2024 Mount Macedon Anzac Day Dawn Service

The Mount Macedon Anzac Day Dawn Service attracted a significant crowd for the 2024 service, with more than 1,000 attendees. The local community and visitors from across Melbourne and interstate gathered at the Mount Macedon Memorial Cross at 6am to acknowledge this year's theme, 'Honouring Every Role, Every Sacrifice'.

As part of the service, school captains from Braemar College shared the story of 99-year-old Joy Daymon from Woodend North, who served as a flight mechanic in the Women's Auxiliary Australian Airforce (WAAAF) from 1943–1946. Joy was also in attendance at the service and delivered Binyon's Ode from For the Fallen, along with Flight Lieutenant Paul Liistro.

School captains from Gisborne Secondary College told the story of Joyce Strawhorn from Kyneton, who served in the Women's Air Training Corps (WATC), the WAAAF and the Australian Women's Army Service (AWAS) in WWII.

School captains from Sacred Heart College presented a special tribute to the late Robin Funston from Gisborne, who had been a longserving member of the veteran community and ex-president of the Gisborne-Macedon Ranges RSL Sub-Branch, with members of his family in attendance.

Wreaths were officially laid on behalf of ADF School of Languages, Braemar College Army Cadets, the Federal Member for McEwan, the state minister for Veterans, Macedon Ranges Shire Council, Macedon Ranges Legacy Group, Vietnam Veterans Association of



Australia, Gisborne-Macedon Ranges RSL, Woodend RSL, Kyneton RSL, Romsey-Lancefield RSL, Mt Macedon Memorial Cross Reserve Committee of Management and the Mt Macedon Anzac Day Dawn Service Committee. Other local community groups, local school representatives and members of the general public then came forward to lay theirs.

Thanks go to piper Chris Bouwmeester, bugler Gary Andison and The Fellowship Band for their moving contributions to the service and to the captains of Kyneton Secondary College for their poem reading.

Reverend Neil Fitzgerald from the Parish of Woodend and Trentham gave his final blessing to close the service.

The President of the Mount Macedon Anzac Day Dawn Service Committee, Leona Latcham, said:

"I know everyone in attendance would agree that it was a very special service this year. As we gathered today, we paid homage to the diverse roles and sacrifices of the many Australians who have served and continue to serve our country. Their stories inspire us to uphold the values of service and solidarity, ensuring that the legacy of Anzac Day lives on in our hearts and minds."

The Mount Macedon Anzac Day Dawn Service committee is donating a proportion of its MyCause and cash donations from the day to the Gisborne RSL sub-branch to help them re-establish following their losses in the recent fire at the Gisborne Golf Club.

In honour and appreciation of Joan Gladman

For many in the Woodend community, whether they be old or new to the town, the chances of knowing or being touched by Joan Gladman's life were high. Although many are saddened to hear of Joan's passing on Thursday April 25th, 2024, many have been celebrating the joy of having her in their life, sharing the many stories of a life well spent.



Joan has been a dedicated member of the Woodend community her entire life, from her early years selling crafts and children's clothing at markets in the region and a local Woodend store to arranging flowers for the church to quite literally hand-digging the grounds for the netball court alongside her teammates and friends so that the Woodend Netball Club had a court to play on. Joan was never one to turn away from doing something that would benefit the largest number of people, a sentiment that continued all throughout her life.

Joan founded and became the lead agent of the award-winning Joan Gladman Real Estate, where she worked for 15 years, having previously worked closely with her brother, John Keating, for 35 years at Keatings Real Estate. With 50 years in real estate, Joan was known and loved by many as she sold their houses, helped them buy their homes, connected them to the Woodend community and more. Many tell stories of dinners Joan organised for newcomers to the town who might not be locally connected, creating space for them to make friends or become familiar with local faces so they did not feel alone in the region. This is but one act of service that Joan embraced that went above and beyond.

Joan served on the board of Braemar College and as chairperson of the Building and Maintenance Subcommittee. There, she advocated strongly for student safety, leading the way for significant developments at the College that benefited many students and staff, and she played a pivotal role in the construction of the Dame Elizabeth Murdoch Centre and sourcing of land for the College's second campus. In her later life, she was actively involved with the local pétanque clubs, where she played by the side of her husband, Noel Gladman, making close friends and connections.

