Community feedback to help 'Shape the Ranges'

Macedon Ranges residents and ratepayers are being invited to share views on rates, roads, rubbish and more, to help review and refresh a series of key Council documents.

'Shaping the Ranges' will put a spotlight back on multi-year documents adopted in 2021 - including the Community Vision, Council Plan, Financial Plan, Asset Plan, and Revenue and Rating Plan - which act as the driving pillars for what Council delivers.

This multi-staged consultation will see revised documents developed and informed by external feedback from the community and key organisations, internal feedback from Councillors and Council staff, and a focused engagement with a demographically representative community assembly.

Mayor Dom Bonanno encouraged anyone with an opinion on what Council should prioritise over the next four years, or anyone who holds a vision more broadly for the shire's future, to take the time to review the existing documents and provide feedback.

"These key documents outline what we commit to doing on behalf of our community," Mayor Bonanno said. "In this initial phase of consultation, you do not have to have any prior knowledge of these documents - just a willingness to contribute and a vision for our shared future."

"Importantly, this will not be the only opportunity for the community to provide feedback - the release of the revised draft documents later in the year will offer another chance to respond to how we have interpreted initial feedback, and where we've identified changes to improve the documents."

Macedon Ranges Shire Council, like all councils across Victoria, is legislatively required to complete deliberative engagement - a collaborative, in-depth form of engagement - to review or renew key documents by 31 October in the year following a general election (in this case, 31 October

Like the process of finalising the original documents in 2021, Council is complementing broader community consultation with a community assembly, comprising approximately 30 members independently selected to represent the broad demographics of the community.

This assembly will be asked to participate across four independently facilitated in-person sessions across March and April 2025, to deliberate on the key documents and provide feedback. * Due to the required earlier delivery and adoption of the Rating and Revenue Plan, Council may seek to incorporate feedback informing this plan a week or so earlier than the closing date of Tuesday 18 March 2025.

Local veteran's story to be shared at Mount Macedon **Anzac Day Dawn Service**

Dr Francis Donovan OAM from Woodend will be one of the exservicepeople featured at this year's Mount Macedon Anzac Day Dawn Service, an event he has been involved in for over 20 years. The theme for this year's service at the Mount Macedon Memorial Cross is "The Unseen Wounds of Conflict", exploring the many impacts war has on those who serve, from the physical injuries to the mental effects and the wider repercussions for families.

As part of the service, the stories of local veterans will be shared, including that of 78-year-old Francis.

Francis served as a Medic in an infantry unit in the Vietnam War.

"I was only 19, just like the song by Red Gum," said Francis. "I enlisted on the second of March, 1964."

Francis has vivid memories that still stay with him to this day.

"The 'Battle of Long Tan' was fought by about 100 members of D Company, 6th Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment (6RAR) against an overwhelming Viet Cong enemy force of 2,500 on 18 August 1966. My unit was not involved in the battle itself, but at first light on 19 August, we accompanied the remnant D Company 6RAR back to the battlefield so they could recover their wounded and count enemy dead. My job was to confirm their dead – 245 of them in attack formation. In some cases, that meant recovering and re-assembling separated body parts.

"Decades later, I continued counting enemy dead at Long Tan in my sleep and even in waking hours. Some nights still, I awake 'nursing' Les Farren through his death; the first Victorian National Serviceman ever killed in action. I suffered a major mental breakdown in 2000 and was declared Totally and Permanently Incapacitated in 2002. Thankfully, I have come a long way since then and now only go there in my mind occasionally – usually on or around Vietnam Veterans Day and ANZAC Day each year."

Francis' experiences during his time of service shaped his choice of career later in life; he gained a social work degree with distinction at age 33, and since has specialised in psychotherapy, counselling and political and social change with individuals, families, groups, organisations and communities around Australia.

"My decision to go into this field was heavily influenced by my role in and survival of the Vietnam War and its impact on and implications for veterans, their partners and children - including myself and my family."

