was eleven years of age and her parents

separated. Her comfortable life in a middle-class Toronto suburb was over. Together with her mother and three siblings she moved to the inner city – a world crowded with immigrants and refugees. She met people from across the globe and was, "swept up in the excitement of my friends' cultures".

A keen diarist, even at that early age, Melinda had found her purpose. She wanted to write and she wanted to travel.

Decades later, and the dream has been realised. She and her husband, Mike, have travelled extensively in Africa and India, reporting on natural disasters, civil unrest and refugee crises.

Now living in Australia, Mike and Melinda have never forgotten the suffering they witnessed amongst people displaced by natural and manmade disasters. Melinda's response has found voice in The Lucky Ones, a narrative spanning four continents and seven decades, relating tales of survival from Poland and Tibet, Vietnam and Iraq, Afghanistan and the Democratic Republic of the Congo.

The people in these stories have endured trauma, terror and abuse along the way, in their journey to safety in Australia. They come from disparate backgrounds, yet they share common sentiments: gratitude for the country that gave them sanctuary, respect for the freedoms they now enjoy, and a determination to live successful lives.



Behrouz Boochani is set to open RAR National Conference in Kyneton

The refugee who wrote his award-winning book No Friends but the Mountains on a mobile phone while imprisoned on Manus Island will be keynote speaker at the Rural Australians for Refugees National Conference to be held in Kyneton later this year.

Behrouz Boochani, a Kurdish-Iranian journalist permanently refused asylum in Australia, won both the Victorian Prize for Literature and the Prize for Non-Fiction at the 2019 Victorian Premier's Literary Awards.

After travelling on a visitor visa to New Zealand, Boochani was later granted permanent residency there. He is now a senior research academic at the University of Canterbury in New Zealand.

Macedon Ranges Rural Australians for Refugees (MRRAR) is host organiser of the 2024 RAR National Conference, which is to be held on 11–13 October, and is being supported by the Macedon Ranges Shire Council (MRSC).

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Shout-out for Scottish Terriers

Hello,

My name is Manda Appleyard. And I have lived in rural Australia for most of my life. I love my local community publications and always find something interesting to read in them. That is the reason I thought I would reach out to community publications like yours and hope that a little reminder article might inspire people to



consider this blast from the past survivor, who is surely most relevant for modern lifestyles.

I am a Scottish Terrier fan and have had Scotties in my life since 1969. Scotties have brought me so much joy in my life, I struggle to understand why the Scottish Terrier has been listed as an endangered species. There has been a significant global decline in Scottish Terrier numbers. The Scottie was once very popular here in Australia. Everyone at least knew someone that had one of those funny little Scots with the big beard, big eyebrows and huge character.

Since the introduction of designer breeds developed by crossing smaller breeds together, it seems that everyone has forgotten what great family members and mates Scottish Terriers are.

The Scottish Terrier is a big dog in a little body. This compact, short legged, sturdily built terrier of good bone and substance is very intelligent and quite a sensible dog. They mature very quickly and are a lot less destructive than many other breeds. They are great guard dogs because they don't bark without reason. They have a deep bark which makes them sound like a much bigger dog. The Scottie is a robust breed requiring little or no veterinary intervention, and their versatility is unsurpassed. They adapt to any environment equally at home from the farmhouse to apartment living. They even make great travel companions and love caravan holidays. They are couch potatoes that suddenly spring to action whenever there is anything afoot.

The Scottish Terrier is loyal and does not suffer from separation anxiety. When left alone they will just laze about and wait for your return.

The Scottish Terrier is hypoallergenic as they do not shed hair. A medium level of grooming is required, but a good brush once a week and a trip to the groomers every three months is all that is required. They are truly worthy of consideration when you are next considering a new addition to your family.

I always say, "If it isn't a Scottie it is just a dog..."

Maintaining tradition

The Marist Brothers came to Kyneton on Sunday July 25, 1926, and commenced teaching the next day, at St Mary's school, where a large classroom was placed at the Brothers' disposal. Later, their permanent building was constructed at the corner of Powlett and Hutton Street. The building is still standing and occupied.

To commemorate the Brothers' arrival, a 21st birthday celebration was held in Kyneton on 2–3 August 1947, when 150 past students gathered at a reunion dinner from many parts of Victoria, and later formed an Old Boys association.