Joan's funeral was held in the Valley Room at the Macedon Ranges Hotel and Spa on Tuesday 7th May 2024, where her generosity, integrity and work ethic, and her love of people, fashion and gardens were honoured in full. In planning what was described as



an upbeat and vibrant service, Joan assured people were laughing till the end; her farewell was attended by almost 300 friends, colleagues, clients, and family members in person, with a few hundred more watching online. Heartfelt eulogies were delivered by her two children, Irene and Martin Gladman, her friend and fellow Braemar board member Maureen Wiltshire, her former employee, mentee and close friend Sarah Clarke,

and her brother, John Keating. John, citing the tagline from her business, confirmed that she certainly was a tradition in real estate, becoming a legend in the industry. Joan was an icon in the Woodend community and in life more broadly, one who lives on in many hearts and homes across the region.

Three Generations of an original Anzac

The granddaughter, Ruth De Jong, the great granddaughter, Megan den Elzen, great grandson, Leo den Elzen, of RQMS A.S. Chidlow, lay a wreath on behalf of the descendants of Gallipoli veterans.

Aubrey Septimus Chidlow 28/8/1891– 2/2/1969

The following is an excerpt of the address given by Ruth de Jong at the Woodend RSL Sub-Branch Anzac Day service.

My paternal grandfather, Aubrey Septimus Chidlow, known as "Sept", only had one leg. He went away to war in 1914 at the age of 24, returned five years later and was on crutches for the rest of his life. He was an original ANZAC at Gallipoli and later served in France on the Western Front. This is his story.

Sept was one of ten children, being the seventh son of eight boys with two girls. His middle name was Septimus, which is Latin for 'seven'. Folklore has it that the seventh son is very special, with supernatural or healing abilities.

The Chidlows were very well known, as his grandfather was a pioneer of Northam and the Avon Valley district in Western Australia, having arrived from the UK in 1831. There are a town, a well and streets named after him.

Sept enlisted on 18 August 1914 as a very early recruit, his regimental number being 760, and he was appointed to the 11th battalion, along with 31 of his mates. Sadly, nearly all were subsequentially killed or wounded on 25 April at Gallipoli, and only fourteen were to survive the war and return home.

In our district here in the Macedon Ranges, about 350 men went away; more than 70 were killed and there were over 200 casualties. Because of the small populations in the rural areas throughout Australia, the loss of these fine young men had an immense impact on their communities.

The 11th Battalion embarked on 31 October 1914 on the SS Ascanius and joined the main transport convoy of 48 ships, which had sailed up from Albany with the rest of troops from the eastern states and New Zealand.

However, instead of going to India, the ships headed to England to the training grounds of the Salisbury plains. But because of a problem with overcrowding and shortage of equipment there, it was decided that the ANZAC troops would winter and train in Egypt, which was under



British occupation. The fleet which had been approaching the Suez Canal was diverted.

Plans had to rapidly change, and on 7 December they arrived at Mena Training Camp, near the Pyramids, 20 kilometres from Cairo. The 8,500 men had no tents, which had to be brought out from England two weeks later. Training was begun in earnest for eight hours a day, six days a week, wearing full kit with heavy packs to harden the troops.

On 1 March, the 11th embarked on the HMT 'Suffolk' for an unknown destination. Sealed orders directed them to the Greek island of Lemnos, which became a major staging area for the Allied troops involved in the invasion of Gallipoli,100 kilometres away in Turkey. There they received the orders to proceed to the Gallipoli peninsula on 24 April, with the objective of securing it, in order to capture Constantinople, capital of the Ottoman Empire, which was an ally of Germany.

Extract from the war diaries 11th Battalion:

At 4.30am the men landed on the beach, (now known as Anzac Cove), under heavy musketry and machine gun fire, and stormed the cliffs about 300 feet (91 metres) high. Owing to disorganisation consequent on landing on different parts of the beach and being mixed up with other units, it was impossible to get the battalion together.

