Take the lead on the shire's dog offleash and prohibited areas

Council is inviting feedback on its designated dog off-leash and prohibited areas across the shire, to help improve amenity for pet owners and non-pet owners alike.

In 2020, Council became a dog on-leash shire, introducing 52 designated dog off-leash areas. At the same time, Council introduced prohibited areas to protect the shire's sensitive native environment from the impact of dogs and cats.

This consultation – a key action in Council's Domestic Animal Management Plan (2021-2025) – seeks feedback on how these areas are working and welcomes suggestions for improvement of existing areas, as well as suggestions for new areas to be considered.

Director Planning and Environment Rebecca Stockfeld said the consultation provided the opportunity for feedback from all users of these areas, both pet owners and non-pet owners alike.

"Council strives to support a pet-friendly shire and we have a lot of passionate pet owners, with nearly 14,000 dogs and cats registered within our shire," she said.

"There are a number of important considerations when it comes to dog on and off-leash areas and prohibited areas: we need to balance the needs of dogs, dog owners and the wider community, we look at available space and we also consider the impact of pets on the natural environment.

"So with this review, we encourage people to tell us what they think of these areas, so that we can make informed decisions moving forward to best support our residents and our furry friends."

Under current rules, dogs in public places must be on a leash, unless in designated off-leash areas in accordance with any specified restrictions for that area. Even in off-leash areas, dogs must also be under effective control at all times and should not be left unattended.

Feedback gathered will assist Council in preparing potential activities for inclusion in the next Domestic Animal Management Plan (2025 -2029), including any adjustments to the dog off-leash and prohibited areas (also known as Council's Dog and Cat Order 2019).

Youthrive Victoria scholarships now open

Applications for Youthrive Victoria's current round of scholarships is now open to rural and regional Victorian students planning to undertake further study in 2025.

Each year, the local not-for-profit provides a number of scholarships to Year 12 students who plan to undertake university studies or further develop skills through vocational training.

In 2023, eleven Youthrive Victoria Rural University scholarships and twenty-one Rural Chances scholarships were awarded to young rural and regional Victorians looking to undertake further study in 2024.

Thanks to funding generously provided by philanthropic donors, ten university scholarships (\$10,000 per year for three years) and twenty vocational scholarships (up to \$5000) have been made available to young rural Victorians wanting to up-skill or pursue tertiary study in

Youthrive Victoria CEO Andrew McGuckian said, "We believe that our scholarships and programs are helping to create positive outcomes for students from rural and regional Victoria and hope to see a large number of applications for both our university and TAFE scholarships this year."

The scholarships provide financial support to assist with living expenses and travel costs, specifically addressing the needs of students from regional areas. Youthrive Victoria also offers 'Wrap

Around Care', which includes mentoring, capacity building and development opportunities.

The impact and importance of scholarships is widely acknowledged and can often lead to very different outcomes for students who may not be able to consider further studies due to costs and/or regional

Molly, a 2024 Youthrive Victoria university scholar, touches on how the scholarship has impacted her. "The scholarship has empowered me to not only focus on my studies but also actively engage in initiatives aimed at improving rural areas.

"It relieved the financial stress of the many expenses associated with university, and the money has allowed me to focus on my studies and engage in community service activities, such as taking over the social media and coaching at the Newlyn FNC to enhance my own local community." University scholarship applications are now open, and close on 23 August 2024. Rural Chances vocational scholarships are now open, and close 14 November.

Woodend Scouts get out and about

1st Woodend Scouts have been out and about exploring some of Victoria's most beautiful outdoor areas, with trips to Tallarook State Forest and Baw Baw National Park in recent months.

In May, 1,200 scouts from all over Victoria came together for the annual 'Scout Hike' weekend in Tallarook. 1st Woodend had three patrols participating in this challenging, yet rewarding event, where scouts learnt about lightweight camping and hiking with full packs. Scouts also developed their knowledge of map and compass reading, estimation, first aid and cooking over an open fire. The scouts had an amazing weekend with great weather, plotting their own route and hiking over 25kms between activity and sleep points, meeting new friends along the way and improving their camping and teamwork skills.