The association continues as part of the fabric of Kyneton and each year holds an annual reunion. The seventy-seventh event came to pass on Sunday 28 January 2024, when 43 members and family attended a luncheon at the Shamrock Hotel. More than a dozen apologies were recorded, indicating that past pupils of the school maintain an interest.

With the passing of seven and a half decades, expecting the attendance to remain at 150 is unrealistic. Those originals identified as deceased are included in the Association web site on the Honour Roll, which numbers close to 400. Unfortunately, all records of the school were lost after the closure and determining the names of past pupils is a difficult task. Readers are encouraged to check kynetonmaristbrothersoldboyes.com.au/deceased-old-boyshonour-roll/ and provide any information that is not included.

The last year the Brothers taught at Kyneton was 1967. Brother Kevin Hoare and Brother Peter Howes, along with the late Brother Arnold (Leo McVeigh) saw in and out the final years. Brother Kevin, now living at Bendigo, again came to the luncheon and was busy networking.

The meals provided by the hotel catering staff were generous and delicious. Formalities of the day were limited, with a short address by President Roly Sandilands and a memorial address covering the six members whose deaths had been advised since our last assembly.

Covid markedly affected the fundraising activities of the Old Boys Association. Community support has continued, despite meagre resources.

July 2026 will be the centenary of the Marist Brothers coming to Kyneton, and after next year's reunion, which will be on Sunday 26 January, the Management Committee will consider if something special can be done for the momentous occasion.

Regular attendee Helen McDonald talks about the experience of watching a new poet – whether young or old – get up to the microphone for the first time, often feeling vulnerable and frightened. They read from a page (or a phone or iPad) which is trembling in their hands, their voice breaking. But they push on and finish. "It can be quite moving to watch that brave determination," Helen commented. "They have something important to say, and they will find the courage to say it." Without exception, these new poets receive warm applause and friendly comments afterwards.

Russell Forster, who regularly attends with his guitar has this to say about Chamber Poets: "It's a deep draught of rich cultural air to stimulate the body, invigorate the mind and resonate with the soul". For those who can think of only poetry in dreary English lessons in high school – we recommend coming along with an open mind to see what you make of twenty-first century poetry!

Entertainment is provided by local band Black Forest Smoke who have been playing their home-made songs – often poems set to music – since Chamber Poets first started on 16 February 2013. Eccentric, playful and often very moving, their songs are very popular with the crowd. A recent guest commented "Chamber Poets begins with us being gently rocked with music – then comes the laughter – and then a break for food and drink and reflection – it's always so enjoyable!"

Held on the second Saturday of each month, the next Chamber Poets session will be held at 1 pm on Saturday 11 May at the Woodend RSL in Anslow Street. Entry is \$10 (or \$5 concession) – we're a bit old fashioned and only take cash! The bar will be open, and hot drinks and delicious soups, cakes and snacks are available. After the always-popular Open Mic section, our featured reader will be Kyneton poet Anne Gleeson, whose gentle and often humorous poems have been widely awarded and admired. Come along and see what all the fuss is about!

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Vale Norma Richardson

A life lived in service to her community

"She lived a life of charity and kind-heartedness, she was an empathetic woman filled with wisdom and strength, with the fragility of a heart that had loved and lost." – Rev Mel

The Woodend community came together to celebrate the life of Norma Richardson at St Mary's on the 10th of April. Norma was an icon of Woodend from her arrival in town as a 19-year-old bride in 1949 until her death on Easter Sunday 2024. She joined the parish of St Mary's and for over 60 years worked with the Guild of the church, cleaning and decorating the church with flowers each Sunday; she baked thousands of scones and nut loaves for street stalls, and you were truly blessed if you managed to procure one of her sponges, or the countless pairs of baby booties or cardigans she knitted.

In 2007, the new church hall was named in her honour for her countless years of dedication, an act that humbled her immensely. She was an active member of the CWA, the Kyneton Hospital Auxiliary, The Royal Institute of the Blind Auxiliary, The Red Cross and numerous other community groups; she volunteered at the local visitor information centre and was delivering meals-onwheels until she was well into her 80s. Through her children and grandchildren she did voluntary work for the Air Cadets, Scouts Calisthenics and CFA. A Facebook post announcing her death to the community garnered over 340 comments, many of them sharing stories of acts of kindness of which the family were unaware, but that was Norma, a quiet, unassuming woman who lived a life of service to her family her god and her community, never seeking recognition or accolades, just reaching out and helping in every way she could.