In a letter from the Front to his brother, Barry, Sept described what happened:

"We landed just at daybreak and had a pretty hot time. Our brigade was picked out to effect the landing, so we caught it hotter than the others. We had to land in lifeboats from the destroyer, and the Turks were waiting for us. They were entrenched all along the top of the hill. They had a good old time with us while they had us in the boats. We were in rifle range all the while, and we made a bonzer target, I can assure you. We got ashore without much loss, although the two boats next to us got smashed up, and only three chaps got out. Smythe and I were in charge of a box of ammunition for our own platoon and I got a bullet as we were humping it up from the beach. When we advanced, I found I couldn't put my foot to the ground. We had to crawl along, pulling the ammunition behind us. We lost our chaps, so we attached ourselves to some of the 12th battalion.

"There was a machine gun in a block house on our left. We got a few rounds into it when they turned the blessed thing onto us. We were in nice range and had no cover to speak of. The chap on my right got one in the arm and Smythe who was on the other side of me got one in the leg. When our chaps advanced again, Smythe and I handed the ammunition to some other fellows and crawled back to get our wounds dressed at a kind of dressing station. We stayed there until we were put on the hospital ship in the afternoon."

Sept was taken back to Egypt to the 1st General Hospital in Heliopolis, on the outskirts of Cairo. He had been shot in the left foot, which had penetrated all the small bones. The doctors wanted to amputate it, but he refused and said he would take his chances. He was warned that the foot would become gangrenous – there were no antibiotics in those days. His recovery was slow as he did get gangrene, but he was strong and fit and at the end of May, he was transferred to an Australian convalescence depot in Helouan, about 32 kilometres from Cairo.

On 15 July, he was returned to duty to an Australian training base in Zeitoun near Cairo where he was put to work as Quartermaster in the AIF Canteens until he recovered enough to be sent to England.

Finally, nearly a year after being shot, he returned to England in 1916 and he continued to work in the Canteens in the AIF Depots as he still wasn't strong enough to go back into battle. He was promoted to RQMS at Hurdcott Camp Depot and remained there until he rejoined the 11th Battalion, and he was sent to the Western Front in France on 19 Dec 1917.

In a battle against the Germans in Meteren near the France-Belgium border on 23 April 1918, he was again wounded in action. Unbelievably, it was almost three years to the day since he had been wounded at Gallipoli. He was hit by shrapnel in the right thigh and incurred a compound fractured femur. This was regarded as one of the most serious skeletal injuries a soldier could face.

He was taken to the Field Medical Unit and a month later to the 8th Stationary Hospital on the French coast ... Unable to stop the bleeding, [they performed] an emergency amputation.

On 21 June, his family were notified that he was dangerously ill.

At last he was able to get back to England on 13 July, where he was admitted to Endell St Military Hospital in London. A further drastic amputation was necessary. Back in Northam, his sweetheart Vera Daily, whom he had been courting before he left for the war, received the news. Feeling hopeless and alone, he had sent her a letter to release her from any obligation to wait for him – as "he was no longer a catch for a young lady". She replied with a treasured telegram on his birthday, which said: "Hard Luck No difference me Fondest Love Happy Returns Vera Daily".

He was taught to walk on an artificial leg made of wood. In those days they were cumbersome, heavy, ungainly and very uncomfortable, being attached with a big leather strap and buckles around his waist.

Most of the time he just put up with it and used crutches and he only wore his leg on Sundays, formal occasions or the Anzac Day march, which he attended without fail for the rest of his life.

It was many painful months before he was able to return to Australia on hospital ships, arriving in Fremantle on 6 May 1919. He had been away for five years. His large family & Vera were waiting for him. He walked off the ship with his new leg and a walking stick.

A week later, he proposed, and Vera accepted. They were finally married on 5 October 1921 and subsequently had three children: Audrey, my father John, and Noreen. He commenced a fine furniture business, also selling pianos and musical instruments. Vera, who was a brilliant pianist, would play for prospective buyers.

He bore his disability with dignity and no complaint, despite being in constant pain from the old wound in his foot and severe pain in the leg stump. He suffered what were called nerve storms, which were agonising, for the rest of his life. He often quoted that had he had the left foot amputated in Egypt, he would have been sent home and he never would have lost his right leg. The remarkable thing was that he was never bitter and just accepted everything that had happened to him.

In 1969, he died at the age of 77. Aubrey Septimus, an original ANZAC, the seventh son, with a lifetime of service and suffering, was able to heal his mind and broken body and live a long and productive life. He was a pillar of the community and respected and admired by all who knew him, especially by my family.