During the July school holidays, eight scouts headed to Mount Baw Baw to join a contingent of 52 scouts from across the state for four days of snow fun. During 'Scout Ski', youth aged 11 – 14 enjoyed a wide range of alpine sports including a 5km hike in snowshoes to reach Mount Baw Baw's summit cairn, tobogganing, cross country skiing and quinzee building (the construction of a simple shelter made by hollowing out a big pile of snow). For many scouts, it was the first time they'd tried alpine sports and by far the most popular activity was downhill skiing. The scouts made countless trips up and down Tank Hill and Hut Run to learn how to balance, turn (using a basic snowplough) and get on and off a button lift. Such a brilliant experience for these young scouts!

Electrical power outages: What you need to know

Blackouts or interruptions to power supply can affect any home from time to time. Power outages can affect all homes connected to the grid. Your supply of gas or electricity may have occasional interruptions.

Blackouts interfere with the normal operation of household functions and conveniences including:

- Water pumps (drinking water, toilets)
- Electric cooking
- Ducted heating
- Communications (phone, modem)
- Food storage (fridge and freezer)
- Instantaneous' hot water
- Electric vehicle charging
- Security alarms

What about gas appliances?

Some people are hesitant to upgrade to an all-electric home because of concerns about using a single energy source to power their home and not having access to gas for cooking and heating water should the electricity supply be interrupted.

Not all gas appliances work during electricity outages. For example, modern gas heating systems have electric fans, and most modern gas hot water systems require electricity for their ignition.

What are your backup power options?

Solar batteries. The best way to have access to backup power available in an emergency is through installing a solar battery with backup functionality along with solar panels (PV).

It's important to be aware that not all solar systems have backup functionality for outages. If your system (with or without a battery) is connected to the grid, it may be designed to switch off during a power outage. This is to protect homes from power surges and protect the people who may be working on nearby electricity lines.

However, some solar PV and battery systems are designed so that they can be isolated from the grid and continue to provide stored energy to your home. This is known as 'islanding'. Typically, these systems are set up to provide power for certain things such as lights and your fridge.

If you would like to be able to run essential appliances on solar power during outages, talk to your installer about the best system setup to meet your needs.

Other options

Fossil fuel-powered generators (petrol, gas, diesel or LPG) are available. These can vary in size and upfront cost.

Tips for power outages

Be prepared to deal with an outage:

A barbecue or camp stove can be used to cook or boil water if your gas or electricity supply is interrupted.

Have a fully charged power bank available to recharge your mobile

Keep torches or candles and matches on hand for light.

Unplug appliances when the power goes out in case there's a power spike when supply is restored, and check that anything that heats up (like your oven) is turned off to avoid fire risks.

Make your home more resistant to power outage:

Draughtproofing and insulating your home can improve its resistance to heat gain or loss and reduce its dependence on heating and



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Skin Cancer Clinic opens in Woodend

A state-of-the-art skin cancer clinic has opened in Woodend, offering appointments to patients without the need for a referral from a GP.

Doctors, Ashvin Arul, Loshna Devamany and Bronwyn Edmunds live locally and recognised a critical need for a purpose-built skin cancer clinic in the Macedon Ranges.

"We frequently detect skin cancers," says Ashvin, stressing the prevalence with which Australians encounter such conditions. "Seventy per cent of Australians will face skin cancer at some point, making early detection

"Our goal is zero deaths from melanoma," Ashvin says.

Loshna advises regular annual skin checks, even for those unconcerned about specific spots. "It's prudent to be aware," she explains, "as early intervention can be lifesaving.

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Woodend welcomes five new firefighters

Woodend is very fortunate to have five new volunteer firefighters join the team at the CFA. Brett Gray, Phil Gidley, Ben Lawford, Lucy Levecke and Juliana Kumori have just

completed their General Fire Fighter (GFF) training and are now able to turn out with the Brigade.