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Victorian kids set summer reading record

Over 16,000 children and young people across Victoria have set a new reading record in this year's Big Summer Read, supported by the state Government. Public libraries in Victoria are celebrating a 40 per cent increase in the number of kids registered in this year's challenge, with over 218,000 books read over the recent school holidays – a 63 per cent increase on last summer.

The Big Summer Read is held from 1 December to 31 January each year and aims to prevent a decrease in kids' reading during school holidays. Member for Macedon Mary-Anne Thomas said of the program, "losing yourself in a good book is a great way to enjoy the summer holidays and develop reading skills, and it's exciting to see so many young people in our community getting involved in the Big Summer Read."

The Government's Premiers' Reading Challenge complements this effort by encouraging children and students to read books over the year and record their efforts online. Since it began in 2005, more than 4.3 million students have read over 60 million books. The Challenge is supported by the state Premiers' Reading Challenge Book Fund, which provides \$1.1 million for public libraries to purchase books and other materials.

Literacy is supported by free library services, including internet and cyber safe education, and the Government's Living Libraries Infrastructure Program provides funding for libraries to improve their facilities. More than \$47.1 million dollars over the last eight years into 120 library infrastructure projects, with a total project cost of \$345.8 million. These projects support libraries to provide services in metropolitan, regional and rural Victoria. Support for disability self-help groups

Two community groups in the Macedon Rangese have been awarded grants that will help people with a disability in the region to get the peer support they need.

Member for Macedon, Mary-Anne Thomas last month announced that the Macedon Ranges Autism Network and PS My Family Matters are two of 72 groups set to receive a grant as part of the latest Disability Self-Help Grants Program funding round.

"This investment will support our local members of PS My Family Matters and the Macedon Ranges Autism Network to share their experiences and support each other," said Ms Thomas. The grants, valued at up to \$14,000 over two years, strengthen social, emotional and practical support provided to people with disability and their families or carers. The grants help disability support groups meet general expenses, fund minor works and purchase equipment, and for the first time, they can be used to support activities that celebrate pride and recognition or pay for guest speakers.

Self-help groups bring people with disability and their families together to share insights,



provide information, promote community participation and support networking.

Applications for the grants round were open to Victorian-based disability self-help groups, with a focus in this round of funding on groups supporting First Nations people, young people, women and girls, people from multiculturally diverse backgrounds, autistic and neurodiverse people and people who identify as LGBQITA+, as well as those providing support to regional and rural members. We're over halfway through autumn and winter is coming ... does your dog prefer to sleep in front of the fire when temperatures drop, or does it love being outside in the cold, rain, hail or shine? As dog owners there are some important things we can do to make sure our four-legged friends stay healthy and safe. Lots of dog owners believe that dogs can tolerate the cold because they have fur; this is not necessarily the case. Here are some tips to make winter better for them:

- 1. Make sure your dog has access to shelter from the elements and warm bedding, like straw or blankets if sleeping or spending long periods of time outside.
- 2. increase their lean energy intake rather than fat content, so your dog maintains body condition rather than gains weight over winter
- 3. Ensure they have fresh water at all times to protect their skin from drying out
- Whether they're an inside dog or an outside dog, your dog still requires regular exercise for physical and mental health. Twenty minutes daily will encourage good blood circulation and muscle tone.
- 5. Regular grooming will help them maintain a healthy coat. however, don't trim their coat, and remember, some dogs need to wear an extra jacket/coat/jumper to be warm enough.
- 6. Dogs are more susceptible to illness during colder months as their immune system is a little weaker ... like a human's immune systems can be.
- 7. Take care around fires, heaters, and other heat sources. Letting your dog sit or sleep too close to heat can cause burns, or dry out their skin.

In addition, Council will be holding some evening sessions for free vaccines under the National Immunisation Program (NIP). During these sessions, Council will offer infant vaccines for children aged between six weeks to five years, high school vaccines, and flu vaccines for individuals aged between six weeks to five years.

The evening sessions will be run from 5-7pm on Wednesday 8 May at Woodend, and Thursday 30 May and Thursday 27 June in Gisborne.