Francis is one of the founders of the national Vietnam Veterans Counselling Service, now known as 'Open Arms', and the WA branch of the Vietnam Veterans Association of Australia. His 2017 Order of Australia was awarded for service to Australian veterans.

"As the creative force behind the Mount Macedon ANZAC Day Dawn Service in its contemporary, thematic form, content and style, it feels like one of my children, so I am honoured that my story will be part of the service this year."

The service commences at 6am at the Mount Macedon Memorial Cross and runs for approximately an hour. Access to the Dawn Service is via bus only. Cameron Drive, Mount Macedon will be closed to all private vehicles including bicycles.

People wishing to attend the Dawn Service are encouraged to book a seat on one of the free bus services that will operate from towns across the Macedon Ranges and Sunbury – booking details will be shared closer to the event. Message from your councillors

We hope you've had a great start to 2025. We are well and truly into the year at Council and have some important items coming up that we'd love to share with you.

The first is that one of the most critical community consultations you can take part in is now open for your feedback. Reshaping the Ranges (https://yoursay.mrsc.vic.gov.au/shaping-ranges) is a survey that's part of the council's deliberative engagement process, informing the development of key documents and council priorities over the next four years. Council is seeking the views of all Macedon Ranges residents and businesses on what we should focus on over the next four years. Your views will help us shape the Community Vision, Council Plan, Financial Plan, Asset Plan, and Revenue and Rating Plan. We know it takes valuable time to look at each of these documents and share feedback, however, gathering input from everyone ensures all voices across the Ranges can be heard. Submissions close on Tuesday 18 March.

We have also launched a series of community catch-ups across West Ward. The first one was held in Kyneton and the second will be in Malmsbury at Malmsbury Bakery on Friday 28 March from 10.30am until 11.30am. We will also be in Woodend on Friday 30 May from 11am until 12pm; the venue is to be confirmed. These are a great opportunity to connect with your West Ward Councillors, share your feedback and any concerns for our region - and support our local businesses. We understand that not everyone can make it on these days or times, that's why we are looking at hosting a town hall evening event mid-year. Additionally, we are also available via email and phone call. For ease, our contact details are janderson@mrsc.vic. gov.au, jpearce@mrsc.vic.gov.au, and kkendall@mrsc.vic.gov.au.

We have also been working on the upcoming council budget. Thank you to everyone who sent in a submission and to those who did a verbal presentation. Our next council meeting is on Wednesday 26 March at 7pm. These are held in the Gisborne Council Chamber and are, of course, open to the community to attend. The agendas are published at least five days before a meeting and minutes are generally available within five working days of each meeting. You can also watch livestreams or recordings of Council Meetings via the MRSC website.

National Macedon **Immunisation** Program - keeping kids safe from diseases

Childhood immunisation is one of the easiest and most effective ways to protect your little one from serious diseases. By following the National Immunisation Program (NIP) schedule, you're giving your child the best start in life and helping to keep our community safe.

Vaccines help build strong immunity before kids are exposed to harmful infections, preventing illnesses like measles, whooping cough, and polio. Plus, staying up to date with immunisations ensures your child can attend childcare, kindergarten, and school without worry.

Is your child due for a vaccination? Check their immunisation history through MyGov or the Australian Immunisation Register (AIR).

Need to book? Macedon Ranges Shire Council provides free childhood vaccinations for eligible children under the NIP. Visit mrsc. vic.gov.au/immunisation for more details.

If you have a child in Year 7 or Year 10 at secondary school in 2025, look out for the immunisation information provided by their school. Students in Year 7 receive the human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine (1 dose) and the diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis (whooping cough) combined vaccine (1 dose). Students in Year 10 receive the Meningococcal ACWY vaccine (1 dose).



Macedon **Victorian** Ranges **Goldfields** given green light to seek **World Heritage listing**

The Australian Government has officially given the green light for the Victorian Goldfields to seek World Heritage listing, marking a historic milestone after 35 years of advocacy, with its successful inclusion on Australia's Tentative World Heritage List.