They continue the tradition of excellent training at the Woodend Fire Brigade, and passed their final assessments with flying colours. Woodend also has a number of other new recruits currently in training and it is planned that they will complete their GFF training to be ready for the next fire season.

Community helps fund new fire fighting tanker.

We have recently taken delivery of our new Tanker 2, a 4WD Medium Tanker that was partly funded through the Victorian Government VESEP (Volunteer Emergency Service Equipment

"We applied for the grant in 2020, when I was Captain of the Brigade" said former Captain Mike Dornau. "The CFA provides the Woodend Fire Brigade with vehicles and equipment to suit its brigade risk profile, however they do not fund all of our vehicles. In fact, of the Brigade's five vehicles only two are fully-funded by the CFA. The rest are either fully-or partly-funded by the Brigade".

"The new Tanker is a state-of-the-art fire fighting vehicle that replaces our near 25 year old Tanker 2", added Captain Steve Ritchie. "This would not be possible without the grant from the Government, but it would certainly not be possible without the support of our community. In particular, I would like to highlight the generous support of local business Barker Trailers, which contributed a significant amount towards the funding of our new Tanker. "The new vehicle will provide the Woodend community with a more modern and capable vehicle. It is much better equipped for the special and

unique geographic make-up of the Woodend area, which includes mountains and forests, as well as high risk grass and bushfire areas".

First Lieutenant and Equipment Officer Malcolm Judd commented that "the new tanker is a 4WD vehicle while the old T2 was 2WD, which will make it better suited to handling the rough terrain and steep tracks in our area. It is also a Crew Cab design unlike the old tanker where crew were exposed on the back of the truck".

The Woodend CFA has taken delivery of the new Tanker and is currently undergoing final fit out and training with members before it goes into service. The old Tanker will be offered for sale by tender.



Macedon Ranges Shire Council

The following matters were considered and endorsed at the June 2024 Council Meeting:

Upcoming community consultations endorsed:

Draft Kyneton Urban Design Framework – This high-level, strategic document aims to establish a future vision – including indicative streetscape and precinct plans, opportunities for tangible public realm improvements and built form guidelines for new development – in and around Kyneton's main commercial areas of High Street, Mollison Street and Piper Street.

Community feedback on this draft is open until Sunday 4 August 2024.

Endorsed following community consultation:

Draft Stanley Park Infrastructure Master **Plan** – A total of 55 submissions were received and considered in relation to guiding the future infrastructure at Stanley Park in Mount Macedon. Council approved the Infrastructure Master Plan with changes including retaining the playground in its current location, retaining the barbecue and removing reference to future facilities to the north-east corner of the site.

Draft Lease and Licence Policy - A total of seven (six written, one verbal) submissions were received and considered in relation to arrangements on Council premises between Council and tenants, with changes including a category change for neighbourhood houses and wording clarifications to better reflect current practice.

Draft Fair Access Policy – One formal submission/survey response was received and considered in relation to tackling gender inequality when considering community sports infrastructure, with minor changes made to include more inclusive wording.

Draft Kyneton Movement Network Plan (2024-2033) – A total of 52 submissions were received and considered to improve travel around Kyneton, with all 129 potential projects - 13 added following feedback reconsidered with updated priority rankings under a revised multi-criteria analysis. As a result, the plan now includes the final top 30 projects.

Draft Riddells Creek Movement Network Plan (2024-2033) – A total of 29

submissions were received and considered to improve travel around Riddells Creek, with all 112 projects reconsidered with updated priority rankings under a revised multi-criteria analysis. As a result, the plan now includes the final top 38 projects (11 projects tied at the same score).

Draft Romsey Skate Park Design - One written/email submission was received and

considered in relation to proposed designs for a new Romsey Skate Park, with this feedback - requesting increased shade and a box jump – presented to the Lancefield Romsey Lions Club for consideration in finalising the design (noting that a box jump is already part of designs).