Where does the money we raise go?

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

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Community round-up

Australia leads in melanoma cases: Lions Clubs take action

Australia unfortunately holds a grim title: the country with the highest melanoma rate globally. Every 30 minutes, a person in Australia receives a melanoma diagnosis, with someone succumbing to the disease every six hours. (Source: Melanoma Institute Australia). Screening stands as a crucial tool in combating these alarming statistics.

In line with Lions Australia's commitment to enhancing health and wellbeing, the Lions Clubs of the Macedon Ranges took decisive action. After more than a year of meticulous planning, they united over two weekends in April–13/14 and 20/21-to inaugurate the Lion's Skin Checking and Awareness Unit in Woodend.

This state-of-the-art facility, costing \$500,000 to procure and \$110,000 annually to operate, boasts amenities such as its own generator, water supply, heated consulting rooms, and office space. Volunteer dermoscopists, trained by the Peter MacCallum Cancer Centre, along with a driver coordinator, manage the unit. Strategically situated just outside the Woodend Visitor Center, the unit aimed to increase accessibility to skin checks.

Volunteers from various Macedon Lions clubs – Woodend, Riddells Creek, Kyneton, Trentham, Gisborne, Lancefield, and Romsey – staffed the centre over the two weekends. The clubs also provided financial support for the accommodation and hospitality of the volunteers who ran the van.

Of the 229 individuals screened, 45% had never undergone a skin check, and 34% hadn't been screened in over a year. One third required specialist referral due to detected lesions.

Since its inception, the Lions Skin Checking and Awareness Unit has screened 10,000 individuals across Victoria and Southern NSW. The community impact, coupled with potential lives saved, amounts to approximately \$28,000 per community – what it would have cost individuals for such services.

The Lions Club continually seeks new volunteers to support initiatives like these. What struck me was the dedication and selflessness shown by them, which often goes unnoticed. Carers play a pivotal role in our community and events like these are crucial in bringing attention to their efforts and offering them the support and recognition they deserve."

Mr Mitchell congratulated P.S. My Family Matters and Woodend Neighbourhood House for the collaboration, which has a profound

impact on the mental health and wellbeing of carers, giving them the opportunity to connect with

Woodend Rotarians working on new international project, Plastic Free Bali

Woodend Rotary is celebrating a partnership with the Rotary Clubs of Bali Seminyak and Perth to work on a bold new project to reduce plastic waste in the West Bali National Park and surrounding villages.

"Plastic Free Bali" has recently qualified for a Global Grant from The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International. This grant will provide funding for waste management education and training delivered to households, businesses and waste facilities staff, along with visitors to the popular diving destination of Menjangan Island in West Bali.

Rotary is working with Yayasan Biosfir Indonesia, the local partner of international non-profit organisation Biosphere Foundation. YBI founder and program coordinator, Rósa Björk Halldórsdóttir and head of education, Kadek Dwi Arsani, ran a successful pilot program from 2019 to 2022 and, in 2021–22, they partnered with Rotary Club of Bali Seminyak and local authorities to introduce the first sustainable waste management system in Labuan Lalang, where most people cross over to Menjangan Island. This was a great success, reducing plastic pollution enormously.

Plastic Free Bali will see YBI hire and train local trainers to train and educate:

 2,000 households, giving each two bins and showing them how to sort recyclables and residual waste,

local businesses,



especially diving and other tourism operators, training them to practise responsible waste management and reduce single-use plastics

responsible waste management and reduce single-use plastics like plastic bags, plastic straws and styrofoam food packaging,

- staff at trash-sorting facilities to collect and sort waste, as well as to make compost, and
- tourists crossing by boat to Menjangan Island, encouraging them not to take single-use plastics.

The Plastic Free Bali project will run for the next two years.

We have joined the Macedon Ranges Sustainability Group, a notfor-profit, member-based organisation focusing on projects, events and practical activities that promote sustainable living in our local communities.

Chef and co-owner Stephanie Rocard said, "we want to encourage people who aren't vegan or vegetarian to have more veggies," and said that a lot of people had had a bad experience in their youth with vegetables not being cooked properly. She encourages her customers to always have a vegetable dish alongside their meat dishes.