The journey to World Heritage listing for the Victorian Goldfields is a collaborative effort. Fifteen councils across Victoria, Traditional Owners, the Victorian and Commonwealth Governments, and local and international experts are working together on the bid.

Tentative listing recognises the Victorian Goldfields' potential outstanding global heritage significance and seeks to celebrate and protect the region's multi-layered history – from the First Peoples living on Country to the goldrush and subsequent waves

"Victorian Goldfields represents the most extensive, coherent, and best-surviving nineteenth century global gold rush landscape anywhere in the world," said Barry Gamble, Chief Advisor to the Victorian Goldfields World Heritage bid.

Cr Dom Bonanno, Mayor, Macedon Ranges Shire Council said Council said he was excited by what achieving World Heritage status would mean for the area, and that the role Macedon Ranges towns played in this phase of Australia's history. "The goldrush was important in the story of the Macedon Ranges, with local areas effectively becoming the gateway for travellers enroute to the goldfields to the north in Bendigo and Castlemaine promoting both economic activity and population growth," Cr Bonanno said.

A Tentative listing is one step on the journey to being considered for World Heritage listing. It acts as a placeholder for World Heritage listing and has no other consequences.

Further research and consultation will be undertaken to determine sites for a World Heritage bid, which may include additional sites not part of the current Tentative List submission.

Achieving UNESCO World Heritage status will bring extensive benefits to the region's local communities including economic and social revitalisation, strengthening regional identity, building community pride and providing educational opportunities. A 2024 economic assessment found that the listing could see 2.5 million new visitors to the Victorian Goldfields region over 10 years, with an estimated visitor spending increase into local economies of over \$500 million.

As we continue on the journey towards a World Heritage bid, we will keep working with councils, property owners, and communities in the Victorian Goldfields and across the state.

Now is the time to rally together and get behind this important moment, ensuring the rich heritage of the Victorian Goldfields is recognised on a global stage, conserving it for future generations to appreciate and enjoy.

English Ivy in Woodend

Thirteen adults and three children gathered on 9 February to attack the noxious English lvy invading the native vegetation along Five Mile Creek, adjacent to

the Rotary Exercise Track. Woodend Landcare has been focusing on removing ivy from this site with annual working bees each February for four years. "Four years ago, when we started working here, English Ivy covered the entire ground, smothering any native seedlings that tried to grow." As Woodend Landcare President Peter Yates explained, "It was also climbing up nearly every tree trunk throughout the area, and in some cases smothering the trees."

English Ivy (Hedera helix) loves the cool, wet, English-like conditions of the Macedon Ranges. It survives by creeping along the ground until it finds something to grow up, such as a tree. It then climbs up the tree, completely covering it. Only once off the ground will the ivy flower and seed. At height, this is the perfect location for birds to feed on the seed. The birds then spread the seed in their droppings, as they fly around the environment. Bird poop provides the ideal start to life for the new ivy seedlings - nutrients, moisture and a free flight to new locations.

By knowing the life cycle of ivy, we can target our eradication efforts to be most effective. By stopping it from climbing trees, we stop it from flowering and producing seeds. For trees that are heavily infested with ivy, we simply cut the ivy from the bottom 30 cm of the trunk and scrape the ivy from a 30cm ring on the ground around trunk. Eventually the ivy will creep back towards the trunk and start to climb up again, but this gives us a year to two to spray or hand weed the ground layer of ivy.

You can easily replicate this method at home. Simply prevent the ivy from climbing up any vertical structures such as trees and fences, and you will stop it from flowering and setting seed. You don't have to remove ivy from the whole trunk of heavily invaded trees. Simply cut the ivy at the base of the tree and every shoot and leaf above that will die. Over time to dead ivy leaves will simply fall from the trees.

This method does not kill the ivy on the ground, but stops it from being spread by birds into other gardens and the native environment.

The Reusable Nappy, **Sanitary and Incontinence Product Rebate Program is** back in 2025!