Other matters endorsed:

Goldfields Library transition – Local Government Act 2020 changes are resulting in the dissolution of Regional Library Corporations across the state by 2030, but instead allowing councils to consider delivering any service - including libraries that might benefit from a collective approach with other councils.

To maintain library services for the Macedon Ranges and continue this shared service delivery with other councils, Council has committed to establishing a new collective Library Service Beneficial Enterprise and is instructing Goldfields Library Corporation to develop the documentation required for this

First Right of Refusal - Malmsbury Youth *lustice Centre* – As part of standard Victorian Government processes for surplus land (First Right of Refusal process), Council was among those first offered to acquire the former Malmsbury Youth Justice Centre.

Council is formally refusing this offer, noting that future uses of the site are unlikely to align with services currently provided by Council. However, Council is committed to advocating on behalf of the community to consider the community's preferences for this site.

Draft Financial Reserves Policy – This policy, which supports the sustainable and responsible management of Council's cash balances and financial reserves, has been reviewed and revised to better reflect current

Updates to the policy include more detail in relation to public open space reserves;

the closure of a reserve; consolidating four existing public open space reserves into three to reflect Council's geographic Wards; and the creation of a Resource Recovery

Smoke Free Outdoor Areas Policy – A review of Council's Smoke-Free Outdoor Areas Policy 2017 acknowledged that state legislation has been updated to align with or exceed Council's provisions. Council has therefore repealed its policy and will rely on state legislation to regulate smoking in

Capital Works Monitoring – In the final monthly Capital Works Monitoring report of the 2023-24 financial year, Council noted a series of budget returns or additions to infrastructure projects, resulting in an additional 15 projects being carried forward to 2024-25 and an overall program surplus of \$467,918.69.

This surplus will be transferred in part to the 2024-25 Capital Works Program budget, and in part to the Plant Replacement Reserve to help support Council's net-zero goal of including more hybrid and electric vehicles

Inquiry into Local Government funding and services – Council will make a submission to the Victorian Legislative Council in response to its inquiry into Local Government Funding and Services.

This submission notes ongoing challenges faced by Council including revenue structures, cost shifting and the maintenance of road assets, while also making proposals such as a review of inputs to rate capping and providing predictable, longer-term funding to councils.

Time to rug up and keep warm as we hit the month of August.

Firstly, congratulations to incoming Woodend Rotary President Adriaan Adolph and thank you to outgoing President, Deidre Willmott and the many members who contributed to another year full of fundraising that enabled many worthy projects and communities to be assisted financially. Volunteering is definitely alive at the Woodend branch.

The Macedon Ranges Sports Precinct Stage 1 is officially open. What a celebration it was. This was decades in the making and this intergenerational project will ensure that it will benefit the community for decades to come. If you haven't visited the precinct, it is well worth a visit, catering for active and passive sport and recreation for all ages and plans for Stage 2 are progressing. The Woodend to Riddells Creek Shared Trails project is also well underway and it goes past the precinct so it will be very handy when opened in 2025.

The budget was endorsed earlier in May, which means we have been able to get some projects up and going as soon as we ticked over to this 2024/25 financial year. We know the Racecourse Reserve Masterplan (RRM) is of interest to many. Officers have been working hard on the draft Macedon Ranges Community Equestrian Plan and hope it will be completed shortly and come to a Council Meeting. We need to finalise this to be able to progress the RRM.

Council and Councillors have also received emails regarding the reintroduction of a charge for disposal of green waste at the Shire's transfer stations. There was much discussion about this during budget deliberations. We understand the points that have also been raised by some residents. The cost of this service had been subsidised by money raised from other areas of waste disposal. One important consideration was that state requirements recently changed at short notice regarding what Council is able to charge in the waste levy and forbids these types of cross subsidies. The charge for green waste has been kept to a minimum and will be discussed again during the next budget deliberations, and residents will as always have the opportunity to submit your thoughts. Council has information about this on our website.