Social Foundry took mushrooms to a new level with the addition of truffle oil and porcini dust in their Wild Mushrooms meal. "We sold a lot of the mushroom dish over the awards", said café manager Jess. When asked what makes a good plant-based dish, chef Mel said, "Flavour. As much flavour as possible," and went on to say a lot of places simply remove the meat to make a meal vegetarian, but their Wild Mushrooms dish was created from scratch to be a standalone plant-based meal, holding its own on the flavour and nutrition front.

The Edgy Veg Awards aim to promote more people eating more veggies by getting local eateries to put a plant-based meal front and centre of the menu. This year there were over 650 votes for the 21 dishes on offer. Both Social Foundry and The Flying Pigeon will keep their winning dishes on the menu for a while longer, so get down and try these if you haven't already.

Environmental health updates from Macedon Ranges Shire Council



Wood Smoke and Air Quality

As the weather becomes cooler and the leaves begin to fall, Council sees an increase in wood smoke complaints across the Macedon Ranges. Many residents rely on wood heaters and internal fireplaces for warmth during autumn and winter.

The smoke generated from wood heaters and fireplaces can pollute the air we breathe in and consequently be harmful to our health.

It is important that consumers purchase the right wood heater and then use and maintain it correctly to ensure that the wood smoke pollution is reduced.

The Environment Protection Agency (EPA) also recommends that you:

- always use dry, seasoned, untreated hardwood in your wood heater
- leave about two centimetres of ash at the base of your wood heater
- make sure your flue is clean.

If you are concerned about smoke from a neighbour's wood heater, it is recommended you try talking to them first. If this doesn't help, you can report the wood smoke pollution to Council by calling 5422 0333.

Septic Tanks or Onsite Wastewater Management Systems (OWMS)

Council is responsible for the assessment and approval of permits for septic tank systems within the shire.

Septic tank systems or onsite wastewater management systems (OWMS) are used on residential, community and business premises in unsewered areas. They treat, recycle or dispose of raw sewage, which contains harmful bacteria and is commonly a combination of wastewater from toilets, bathrooms and kitchens.

There are laws that apply to the owner or occupier (i.e. a renter) of land with an OWMS. The system must be properly installed, operated and maintained, to ensure there are no public health risks arising from raw sewage.

Permits are issued by Council where someone wishes to construct, install, or alter an existing OWMS. Council is responsible for issuing permits for smaller-scale systems with a design or actual flow rate of sewage not more than 5000L on any day. A system that is larger than 5000L is approved by the Environment Protection Authority (EPA).

Our permit system includes desktop assessments, Land Capability Assessments (LCAs), multiple site visits and liaison with the plumber and/or owner of the land. Council's planning team is also consulted to ensure they are also satisfied with the proposal prior to permits being issued.

Join our large tree and hollow survey

Are you interested in exploring the large habitat trees in Council's bushland reserves?

Throughout winter, Council is running a series of large tree surveys where you can join us for a fun and educational walk and help gather information to create a database of large habitat trees.

Learn how to document large tree locations, look for hollows, and learn their critical role for fauna such as possums, gliders and birds.

Don't put textiles in your recycling bin

Did you know textiles don't belong in your yellow-lidded recycling hin?

Drop off unwanted clothes that are still in excellent condition to your nearest op shop. It's always good to call ahead first and check they're happy to accept what you have.

Any items that are damaged and can't be donated can be dropped off at your local resource recovery facility. Ask a staff member to point you in the direction of the textile recovery chutes.

Hiking, fishing, camping and dumping stuff in the bush

EPA Victoria says some people are just using it as a dumping spot for their rubbish: plastic bags, car boot loads and even industrial skip bins full of it.

EPA is asking every Victorian who loves the bush to store the EPA hotline number 1300 EPA VIC (1300 372 842) in their mobile phone and report any dumped rubbish they find.

EPA's Northwest Regional Manager Paul Ratajczyk says anyone camping, mountain biking, hiking or just having a barbecue in the bush can do their bit for the environment.

"Give us a prompt report and an accurate location of the dump site, and you are giving EPA a better chance of tracking down the culprit and making them pay the price," Mr Ratajczyk said.

"Taking a photo can help, too. With these simple measures, you can make sure your favourite spot in the bush doesn't turn into a stinking, illegal tip," he said.