For the third consecutive year, Council is pleased to be running the Reusable Nappy, Sanitary and Incontinence Product Rebate Program. The program will run from February to May 2025 and is available to all residents within the shire, providing access to affordable reusable items.

Approximately 660 million disposable nappies, sanitary and incontinence products end up in Australian landfill each year. These products are made up of many single-use plastic components and can take up to 150 years to break down. Reusable products reduce the long-term environmental and financial costs of waste disposal.

As an example, using one set of cloth or reusable nappies with machine washing and line-drying will cost about half as much as disposable nappies. This saving increases with every child because the cloth nappies can be used again and again (Source: Sustainability Victoria). This rebate helps reduce the associated startup costs of switching to reusable products.



Environmental factors such as inadequate hygiene are associated with transmission of the disease.

Rotary is working to eliminate trachoma in Indigenous communities around Ampilatwatja in the Northern Territory by improving access to

Community-led Safe Space marks three months of operation with call for more volunteers

Opening in November 2024, Woodend's new Community-led Safe Space is set to mark three months of supporting the community

An initiative created and managed by the Macedon Ranges Suicide Prevention Action Group, the Safe Space has acted as a welcoming, non-clinical drop-in centre for individuals experiencing emotional distress or a suicidal crisis, since opening in November.

A 10-minute walk from Woodend Station, the space offers a compassionate and understanding environment, where people can feel heard, supported and understood over a cup of tea. The welcoming, cosy space has soft furnishings, bean bags,

weighted blankets and heat packs to stay warm on cooler days. There are also sensory activities like drawing, books and games available, as well as access to an outdoors area. The calm, safe space for reflection is also supported by peer workers who are available to offer support through shared experiences and empathy.

The inclusive and accessible space is open to everyone, regardless of background, gender, age or belief. No referrals or appointments are required.

Currently open every Wednesday evening and every second Saturday afternoon, the Macedon Ranges Suicide Prevention Action Group is calling for more community members with lived experience to volunteer so the Safe Space can extend its operating hours and support more locals experiencing mental distress.

Is your house or property clearly numbered?

It is amazing the number of houses or properties in our area that are not clearly numbered or identified. If you ever have to call 000, please make sure that you give the operator as much information as possible – especially your location, the address with the property number and even closest cross roads or nearby landmark.

All too often we lose valuable time looking for the actual property number. Sometimes the numbers are very small, dark in colour, difficult to read or have been overgrown ... or don't exist at all.

Please check the numbers outside your property, and do so from a few metres away to make sure they are very clear and easy to read especially at night!

Giving us good directions can make a real difference!

This time last year in The New Woodend Star, we wrote about the importance of meeting CFA trucks where possible to give directions to speed up arrival on scene.

There were several occasions in recent years where this proved the point. The home owners or neighbours were out on the road when the trucks arrived and pointed out the quickest way to get into the properties. This meant that we were directed straight to the incident without any delays. So, we thought it was worth repeating:

a few minutes, or even seconds, can make an amazing difference when we are called to an incident. The guicker that we can accurately arrive on scene, the faster we can take action.

There are some simple things that you can do, as members of our community, to help us achieve that goal.

Meet the truck to give directions

Incidents can often be several hundred metres from the main road, and therefore difficult to spot. Once you have made a call for an emergency service to respond, if possible, send someone to the roadside to meet the vehicle. If at night, make sure you take a torch.

Stay at the scene if you made the call

Sometimes you might make a call away from home or in a remote location, such as at the scene of a motor vehicle accident. If possible, please remain at the scene until emergency services arrive. This will not only help us arrive at the precise location more quickly, the information you give us at the scene will also be invaluable.

The seventy-eighth annual reunion of the Kyneton Marist Brothers Old Boys Association held on Australia Day (26 January 2025) was first class in many ways. At the event, held at the Shamrock Hotel, we recalled that Bill Hardman, son of the owner in the 1950s, was a student taught by the Marist Brothers.