Many people also contacted Council and Councillors regarding the sale of the former Malmsbury Juvenile Justice Centre. In a report to the June Scheduled Council Meeting (SCM), the Officers explained why Council was not in a position to put in an expression of interest to purchase this large site and declined the First Right of Refusal (FROR) offered to us by the State. The report was clear that Council will continue to advocate to the State Government and other authorities

for ongoing engagement and collaboration with the community, Traditional Owners and Council as plans for the site progress. We also encourage community members to continue to share their ideas with the State Government.

The Coles/High Street intersection has also been raised. Regional Roads are continuing to work on the plans and they are aware that residents are keen to have an update. We will share information when it is made available to us.

In response to the VGCCC's decision to refuse an application for 50 electronic gaming machines at 90 Main Street, Romsey, as published on its website: https://www.vgccc.vic.gov.au/ resources/hearings-and-decisions/decisions.

Council is pleased that the application for electronic gaming machines at 90-94 Main Street in Romsey (Romsey Hotel) has been refused by the Victorian Gambling and Casino Control Commission (VGCCC), affirming Council's opposition to the application in consideration of community sentiment and the negative wellbeing impacts.

However, Council remains supportive of business investment within our towns such as Romsey and would continue to encourage proposals that demonstrate positive benefits without the need for electronic gaming machines.

Council will hold off on its planned additional phone survey to Romsey residents for the time being, pending any further action by the applicant related to the VGCCC's decision.

The benefits of desexing your pet

Desexing, also known as sterilisation, spaying, castrating, or neutering, is a crucial step in responsible pet ownership. Dr. Candice Priest (BVSc), Veterinary Director at Greencross Vets Macedon Ranges, explains the benefits and timing of desexing your pet.

Our team at Greencross Vets Macedon Ranges strongly recommends desexing for your four-legged friends. Beyond the immediate health benefits, desexing helps control the pet population, reducing the number of unplanned puppies and kittens that end up in animal shelters. For pets that tend to roam, such as outdoor cats, desexing is especially vital to ensure their well-being and prevent unwanted litters.

Surgical desexing is performed under general anaesthesia and involves removing part of a pet's reproductive system. For females, this process, known as spaying, typically involves removing the ovaries and uterus. For males, desexing, also called castration, involves the removal of both testicles.

The ideal age for desexing varies by breed. Generally, cats and smaller dog breeds are desexed around six months of age, while larger dog breeds are typically desexed once they reach full bone growth. Our veterinary team will consider all the unique aspects of your pet before making any recommendations.

There are several myths surrounding desexing. One common myth is that females should have a litter before being desexed. In reality, spaying a dog before her first heat greatly reduces the risk of mammary cancer. Another myth is that desexing will make your pet overweight. However, desexing usually coincides with the period when diet control becomes necessary. It's important to reduce calorie intake and increase exercise after desexing.

Some believe pets become lazy after desexing, but there are generally minimal to no changes in their character. Young male dogs, however, will be less inclined to mount objects and jump fences in search of a mate.

Budget 2024-25 road works


In the 2024-25 financial year, Council is again strategically prioritising a number of local road and infrastructure upgrades across the shire as part of the Budget 2024-25.

In the Woodend area, these projects include:

- Old Lancefield Road, Woodend road reconstruction between Savages Lane and Manifold Road, including a footpath connection to Romsey Road
- Glenns Court, Woodend drainage works

Also being carried forward from the 2023-24 financial year to progress in 2024-25 are road reconstruction works at Chanters Lane in Trentham East, which is awaiting final signoff on planning approvals including from external authorities.

These upgrades will be progressed alongside other locations prioritised through recurring annual maintenance programs such as bitumen resurfacing, gravel road renewal, road stabilisation and guardrail upgrades.

We have no shortage of names for it, but when faced with death, we are often lost for words. Our superstitions and fears about dying, and the discomfort we feel affect our approach and experiences at the end of life.

Dying to Know Day on August 8 is a national day of action acknowledging the final stage of life and encouraging Australians not to wait to talk about death.