Loads of waste dumped in the bush often include construction and demolition waste, hazardous materials like asbestos and rotting household rubbish.

Cleaning up abandoned waste costs the State Government and local Councils millions of dollars every year, and many of EPA's prosecutions in court are for illegal waste dumping.

EPA can issue regulatory notices and fines that start at more than \$9,000 and can go well into the hundreds of thousands if the case goes to court. The court can also order the culprit to pay for the clean-up, which can cost even more than the fines. And cases involving small items of litter can be reported to your local council.

"Illegal dumping creates an eyesore and can contaminate the soil and nearby waterways, and if the culprits get away with it, the cost of the clean-up is too often left to the community or landholders," Mr Ratajczyk said.

Podiatrists look after the health of your feet and can assess, diagnose and treat conditions affecting the feet. They can check the blood flow to your toes, manage bunions and wounds, help reduce ulcers and sores, check how you walk and help with shoe choices. Good foot health can help with balance and prevent falls and tripping.

Availability for children's allied health services


Appointments are available for families whose children need speech therapy, physiotherapy or occupational therapy. Sunbury and Cobaw Community Health has re-opened its books with some services being available immediately. The organisation is NDIS-registered and has sites in Kyneton, Romsey and Sunbury.

Sunbury and Cobaw's allied health clinicians see children aged up to 10 years old for their physiotherapy service, and up to eight years old for speech and occupational therapy. Families do not require a referral; you can call them on 5421 1666 and a staff member will run through the referral process with you.

For families who have concerns about the development of their baby or pre-school child, Sunbury and Cobaw Community Health also runs free drop-in sessions where parents and carers can come along with their child and have a chat to one of the child and youth health team. The sessions are held in venues across the Macedon Ranges and Sunbury.

Macedon Ranges Shire Council has an eye on the future

Macedon Ranges Shire Council (MRSC) recently held a Youth Summit at the Woodend Library to give the younger generations an avenue for feedback.

The initiative forms part of MRSC's Youth Strategy, ELEVATE.On the day, attendees were asked for their opinions on the most important issues affecting the area's younger people.

"Youth is the future," Mayor Annette Death said in her opening speech.

The MRSC website indicates that nearly a quarter of the Macedon Ranges population (24.5%) are below the age of twenty-five.

One student cited issues of disconnection and isolation from a lack of public transport, saying "their district has a lack of buses, and a lack of connection."

More bike lanes were needed, another suggested, citing concern for the safety of those without a car.

As of April 24, according to the MRSC website, the council is "analysing the summit findings, to ensure that ideas, opinions, concerns and aspirations are included in relevant future plans and actions."

The new budget is going to be tight, with rapidly increasing costs over and above our income, and we have had to make some tough decisions to keep everything balanced. However, we are generally satisfied with how the budget is coming together and we have managed to keep the focus on key priorities as communicated by community feedback and submitters to the budget process. Many thanks to all those involved and to those who have contributed to the budget development. Once again, the outcomes of this budget reflect the importance of residents and community groups taking an active interest and making submissions into the process. We are also happy to receive feedback once the budget is finalised and released – which should be the case now as you are reading this article.

As we write, the Woodend Winter Arts Festival is still a few weeks away and we wish to thank all those involved for what we know will be another fabulously successful event. From the opening with the muchloved fireworks through a long weekend of wonderful musicians, artists, authors, and presenters, we encourage everyone to attend and wish you all a fantastic time.

The Tourism Macedon Ranges (TMR), Thriving Villages Project is a great community-based program that has now seen three successful workshops delivered. Following the Regional Visioning session at Mt Monument Winery on 20 March, which attracted over 70 people from across the shire, two town workshops (in Romsey and Lancefield) were undertaken later in April. The Romsey workshop attracted 45 attendees, and approximately 40 participated in Lancefield. These sessions include a small group 'town walk-shop', followed by a larger group workshop. The objective of these was the creation and ownership of Township Activation Plans. In addition, a 'call to action' was made at each that involved the creation of town teams who will begin the task of getting moving on quick win projects. All workshops have seen solid attendance and support from Councillors and Council Officers.