A number of boys who would have been Bill's classmates were joined by alumni that were students before or after him. The reunions have become family affairs, as the passing of time has reduced the membership. In the past twelve months, we have added thirteen boys to our Deceased remembrance roll.

The records of the school have been lost, so the actual number of boys who passed through the gates at the corner of Powlett and Hutton streets is not known, but nearly 400 deaths have been identified.

The record made in 1927 was of the First Class that assembled on 26 July 1926. There were 58 boys and 5 religious, joining the inaugural principal Brother Louis. Interestingly, Brother Kevin Hoare, who was the last Brother to teach at Kyneton before the Marists withdrew in 1967, was our guest at the luncheon.

Two of the boys, Edward David Harris and John Denis Driscoll, both then aged 12 were granted a vocation and later became Marist Brothers. Edward Harris took the name Kenneth and John Driscoll



Making sure all women in Macedon have the care they need

A free virtual women's health clinic will make it easier for women across Macedon to access services like endometriosis and pelvic pain care, menstrual health, cervical screening, menopause care, breast health care and abortion.

The new clinic will launch before the middle of year - in partnership with community health organisation EACH - and it will offer free, expert medical advice, treatment and care for a range of women's health needs.

Led by specialist nurses, the clinic will reduce barriers to care, including for women in regional and remote Victoria, where access to services like contraception and abortion is hard, due to distance from major towns. Barriers to and delays in accessing care can have detrimental impacts on a woman's health, their quality of life and their ability to participate in school and employment.

Available via telehealth or online, the clinic will deliver an initial health assessment and some treatment, while patients can also be connected with a GP or get referred to a relevant health practitioner as close to home as possible. In addition to treating immediate health needs, referrals can also be made to various community support services for mental health and wellbeing, alcohol and other drugs, and family violence.


The Mobile Women's Health Clinic van also officially hit the road last month, operating in Edenhope in Victoria's west and Daylesford.


Operated by BreastScreen Victoria, the van is making free healthcare more accessible for all women and girls in rural and regional parts of Victoria, including a focus on improved access to care for First Nations women. The van will deliver a variety of women's health services, including sexual and reproductive health advice, clinical services and referrals for medical abortion (MTOP), contraception, and referrals to other necessary specialists. All services will be delivered by an experienced nurse or nurse practitioner who will work to build connections with women, their community and local health services. Both the mobile and virtual clinics are part of a \$153 million women's health package transforming the way women's healthcare is delivered in Victoria

Plenty of fish thanks to record stocking

Victorian fishers are in for a bumper season, with more chances to hook line and sinker a Murray cod, thanks to 10 years of record fish stocking by the State Government, Minister for Outdoor Recreation Steve Dimopoulos visited Karkarook Lake recently to release 6,000 Murray cod fingerlings for fishers. Since 2014, more than 66 million fish have been released across Victoria including golden perch, Australian bass, estuary perch, trout, salmon and dusky flathead -more stocking than in all other Australian states and territories combined, with another 10 million fish to be stocked by mid-2025, including 340,102 fish in Hepburn Shire and 1,880,002 fish in Macedon Ranges Shire.

The fingerlings released recently were produced at the Arcadia Native Fish hatchery, near Shepparton, which is being upgraded to triple its size and will see it produce up to six million native fish each year, part of a \$15 million investment.

Since 2014, more than 22 million Murray cod have been stocked into Victorian waters at more than 60 locations across the state.

Several Victorian lakes are open year-round so fishers can wet a line and reel in a Murray cod including Lake Eppalock, Rocklands Reservoir and Lake Eildon. Since 2014, Lake Eppalock alone has scored 2.3 million cod, with locals and visitors now catching increasing numbers of fish – which are likely upward of 3-4 years

Near the Grampians, Rocklands Reservoir has been stocked with millions of Murray cod since 2017, some of which are now being caught by freshwater anglers.

Several other waterways are flourishing thanks to record stocking and delivering benefits for nearby communities like Melton Reservoir, Cairn Curran, Taylors Lake near Horsham, Eildon and Lake Nillahcootie. 