"Seventy-five per cent of the community have not had end-of-life discussions with their loved ones and less than ten per cent die with an advance care plan," said Kerrie Noonan, the co-founder of the day.


"Opening up conversations and sharing information demystifies death and the dying process," Ms Noonan said. To do just that, here in Woodend, an open day is being held by Natural Grace, who offer holistic funeral care.

Natural Grace will open their Sanctuary for everyone to come and visit, and will have a variety of coffins, caskets, shrouds and urns on display; attendees will be able to look behind the scenes at the operations of a funeral home.

Attendees will also be encouraged to ask questions that they might not otherwise feel they could ask.

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Light on a path of darkness

Macedon Ranges Suicide Prevention Action Group are currently seeking expressions of interest for Volunteer Peer Supporters for our new Community-Led Safe Space. MRSPAG's mission is to implement strategies and initiatives within the local community to address the mental health challenges faced. The organisation combines lived experience and professional expertise to achieve their goals of advocacy, education and the implementation of evidence-based strategies to promote mental well-being in the Macedon Ranges. MRSPAG is made up of community volunteers, many of whom have lived experience of suicide, such as of suicidal ideation, of caring for someone close to them in suicidal crisis or have been bereaved by suicide.

The Community-Led Safe Space has been a goal of MRSPAG for many years, and it has finally come to fruition. The Safe Space will have Peer Support Volunteers to welcome and support individuals in emotional or suicidal distress, offering a compassionate, understanding and non-judgmental environment. No referrals or appointments are necessary.

The role of the Peer Support Volunteer is to provide an individual experiencing emotional distress or suicidal crisis with emotional support and connection based on their own lived experience. If you have a personal lived experience of suicide, this volunteer opportunity may be a chance to make a difference.

Volunteers will be provided with training and support by participating in self-paced online training funded through Roses in the Ocean. They will also receive ongoing training, support and debriefing opportunities.

The Safe Space will operate out of the Riddells Creek Neighbourhood House, with the days/times of operation still to be determined. We understand volunteers have busy lives and are managing their own lived experience of suicide, as such we ask if volunteers are available for a 2-4 hour shift once per month, however there is the option for more.

Please consider joining MRSPAG in our mission to uplift and empower individuals in the Macedon Ranges community. Your lived experience and willingness to support others can make a significant difference in preventing suicide and promoting mental well-being within our local community. 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
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
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Players reunion preps Hawks for battle of Bendigo



Delivering better mental health for young Victorians

The State Government is supporting youth mental health organisations, helping them to identify mental health concerns early on, to ensure no young Victorian slips through the cracks.

Beneficiaries include Youth Live4Life, which brings together rural and regional communities to improve youth mental health and wellbeing. Member for Macedon Mary-Anne Thomas said of the funding boost, "This is an important investment for young people across the Macedon Ranges to help them develop the skills and confidence they need to support their own mental health and that of

Minister for Mental Health Ingrid Stitt recently visited Youth Life4Life in Woodend to hear about their support programs for young Victorians.

Youth Live4Life's program aims to improve youth mental health and reduce youth suicide in rural and regional communities, where the suicide rate is 40 per cent higher, and in remote areas almost twice the rate, of metropolitan areas.

A key element of the organisation's success is its whole-ofcommunity approach, powered by young people who become Mental Health Ambassadors and lead the implementation of the Live4Life model in their communities – creating local partnerships to lead conversations about mental health and suicide prevention.

Work is also underway on more than 90 per cent of the Royal Commission into Victoria's Mental Health Services' recommendations, with an investment of more than \$6 billion since the report was handed down.

This funding supports the Royal Commission's vision for a system that distinguishes between infant, child and family mental health services, and youth mental health services supporting young people to seamlessly transition through the various stages of their care.

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Artworks to celebrate significant Victorian women

A new round of the Women's Public Art Program will see six new public artworks in-stalled to honour remarkable women.

Minister for Women Natalie Hutchins opened applications for the next round of the program.