The Economic Development team has provided letters of support to the Woodend Traders Association, Macedon-Mt Macedon Business and Tourism Association, and Gisborne Rotary for funding applications associated with the Thriving Villages Project. Other townbased workshops and Township Activation Plans are likely to follow as these funding applications to a range of funding agencies are assessed and hopefully approved.

Finalists in this year's Josh's Rainbow Eggs 2024 Macedon Ranges Business Excellence Awards are due to be announced on 23 July. There was a lot of interest in the awards this year, with many nominations across the categories. This is particularly pleasing as the nomination process is designed to be a business development process and requires some effort. People's Choice voting starts on 23 July and concludes on 26 August with the gala awards presentation event on the 30 August.

You may be aware that Parks Victoria have opened an Expressions of Interest (EOI) process for an operator for the Mount Macedon Tearooms. Parks Victoria are offering a lease of between 10 and 21 years and applications close at 4pm on 20 June 2024. They are looking for a high-quality operator with the capacity to deliver yearround food and beverage experience for locals and visitors to Mt Macedon. Interested parties can register on the Buying Victoria portal to download the full details of the EOI process.

This winter, keep your kids well with a flu shot. Getting their flu shot every year is just as important as other routine childhood vaccines. The flu shot protects children from serious illness caused by the flu and can be given at the same time as other routine childhood vaccines.

If your child is aged between six months and five years, you can book them in to receive the flu vaccine for free via Council's monthly immunisation program.

In addition, Council will be holding some evening sessions for free vaccines under the National Immunisation Program (NIP). During these sessions, Council will offer infant vaccines for children aged between six weeks to five years, high school vaccines, and flu vaccines for individuals aged between six weeks to five years.

The next evening session is Thursday 27 June in Gisborne.





Tickets are \$10, with only 500 up for grabs, and they can be purchased at the club or check out our Facebook page for more details.



He Went to War

Private Edwin Dobinson was one of four soldiers welcomed home from service in World War One at a celebration in Upper Campaspe on 17 July 1919. Each was given a gold medal in appreciation of their service. Their names had been added to the honour board, which was made to look like a shield made from fiddle back blackwood. Speeches were made, supper was served and dancing and a 'sing song' enlivened the event. The honour board was hung at the Upper Campaspe State school, later called the Ashbourne State school, and now hangs in the Woodend RSL.


Edwin enlisted in the AIF on 9 August 1915, aged 31, after spending six years with the 1st Volunteers. He was assigned as a driver to 1st Reinforcements for the 4th Artillery Brigade and sailed from Melbourne in November, arriving in Suez a month later. In March 1916, he was transferred to Marseilles in France to join the British Expeditionary Force.

Following bouts of rheumatism and influenza in November that year, he was sent to England in January 1917 to recuperate. In September 1917 he returned to France, where he served as a driver during the campaigns in the Somme and Belgium, before finally returning to England to await shipment home in April 1919.

Edwin is remembered at tree number 36 west in the Avenue of Honour, on the Clock Tower and the shire and Campaspe honour rolls and was awarded the 1914–15 Star, a British War Medal, and a Victory Medal. He is just one of 370 men and four women from the Newham and Woodend district who served their country in World War One. Their stories are recorded in *They Went to War* by Sylvia Boxshall, published by the Woodend & District Heritage Society.

Victorian renters experiencing rental stress will be supported under a new package. Minister for Consumer Affairs Gabrielle Williams recently launched the \$7.8 million Rental Stress Support Package, which will support organisations across the state to deliver a range of services to renters experiencing rental stress.

Around 5 per cent of Victorian households are facing serious rental stress, with demand increasing for organisations that provide information and advice, financial counselling, advocacy and legal assistance to Victorian renters.


The Rental Stress Support Package will help families stay in their homes and prevent homelessness and builds on the Housing Statement commitment to back the critical work of community organisations addressing the high demand for rental assistance we know is being seen across Victoria.

Member for Macedon Mary-Anne Thomas MP said, "Our Rental Stress Support Package will provide extra help to renters living in Macedon experiencing rental stress, building on the more than 130 rental reforms we've already delivered to strengthen renters' rights and further work to come through our Housing Statement."

On this day, and all days, we remember that we come to school on the lands of the Taungurung People, and that we border the lands of the Dja Dja Wurrung People on the opposite banks of the Campaspe River.