10 Tips if you are Selling in 2024

1. Be Positive

The world has changed a little but the market has not collapsed. Sure, the buoyant Covid19-driven boom conditions of late 2021, 2022 and early 2023 market are no more. Many buyers are worried about the cost of living, higher interest rates have reduced the amount people can borrow and the banks are applying very strict lending criteria particularly for rural-zoned properties, valuers are cautious, and then there's the wars in Ukraine and Israel etc. *However, be positive as good sales are still being made.*

2. Be Priced Correctly

The market is very price sensitive. If properties are priced realistically they will attract good levels of enquiry and sell. Properties of vendors seeking boom-level prices will be ignored - except maybe for unique top end turn-key properties. Those who embrace the new market reality will sell. Some properties on the market are clearly overpriced. If their vendors really want to sell but don't make price adjustments to meet the market, their properties might still be unsold in 6 – 12 months' time. *Price correctly to sell sooner.*

3. Be Pragmatic

Vendors had been riding an upward market for several years, when they could say, "Buyers are like buses; if you miss one, another comes along". A more pragmatic approach is now called for. There might well be another buyer – but they might arrive much later and at a much lower price. **Be pragmatic. Deal with the buyer you have now.**

4. Be Thankful

In the vast majority of cases, any "loss" a vendor might feel they are suffering is simply a paper loss. Most vendors who are selling during 2024, will sell for a healthy profit over what they paid even just a few years ago. **Be thankful for a sale.**

5. Be Philosophical

Markets go up and down. If selling for a little less than what you might have achieved a year or two ago is the worst thing that has happened to you in your life, you've led a pretty charmed life. And, if you sell today for a lower price, you will most likely buy your next home for less than what you would have paid a couple of years ago. *Be philosophical. See the bigger picture.*

6. Be Sensible

Avoid the clichés. "I don't have to sell" and "I'm not going to give my house away" are emotional reactions that don't advance the cause. Sure, you might not have to sell, just as buyers don't have to buy.

7. Be Prepared to Negotiate

Serious buyers will engage with serious vendors. Buyers will ignore vendors who are not serious about selling.

8. Be Resilient

Offers will come in at prices below your desired range. Don't be shocked. Don't be insulted. Don't take the view: "If that's all they're prepared to offer, they can jump in the lake". Rather, take the view: "The buyers are saying they would like to buy my house. This is good news. I'm pleased they have started negotiations. Let's do so". *Make the most of the positives. Be resilient.*

9. Be Patient

It might take longer to find a buyer and to finalise negotiations than you anticipated as buyers might lack a sense of urgency. Between 2021-2023, many buyers had a "fear of missing out" (FOMO). This is not the current situation. Some buyers now have a fear of over-paying (FOOP)!

10. Be Guided

At Keatings Real Estate, we have been through several boom and bust cycles, droughts and bushfires, recessions, the global financial crisis, the Asian financial crisis and the dot com crash etc. We have seen most things before.

It's in times such as now that wisdom and guidance becomes even more valuable.




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An Enterprising Trio





Exploring Digital Technologies in the Junior Years

This year our talented Year 7 and 8 Robotics students embarked on an exciting journey of engineering and innovation. Students built and programmed their Lego Mindstorm robots to move in the form of shapes and several students successfully used the sensors, which included distance recognition, to avoid any obstacles. Through this hands-on experience they gained invaluable skills in problem-solving, teamwork and critical thinking. Students also researched several robots of their choosing, looking at the key design elements of each, impact on the community, pros and cons of their use, and presented this information as part of a functional website.

Year 9 Accelerated Computing students learned how to build a home network for a client. This included the workings of hardware, software and how computers are connected to the internet. Students learned how to use common formulas and functions in Excel and how to develop a database using Access. In the VR space, students experienced a new virtual reality environment known as Avantis World, using a joystick controller to navigate streets, buildings and homes that were virtually created, to see how computers and networks are connected. They were also able to explore the inside of a mobile phone and a computer before completing a quiz to demonstrate their understanding of the technical language covered.

Year 9 Interactive Gaming and Coding students used GameMaker to create simple games such as space shooter, space rocks and extend a platformer game. They learned about algorithm and programming theory, exploring concepts such as flowcharts and pseudocode as part of program design. The essentials of good game design was also studied before being challenged to use software to design their own 3D Virtual Reality game, that could be played using the ClassVR headsets and joystick controller.

These subjects, offered in the Junior School, provide a hands-on introduction to Digital Technologies which can be further extended in the Senior School. Students in the VCE years have the opportunity to study Applied Computing and Data Analytics, which covers four key concepts: digital systems, data and information, approaches to problem solving, and interactions and impact. This exposure to the real-world applications of robotics, problem-solving, and coding sets a strong foundation for further exploration in technology- related fields.