Of the almost 600 statues across Melbourne's public spaces, only around two per cent represent women, with most statues representing men or animals.

Aboriginal women are often invisible in public artworks, and this NAIDOC Week Aunty Pam Pedersen is highlighting the opportunity to recognise Aboriginal women through public art such as the sculpture of her mother, Lady Gladys Nicholls, at Parliament Gardens.

The statue of the prominent Aboriginal rights activist with her husband Pastor Doug Nicholls was the first in Victoria to acknowledge Aboriginal leaders.

Aunty Pam Pedersen said she is excited about the program's potential to give organisations to celebrate women from different walks of life. "There are so many women we don't even hear about, grassroots women from all backgrounds, that need to be re-warded and recognised for the way they are helping others."

Member for Macedon Mary-Anne Thomas said, "I encourage all

local artists to apply to this fantastic program to ensure women are celebrated and represented in our public artworks."

In partnership with McClelland Sculpture Park and Gallery, this program will support the creation of another six new artworks including sculptures, murals or installations. The first round unveiled artworks that celebrate women such as journalist, comedian and disability rights advocate Stella Young, and equal pay campaigner Zelda D'Aprano.

New state-of-the-art sports precinct open for use

The long-awaited Macedon Ranges Sports Precinct (MRSP) in New Gisborne is now open, unlocking significant recreational and social benefits for the entire shire.

A culmination of decades of advocacy and planning by Council and the community, the MRSP's over-\$29 million first stage has delivered a three-court indoor sports hub, a natural turf oval with an adjoining sports pavilion and other facilities such as a playground, BBQ facilities and a fitness loop.

It will play host to a range of local user groups and sports including AFL, basketball, netball, badminton, volleyball and futsal, with facilities also available for hire for corporate or social functions to make the MRSP a true community space.

Victorian Government Minister for Community Sport Ros Spence and Member for Macedon Mary-Anne Thomas were among those present to help open the new facilities. They then toured the facilities alongside Councillors and Council staff, contractors, funding partners, primary user reference group members, other user groups and more.

Council's Mayor, Annette Death, said the MRSP was the largest capital works project ever undertaken by Council, with the first stage made possible with generous funding support from the Victorian Government (\$14.8 million), Melbourne Water (\$377,590) and AFL Victoria (\$100,000).

"The need for more indoor and outdoor recreational facilities in the region has long been identified in our strategies, so we're absolutely delighted to finally have a new state-of-the-art facility that will benefit our community for generations to come," she

"On behalf of Council, I'd like to thank everyone who has played a part to this point - from our funding partners and contractors, through to Council staff and community members who have advocated and shared this dream for such a long time."

Along with the practical elements required

of a modern sporting facility, the complex also features innovative design and environmental elements such as solar panels, water-saving irrigation systems and doubleglazed floor-to-ceiling windows making the most of natural light and surrounding views.

"Care has been taken in the design to make sure the facility not only fits with the natural surroundings, but also makes the most of it," Mayor Death said.

"Where else could you be watching your kids play sports, or be participating yourself, and be captivated by the stunning backdrop of Mount Macedon?"

With the MRSP's first stage now complete, detailed design and documentation for the ~\$17 million second stage is continuing and includes \$15 million from the Australian Government. Council is also continuing to advocate for a final ~\$8 million required for a third stage to include other upgrades within the precinct's master plan.

The second stage, which is targeted to commence construction by early 2025, will essentially double the current sports hub capacity with an additional three courts, additional amenities, an additional AFL/ cricket oval, two outdoor sports courts and additional car parking and landscaping. As part of a new Coaching and Development Strategy, the Woodend Cricket Club is excited to announce that Josh Eastley will be the Head Coach for the upcoming season.

Josh is no stranger to our club, having scored over 2,500 runs and taken more than 120 wickets during his time with us! Josh has had a lot of experience as an assistant coach with a number of clubs. Here's a brief look at Josh's cricket journey since his time with us.

Josh played in the Emu Valley Cricket Association A Grade at West Bendigo, where he assisted with training and player development, game-day strategies and also achieving personal accolades with the Bowling Award and Club Champion! He then joined Buckley Park in the North West Metropolitan and continued his role in training and development and also securing an A-grade premiership. He then played at Guildford in the Castlemaine District Cricket Association as an assistant coach to Elliot Massina, making it to the one-day and two-day grand finals.

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
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Early Sturdy Structures

In 1862 William Peters, a pioneer of Newham, bought 458 acres bounded by Bryces Lane, Rochford Road and Millers Road to run cattle, sheep and horses. That year he built his first building as a storeroom in stone from Brydons quarry and named the property Swamp Farm. He then built a house where he and his wife Anne lived until her death in 1874.

In 1877 William married Elizabeth Steinmeyer, who took the enterprising step of opening the house as a 'boarding and day school for young ladies'. Elizabeth also enjoyed bringing the Newham school children to the farm for a picnic in a

wagonette pulled by two horses. Later she gave the property the more enticing name of Sunnyside.

William died in 1894, leaving the house with 50 acres to his wife, with the rest to go to the children when the youngest, then seven, had come of age. However, by 1901 Elizabeth Peters had decided to leave Newham, possibly to remove one daughter from an undesirable husband and a son from an undesirable girlfriend. Elizabeth rented out the house until 1913, when Robert Haslett and Linda, delivered the mail to Newham and Cobaw for a number of years. Linda later trained as a nurse and became wellknown throughout the district as Sister Linda

The stone house comprised seven rooms with a passage leading to a wooden section

which contained a dining room, kitchen and walk-in pantry. A rumpus room at the back allowed indoor play for the five children -Allen, Wallace, Arthur, Vivienne and Linda. Wallace won a scholarship to Kyneton High School and became a teacher. Allen loved the rural life and left school at fourteen to work on the farm and for some neighbours, later operating a chaff-cutter around the district and then, with a group, contracting with a thrasher. When father Robert retired to Newham, Arthur and his wife and two daughters stayed on the farm for a few years until Arthur, after several bouts of influenza one cold winter, was advised to move to warmer climes. They chose Shepparton and sold The Willows to Mr Beckingsale.

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Offering Diverse Sporting Opportunities

Sacred Heart College is a member of the Northern Metropolitan Region of School Sports Victoria (SSV) offering students the ability to represent the College in competitive sports team and individual. All students can participate in trials for possible selection in the team sports offered: basketball, cricket, football, netball, soccer, and tennis. Students selected represent the College in this competition which operates at Year 7, Year 8, Intermediate (Year 9/10) and Senior (Year 11/12) levels, across the four terms of the school year.

This competition seeks to promote the virtues of participation in healthy, enjoyable physical activity, while entering the spirit of competitiveness, fair play, friendship and sporting excellence. These also add a further opportunity for skill development, as they allow senior

students studying Cert IV in Sport and Recreation to experience the role of coach to our junior (Years 7 & 8) team sports. Students assist in selections, training and coaching at the events, developing bonds and allowing the sharing of skills across age

In addition to team sports, students can participate in individual competitions hosted by SSV. Individuals are selected through their involvement in the College Swimming, Athletics and Cross-Country events or through their results in local sports clubs.

In 2024 we have had a number of students qualify from regional competitions to represent the College at State Championships. In April this year, a number of students attended the State Swimming Championships with some great results.

In December 2023 we were proud to have two students represent the College, as well as the State, at the Australian Nationals in Perth, competing in Hammer Throwing and 800m Running - having successfully competed in the Victorian All Schools Championships.

Most recently we had two students competing at the Victorian All Schools Cross Country Championship in Bundoora on 20 July.

All students involved in this level of sporting competition are usually heavily involved in their chosen sports outside of school. Their participation in SSV competitions adds to their experience, while also providing our broader college community with a greater understanding of the range of sporting experiences on offer, along with an insight into the dedication and commitment needed to reach these levels of sporting achievement.
